Hello families,

Kindergarteners are working in the next unit in ELA. In this unit, they will be reading the adventures that a brother sister duo go through. With the new unit comes more sight words and more writing. The kindergarteners are also going to be answering questions to the stories that we read. We start off with multiple choice, but will slowly do short answer as a whole group. The kindergarteners are showing me that they are getting better and better with their reading skills and need to also be practicing at home.



First grade is also working on the same unit in ELA but finishing it up strongly by checking their personal narrative drafts. It is important for the students to check their drafts to make sure that they have all the capitals, periods, and full sentences they need. We are also working on reading the next unit with the book about Grace. Along with working on our writing, we will also be underlining pronouns and matching it to the word that it is talking about in the previous sentence.

Kindergarten will also be taking a math test and moving on to their unit in measurement. This will be fun as we use paperclips to measure.

First grade moving onto their unit in geometry. We will be talking about both two dimensional and three dimensional shapes.

As a fun experiment, we will be using heavy cream and jars to make homemade butter. Each student will bring it home. For the at home learners, I will give you the recipe to make the butter. It is fun to see how long it takes to shake it before it turns to butter!

Students are working hard at using length in customary units.


ELA/Science/Social Studies/Thematic Learning:

Hello Families!

Science

Students were very excited to see their tomato seeds had started sprouting over the weekend! Throughout the weeks students checked their seeds daily to observe the changes. We noticed that both the Roma and a Super Beefsteak tomato plants look the same as seedlings. We will be watching to see how this changes as they get larger. Mrs. Dunn brought in a STEAM project for us to do this week. Students used pinecones, seeds and peanut butter to make birdfeeders. These bird feeders then went home for students to hang and observe the birds that frequent it. Please encourage your student to observe the bird and draw and or write about them in their journal.



Math

This week in math students continued to study for fractions and are now able to identify and write their own fractions in words and numbers based on a picture. When given a fraction students can draw a picture divided into equal parts to show the fraction. This weekend try to find a time to talk about fractions at home. The kitchen is a great place to have these number talks!

ELA

Students finished their study of light and sound in ELA this week. We took time working with Venn Diagrams to compare and contrast light and sound. We learned that both light and sound are a form of energy and travel in waves. Although they are both very fast light travels much faster at 186,000 MPS compared to sounds 750 MPH. We have also been spending a lot of time on turning simple sentences into complex sentences by adding adjectives and adverbs to describe our nouns and verbs. I have been talking to the students a lot about their handwriting, some students will begin going home with handwriting practice to do at home. Please encourage your student to take their time on this making sure that tall letters are tall, short letters are short, and hanging letters hang.

As we introduced last week, we started a special focus on social emotional learning this week. We started with re-examining and practicing our independent learning guidelines, and brainstorming additional guidelines and resources we felt would be beneficial for both our learning and wellbeing as a community. We then gave attention to key character traits that we focus on at Evaline, as well as the start of healthy feeling expression strategies for when we become frustrated. Next week we will continue to apply information from these topics as well as adding some growth mindset topics to each day to help encourage students to push through on their work independently, even when they feel challenged, and how to ask for help instead of giving up.

This week I want to give special recognition to Samantha Quillan for the recent significant improvements she has made in completing tasks in class and at home, including completing extra practices on skills which will make her the best learner she can be. Samantha is really stepping up to be a great example of a positive learner, which is very exciting to see! We noticed, we appreciate it, and we can't wait to see how you continue to grow in this area over the next few weeks. Great Job Samantha!

Another area we are putting more attention on is with our reading for the Read-a-Thon. Not only will each student earn a prize if they meet their individual goal of 930 minutes read and documented for the month of March, but if the class can submit a minimum of 6510 minutes they will earn a class treat to have during an end of the day class party. This is a doable task, if students just commit to reading and writing down 30 minutes each day. We are also including some fun reading opportunities each day which can be documented as well. However, the biggest obstacle our students seem to have is not with reading, but instead with filling out their form, and turning it in each week. As a result we are falling behind on our goal, and need to pick up the pace in both reading and documenting if we are going to earn these prizes. So please encourage them to read, read, read!!! There are no limitations on what they

read, when they read it, or where they read it. They just need the reading minutes to be verified by a staff member or parent/guardian. Thank you for supporting our fourth graders on this goal.
