Summer Learning

With summer vacation halfway over (already!) we hope our NMPS students have spent time relaxing and having fun with family and friends. Summer's down time is important because it allows students to recharge for the fall. At the same time, summer is also a time when learning loss can occur. The so-called "summer slide" can cut in to hard-earned school year learning and create the need to catch back up when school restarts in August. Engaging in educational activities during the summer months can help prevent this slide.

Each year, NMPS students participate in the Governor's Summer Reading Challenge. This year's theme is "A Universe of Stories". Students are encouraged to keep a journal cataloguing the books they read over the summer. In August, books are tallied and small in-school rewards presented. As always, the <u>New Milford Public Library</u> is a valuable resource for reading suggestions and programming.

New this year, SMS Project Lead the Way classes created "Lending Libraries" to be placed out in the community, one at Lynn Deming Park and one at the John Pettibone Community Center near the playground. Students looking for additional reading material can visit these community "Libraries" to pick up a book, donated through a book drive sponsored by local business Compass Property Inspections. Even better, students are encouraged to bring a book they've enjoyed to leave in return.

Schaghticoke Middle School students don't have to look far for their first summer reading book. Each grade will be reading the same book, provided courtesy of the SMS PTO, to be discussed in the fall when students return.

NMHS students select their summer reading from <u>a list of several book</u> <u>titles</u>. Per Assistant Principal Linda Scoralick, "This list was created by staff members and is based upon student feedback, circulation statistics, a fiction vs. non-fiction balance, various book reviews, and recommended book lists for teens. The difficulty level of the books provides a range, in order to differentiate for all students."


Reading isn't the only area that is subject to the "summer slide" and this year for the first time, NMPS is offering a summer math program as well. Per district Math Coach Cortni Muir, "The Summer Math Passport program is designed to work with community partners to provide students with engaging options for math in the summer that won't feel like a punishment, but rather a way to enjoy their time doing math in the real world and build-ing a sense of community."



Students incoming to grades 1-5 received a grade level booklet before they left for the summer to bring to local businesses around New Milford. Once on site, students will attempt to solve a math problem associated with the business and have their "passport" stamped.



Students who complete at least 10 of 14 stamps will receive a certificate when they return to school. Mrs. Muir and fellow Math Coach Carrie Allen will be sharing updates on Twitter under the hashtag #NMSummerMath. They encourage families to do the same.

Summer's No Vacation for NMPS Facilities Department

Summer is prime time for the district's Facilities Department personnel who take advantage of the schools being relatively empty of students and staff to work their way through all the cleaning and disinfecting, scrubbing, painting, annual inspections and work order processing needed to keep our buildings' thousands of square feet maintained.



In addition, summer is the time for annual servicing of septic tanks, kitchen hood cleaning, boiler maintenance and other miscellaneous projects.

Facilities Director Kevin Munrett says this summer included moving age appropriate furniture and equipment to NMHS to accommodate the summer programs usually held at SNIS, where the roof is being replaced. He is happy to report that the SNIS roof project is well underway, with several sections of the roof already made watertight.









Other Facilities related summer projects include: updating school based servers and cameras to ensure that all our schools continue to have a fully functioning security system; asbestos abatement of the HPS cafeteria floor; a new fire alarm panel and devices for HPS; the installation of a new serving line in the SNIS cafeteria; and rehabilitation of the rear stage area in the Lillis Building basement to provide for more use.

Finally, summer wouldn't be summer without yard work, and our grounds provide plenty of it. Special appreciation to our maintenance crews who are out in the summer heat!

International Day of Friendship

From the United Nations website: Held annually on July 30, the International Day of Friendship was <u>proclaimed</u> in 2011 by the United Nations General Assembly with the idea that friendship between peoples, countries, cultures and individuals can inspire peace efforts and build bridges between communities. The resolution particularly emphasizes involving young people, as future leaders, in community activities that include different cultures and promote international understanding and respect for diversity. The website www.wikihow.com suggests taking a trip to the library to learn more about other cultures:

- Check out a travel book. Reading through travel books and travel journals gives you great ideas about local and international destinations and begins to expose you to new cultures. You can check out a guide to your chosen culture, or read travel journals by people who have spent time in that culture. Look for guides that cover information about etiquette, gender roles, festivals, and religion.
- **Read books written by people from other cultures.** You can read fiction, nonfiction, poetry, or anything written by a person from the culture you want to learn about. Reading books by people from other cultures gives you a glimpse into the mind and life of the people from that culture that would be difficult to obtain otherwise.
- Read a history book about the culture. It is important to know information on subjects such as major conflicts, holidays, and customs. If the culture has a different language than your native language, search for translations of books in your language.
- Check out films from other cultures. Ask the librarian if any foreign films are available. Look for videos that offer translations or subtitles. Films from other cultures offer a view of what that culture values as entertainment. Also, look for documentaries about other cultures.
- Search for a language guide. Most libraries will have books that either give a basic overview of a language, or serve as a textbook. Learning the language of the culture you want to know more about is one of the best ways to get to know the culture. Look for a book specifically for beginners if you are new to the language.

Make it a family affair, and *add a recipe book to the mix*. Celebrate with a family dinner featuring dishes from your chosen culture. What better way to learn than through eating!
