Golfers use the drivers, or woods, on their opening tees and on long shots. Irons are used from less than 200 yards from the hole, and putters are used to finish the drill. Then, specific types of irons, or wedges, assist golfers with getting out of sand traps and bunkers. Golfers are limited to 14 clubs in their bags.
