Paulsboro High school is loaded with tradition... after all we are 100 years old! One of the best and most looked forward to is, of course, the Brotherhood Award nominations and assembly. On May 19, 2017, the 60th PHS Brotherhood Award assembly took place. This year's nominees were Bryanna Coles, Edlisha Pernell, John Slusarski, Haley Mogar, and Chris Koller.

The award was introduced by Mrs. Ada Rosen, a member of the Mayer's Civil Rights Commission and Mr. George Gaines, a fellow committee member, during the 1950's. The annual assembly promotes "the importance of community through the selection of a high school senior who embodies the true meaning of Brotherhood in his or her life and actions." In order to be nominated, each senior must meet certain qualifications, which include showing regard for people of all religious faiths, racial backgrounds and national origins. The regard for the welfare of his or her fellow students. The participation in student affairs with special emphasis on the just treatment of others and willingness to go out of his or her way to be of service.

The Brotherhood award nominees are selected in a closed session by members of the student body, administrators, faculty and staff. After the top 5 nominees are announced, students in grades 9-12

vote to product one winner.

A Secret Garden takes over at PHS

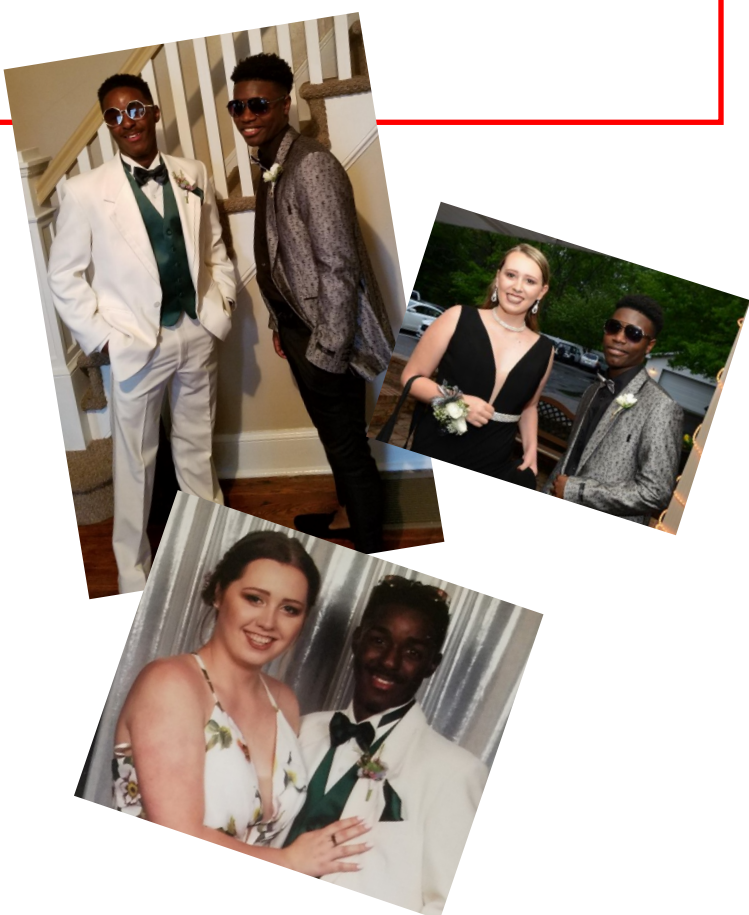

This year we say goodbye and farewell to Mrs. Gentile, Mrs. DelRossi, and Mrs. Spitale.

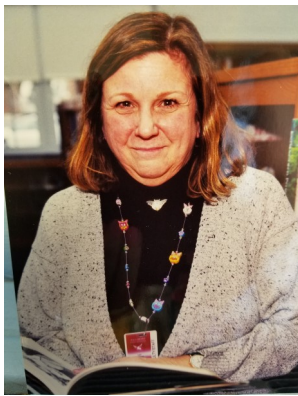
