

- The district strives to develop 21st century skills and life long skills with our students to prepare them for the future workforce and society in general.





#### **POVERTY RATE**




# BULLYING INCIDENTS AND CORRECTIVE ACTIONS

- District-wide:Nine documented reports
- (This does not mean there were nine actual cases of bullying. Six of the incidents included could have led to bullying had there not been an intervention.)
- Corrective Actions and Measures include:
- > Conference with Principal
- ➤ Detention
- > In-school Suspension
- Corporal Punishment (Elem/MG)
- ➤ Out-of-School Suspension
- Counselor follows-up with all bullying situations with both the victim and the perpetrator

#### **ACCREDITATION STATUS**

 All schools in Pottsville School District are fully accredited through the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (formerly ADE).



# CHILD INTERNET PROTECTION ACT (CIPA)

- District will make on-line services accessible to legitimate users of the network and computer systems. Proper conduct is the responsibility of the user. Attempts to violate policy will result in disciplinary action. Pottsville Public Schools will review its policy in a timely manner and actively investigate network/internet abuse.
- Students will be supervised during on-line activities while at school.
- School filtering monitors will be used on campus as well as a mobile content filtering for laptops/mobile devices to protect students from various inappropriate materials. Restricted websites include those covered under the CIPA (Child internet Protection Act) rules and regulations. These include websites that are obscene, are child pornographic, or are harmful to minors. All parents/students need to also be aware of online safety. More information can be found at www.fcc.gov
- Faculty members will supervise students during school hours when students are accessing the network/internet. Faculty members can request approval to bypass filter for bonafide research and educational purposes.
- Online activities at home will be monitored by the parents.
- The students will be instructed on acceptable use of the network, proper network etiquette, safety and privacy precautions for on-line use every year. Arkansas library laws require that we instruct students every year as well.
- Parental permission must be granted for students to access the network/internet.

# HEALTH AND WELLNESS POLICY UPDATES

Health and Wellness in the District: Cafeteriasfollow nutrition guidelines, Elementary, MG, and JH Food/Community Garden, and Physical Activity for Students and Staff.

- Building SIP Teams (all staff)-met multiple times last year. Each building completed the SHI to determine which health module/s may be an area/s of concern: staff development and physical activity for staff.
- District ACSIP Team-met multiple times last year. Based upon each Building's SHI/Module concerns, the District along with the help of the Building SIP Teams created an action plan for 2018-2019:
- Goal 1: Increase community involvement-Victory /Community Gardens, Flu Clinic, and Guest Speakers
- Goal 2: Increase employee wellness and health-walking/running marathons, CPR Training, etc.


#### NONDISCRIMINATION POLICY



# WAYS WE ARE CONTINUING TO IMPROVE STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AND ADDRESS CONCERNS...

- Faculty have attended and will continue to attend Professional Development opportunities; have met and will continue to meet in vertical and horizontal teams throughout the year to bridge curriculum gaps from one grade level to the next, and use instructional strategies and methods (Empowering Writers and Math Training in partnership with Arch Ford Co-op) to reach out to our students of varied learning styles.
- Our Pottsville Task Force consisting of parents, community members, faculty members, and administrators meet to work together to generate ideas to help our students overcome continued barriers for learning.
- Faculty meet once a month and discuss actions listed in our SIP plan to make sure they
  are working for all students and/or if changes need to be made.
- Provide mentoring to our novice teachers.
- We want to ensure that all of our students not only perform at or above grade level and are meeting expectations and/or meeting readiness levels on state mandated tests, but that they can also take pride in themselves for knowing that they have the capabilities to defeat obstacles and accomplish the goals they set for themselves.


