3TR-Time to Read

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What do you remember reading from high school? I vividly remember Fitzgerald's "The Great Gatsby." I don't however, remember especially liking the book, but it was an assigned reading, and therefore I read it. For students at New Milford High School, reading is being viewed differently.

In addition to the new block schedule, students at NMHS are participating in another new initiative – 3TR, which stands for Take Time to Read. 3TR is a sustained silent reading period that occurs every other day (B days) for 25 minutes. Students are encouraged to read anything of interest to them – including books, magazines, newspapers, graphic novels, etc. This is refreshing to students since other classes have required reading that are assigned to all students regardless of reading level.

"I enjoy the opportunity to catch up on my recreational reading. For those of us that don't have a lot of time after school, this gives us the opportunity to read something that interests us," says NMHS junior Matthew Chastain.

The high school chose to begin this program to increase student engagement in reading and provide students time to develop recreational literacy habits and skills.

"We want students to become lifelong readers, and 3TR allows students to read engaging texts at their independent reading levels. This type of recreational reading helps students build background knowledge. In addition, increasing the amount of time students spend reading can have a positive effect on all academic areas, vocabulary acquisition and test scores," comments Cheryl Morosko, Literacy Coach, Grades 7-12.

Studies have shown that high school students spend as little as two percent of their school day reading. We are looking to increase the amount of time students spend practicing this important skill.

Students who have traveled the halls of Schaghticoke Middle School the last several years have learned about respect.

"Respect has been the SMS theme for several years," states Mr. Patrick Smith, 7th grade social studies teacher.

Students learn about three components/types of respect:

- Respect for Self-doing what's right even when it's not popular
- Respect for Others—treating people as you would like to be treated, including all individuals in the building, noise levels, etc.
- Respect for School—not just the physical building, but what the school is attempting to teach and promote

Respect is emphasized in all areas of the school and by all staff members. Posters with respect reminders are located in numerous locations throughout the building. There is a team of SMS staff who share ideas with other staff members and academic teams to address behavior issues that arise throughout the year.

Positive Behavior Support (PBS) is another facet to the respect program—focusing on students who are doing the "right thing" most of the time. Mrs. Dana Ford is starting a new program in the upcoming months to focus and reward these positive behaviors.

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If you have a student at Sarah Noble Intermediate School you've probably heard of PBIS. Although it sounds like a texting shortcut, it's actually an acronym for Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS).

When new education mandates were recently troduced. Staff received training at the behanded down, schools were required to add a behavioral component to the curriculum. SNIS chose PBIS as it was not only nationally accredited, it was also being successfully utilized in over 40 schools in Connecti-

cut, including New Milford's own Schaghticoke Middle School.

PBIS is a process for creating safer and more effective schools. The goal is to enhance the capacity of schools to educate children with a researchbased. school-wide and classroom behavior support

system. So what does that mean for your Sarah Noble student?

PBIS is a three-year commitment. Sarah Noble has completed year one. Staff attended various trainings throughout the year and gathered information on how to create the PBIS framework at SNIS. All school staff, cafeteria staff, custodians, bus drivers and parents (via the PTO) were surveyed and asked if they thought a program like PBIS was needed and what the main behavioral expectations for our school should be. The

top four responses were that students should \ be respectful, responsible, honest and safe. Everyone, overwhelmingly, felt this program would benefit SNIS.


This year the program has been formally inginning of the year and were supplied with lessons to teach the core behavioral expectations. The school has implemented several visual reminders throughout the building of the Noble Pledge – to be respectful, responsi-

ble, honest and safe. Behavior expectations have been defined in the cafeteria and an updated O.S.C.A.R. (Outstanding Student Character Award Recognition) program has been established. School staff will continue to work and train with SERC (State Education Resource Cen-

Response from SNIS staff has been positive. Students are gaining familiarity with the program and are doing well with it. Each classroom provides the

opportunity for students to recognize one another for keeping different parts of the Noble Pledge. Staff recognition of positive behavior is still done through the OSCAR program.

Parents are an important part of the program as well. They are asked to reinforce the school expectations at home. Parents can visit www.pbis.org or contact SNIS for more information.



VOBLE PLEDGE



Yes, we all think our kids are super, but I'm referring to the reading program that was started last year for kindergarten students at New Milford Public Schools. Many students and parents were excited to learn that the Superkids reading program had been continued into the first grade for the 2011-2012 school year.

"The Superkids (SK) program was such a success in kindergarten that we decided to continue it into first grade. The data was

showing us that lour kindergarten students were performing in the spring better than ever before. We thought that if our students were doing better at the end of kindergarten, confirst would give them a Dr. Maureen McLaughlin, NMPS Assistant Superintendent.

Superkids is a reading program designed by the Rowland Reading Foundation for use in kindergarten through second grade. A cast of

fictional characters – the Superkids – engage students while teaching reading and writing. Each Superkid has a unique personality and their own songs and stories.

In kindergarten, students learn to recognize all twenty-six uppercase and lowercase letters and associate a single sound for each. First grade students begin work on more complex letter/sound relationships through studying word families, whole word patterns, synonyms, antolnyms, homonyms, idioms, and structural analysis of words, including contractions,

compound words, prefixes, and suffixes. By the end of first grade, students will know all forty-four phonemes and be able to read and write all 200 Dolch words. There are currently no plans to continue the program into second grade.

While first grade teachers are adjusting to the new program, the district is providing them access to Superkids consultants from the Rowland Reading Foundation.
