





Padgett applies for and wins \$5,000 grant for a Rainbow Reading Garden at RCES

RCES recently won a \$5,000 grant for a Rainbow Reading Garden. Mary Ida Padgett, who applied for the grant, recently received news that RCES is the recipient of the 2019-2020 Lowe's Toolbox for Education grant from Lowe's Charitable and Educational Foundation (LCEF).

In 2018, with the help of Mrs. Arlene Crosby, Mrs. Christie Rutland. Hollie Roma. Aaron Padgett, and Eric Padgett, Mrs. Padgett began working on the concept and applied for a garden grant to improve the playgrounds at Richard Carroll Elementary School. Padgett said, "Since our school was established in 2013, no shade trees have been planted on the playground. The RCES Rainbow Reading Garden will provide a shady, cool area outdoors, where the children and faculty will not be at risk of prolonged sun exposure or heat. We aim to create a Reading Garden, complete with a compost vegetable and herb system, garden beds, and an overall shady landscape filled with beneficial plants and trees. The reading garden will be an ideal place for students to enjoy a healthy outdoor learning environment."

She stated the mission and goal of the reading garden is "to make reading more exciting and interesting for all of our students, especially for the students who struggle with reading." Padgett said, "when you plant a garden, you plant a seed, both literally and metaphorically. By bringing students outside into a safe and relaxed atmosphere, reading can become a more exciting adventure, and a lasting love for learning can be inspired."

"Beyond the confines of library and classroom walls, this garden could help us encourage students to relax in the fresh air." Reading and learning outdoors allow students to spread out and feel free.

This project will mean so

much to our students and school. Reading is where it all begins. Once you catch a student's attention in reading, their grades will improve and this can lead to an improvement in behavior as well. The RCES Rainbow Reading Garden will be an ideal learning environment, not only to challenge the minds of our students, but also to strengthen their motor skills.

This Reading Garden will give our students a chance to become avid readers, dig in the dirt, and learn about growing food, and enjoy the fresh outdoors.
