In ASL, time is expressed in a combination of two skills. The body itself is used as a time line. Signs for the present time (now, today, et cetera) are signed close to the front of the chest. Signs for the past occur right behind the body to far behind the body (yesterday, last month, a year ago, et cetera) Signs for the future occur from right in front of the body to far in front of the body (tomorrow, next week, far into the future).

These signs must also work seamlessly with facial expressions to indicate the severity of how long ago or how far into the future the times actually are (recently, a long, long, time into the future, ages ago, et cetera) Facial expressions for a really long time ago would include an eye squint and a tongue rolling in the mouth. Current time facial expressions could use pursed lips. Something in the recent past or the recent future would use bared teeth, Something in the far future would use an open mouth and squinting eyes as if looking far, far away. No wonder people who use ASL are such great multi-taskers!!!
