COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Computer Applications is a one-semester foundational course intended to teach students the computing fundamentals and concepts involved in the proficient use of common application software. Upon completion of this course, students will gain basic proficiency in word processing, spreadsheets, databases, and presentations. In addition, students will have engaged in key critical thinking skills and will have practiced ethical and appropriate behavior required for the responsible use of technology. Standards in this course are aligned with Tennessee Common Core State Standards for Literacy in Technical Subjects and Tennessee Common Core State Standards in Mathematics.

GOAL:

To provide an environment where students gain relevant skills for school and business with the foundation of knowledge needed to succeed in environments that require the use of computers and the internet.

COURSE STANDARD TOPICS:

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JSCC DUAL CREDIT CHALLENGE EXAM

The exams are skills-based projects that are administered on a monthly basis following the completion of the portion of class that covers that particular software program.
