Greetings from the Alexander City School System!

On behalf of all the faculty and staff of the Alexander City Schools (ACS), I am delighted to provide our first publication of the ACS Annual Report. This report offers a snapshot of the many outstanding accomplishments for the 2013-2014 school year. Such accomplishments were made possible only through the collaborative efforts of our excellent staff and the wonderful support of our parents and community members. Thank you to all who expect and assist us in striving for excellence in the Alexander City School System!

Throughout this publication, our principals and directors offer a glimpse of the many great accomplishments and activities from the past school year. Below, I provide just a few district highlights:

- Developed ACS 2020: A Pursuit of Excellence, which is our strategic plan for the district and will serve as a guide for our work through the year 2020;
- Expanded our ACS communications through website improvement, Facebook, Twitter, and several other avenues;
- Successfully renewed, by a public vote of 92%, 7.5 mills of ad valorem property tax, which provides approximately \$2.2 million in local revenues for our schools;
- Secured an annual appropriation of \$360,000 from the City Council for a comprehensive K-12 fine arts program offering music, visual arts, chorus, and drama;
- Offered a wide array of extracurricular clubs, programs, and highly competitive athletic teams, where 73% of our secondary students were involved and 15 of our 17 athletic teams advanced to the playoffs;
- Continued to expand our Leader In Me (K-6) programs, in which Jim Pearson Elementary School received the distinguished Lighthouse designation;
- Expanded our K-12 STEM/QUEST opportunities, including our award-winning robotics program, (grades 3-12), as evidenced by the Alex City Lego Warriors placing second in a field of 37 teams in a national robotics competition hosted by the World War II Museum in New Orleans;
- Continued a strong Advanced Placement program, with a yearly average of 169 courses taken by our students;
- Expanded Career Tech programs, with strong partnerships with C.A.C.C., the Tallapoosa County Schools, and our local business and industry;
- Received \$503,514 in career tech grant funds to establish a Mechanical, Engineering, and Technology (M.E.T.) Academy, with a purpose to facilitate the ongoing advanced technical education in industrial maintenance through dual enrollment courses and develop workplace skills through cooperative education; and
- Continued a successful iPad initiative (K-12) funded by the Alexander City Schools Education Foundation, which now provides a minimum of 30 iPads per grade (K-9) and a 1:1 initiative for all students in grades 10-12.

As you can see from the evidence above and throughout this publication, we have much to be proud of in the Alexander City School System. We have an outstanding staff and excellent students. However, we are not satisfied with the status quo and understand that excellence comes through continuous determination and hard work. Therefore, we operate with the philosophy that all can improve, learn, and succeed, regardless. Our motto is High Expectations and Success for ALL.

In closing, I want to say what an honor it is to serve as the superintendent for the Alexander City School System, and I want to thank everyone for your tremendous support. My first year in this position has been extremely enjoyable, and I look forward to the many great things that lie ahead.

- BRHS Wrestler Deon Maxwell signed a scholarship with Huntingdon College.
