James Bergman—Rural Development and Innovation

In rural Oslo sits a white farmhouse with a small shop across the driveway. This shop houses one of the best-kept secrets in the area: Bergman Engineering and Manufacturing Co. also known as, BEAMCO. It is an engineering and innovation company started by Alvarado High School '81 alumnus, James Bergman.

He was raised in rural Oslo in Higdem Township the youngest of three children to Henrietta (VanBaalén, WHS class of 1951) and the late Paulie Bergman. It was here where James would develop his very first love: farming. He is, in fact, a fourth generation farmer to farm the Bergman land. His love for farming would be initiated by his father and they would farm together for many years.

While in high school he participated in basketball, speech, choir, the school play, and was a class officer. He really enjoyed mathematics and the science courses and one of his favorite teachers was his math teacher, Dave Schroeder. Looking back on his years at AHS, he fondly remembered his class being like a family, "There weren't that many of us so we really got to know each other. We were so much more than just a class, we were a 'family'."

After graduation James attended the University of North Dakota pursuing a degree in mechanical engineering. He loved to farm but had a desire to someday start his own business. Throughout his years at UND James came to an unsettling realization—he had no idea what engineers actually did. As graduation approached, he

made a goal that he would give himself one year after college to find an engineering job and to figure out what an engineer actually did. After long hours of searching, with over 111 resumes sent out, he was finally offered an engineering position at a manufacturing company in Roseau, Polaris Industries and quickly figured out what he could do with his degree.

Polaris had hired James as a part-time engineer. He would spend his summers farming and his winters in Roseau at Polaris. When he first began at Polaris they had just started producing ATVs and were looking into other ways to increase revenue. His duties at Polaris included fixing

product problems, something he really enjoyed, "They'd bring us products that were malfunctioning and it was up to us to find a solution." He also worked at developing new products and ideas for Polaris, "Not only was I fixing product problems, but our team was also coming up with futuristic ideas for projects." He really enjoyed the problem solving and constantly coming up with ideas to test out new products. James would spend five winters at Polaris before moving on.

As his time at Polaris came to end, James would once again be faced with a difficult decision: should he head back to school to get his Master's in Business Administration or begin working on starting his own business? He decided on the latter. He approached a co-worker at Polaris for advice about starting a company. This co-worker had experience with running a business and had just recently acquired a company in Eveleth, MN. James jumped at the opportunity and would spend the next two years splitting his time between Oslo, Roseau, and Eveleth, "I lived in my pickup," he said with a laugh. While working in Eveleth he learned the basics about running a business.

After his work in Roseau and Eveleth, James decided to take a leap and started his business, BEAMCO, in 1991. BEAMCO's first project would be developing oil level sensors for ATVs and snowmobiles, and eventually watercraft, for Polaris, a product that was needed at the time. These

oil level sensors detect low oil levels and alert drivers and riders by flashing a warning on the dash. This product would put BEAMCO on the map and secure a business relationship between them and Polaris. BEAMCO has produced well over a million oil level sensors in the past 24 years, with them making over 100,000 of them a year, in peak years.

BEAMCO would continue chugging along, making oil level sensors, and developing new products when Polaris approached James again in 1994. Polaris wanted to develop a two-seated ATV, and with their past business relationship with James and BEAMCO, they figured his company would be a good fit. BEAMCO put together a team of individuals and started on this new venture. At the time, there was no such thing as an off-road, two-seated ATV. They would build the very first prototype of Polaris' Ranger right there in his shop in Oslo. The final product would take BEAMCO and Polaris three years and over 50,000 man-hours to complete before finally showing it off at a dealer show. "It was just so crazy to sit there and watch Polaris unveil this product that nobody had any idea that we were making. The looks on everyone's faces was just priceless," explained James. The final product would go on sale at Polaris in 1998. Throughout the years BEAMCO has created many different types of the Ranger, including the Fire Ranger (which is used by local fire departments) and the Limo (which seats twelve), and over 44 accessory kits, with over 10,000 kits sold.

The 9/11 attack would once again bring people knocking on BEAMCO's door looking for solutions. This time it would be Polaris and the United States Military. They were looking for someone to develop a militarized ATV. BEAMCO started on the project in April and had it done by June. With the success of that ATV, they would be approached about making a militarized Ranger. This Ranger would be completely different from what they had done in the past. It had to be light, easily transported, and had to fit inside aircraft. The Canadian Military would also approach James and BEAMCO around the same time to build them a militarized vehicle made specifically to their requirements.



The summer of 2017 was an exciting time for the Education Foundation. It was so good to see many of you back in the area for the Marshall County Fair Events and your class reunions. Power. BEAMCO developed a unique hydraulics system that LM Wind Power uses to safely build wind blades. They also built the special brackets used on semi trucks to transport wind blades. James and other BEAMCO employees also had the opportunity to install the same hydraulics system in manufacturing plants in Little Rock, AR and Gaspé, Canada.

In 1996 James would marry his wife Donilyn on the very farm where it all began. They would start their family and eventually fill their farmhouse with five children: Louisa, Lily, John, Nickolas, and Adrianna. The inventing and farming bug has bit a couple of his children too. Both John and Lily have farmed side-by-side with their dad for the past few years. When Lily graduated high school she was in a similar situation as her father, should she go to school for farming or engineering? Luckily, she found a program at NDSU that allows her to do both: Agricultural and Biosystems Engineering. His other children include daughter Louisa (WAO '16), who is currently attending UND for nursing, John, who has entered his junior year at Sacred Heart, and his two youngest, Nickolas and Adrianna, who are in 1st grade and preschool at WAO Elementary School.

Throughout the years BEAMCO has certainly gained



a reputation for greatness and it has thrived in the rural community. When James began thinking about starting his business he knew he wanted to keep it local, "There is just something about the rural lifestyle that has always appealed to me." It's no secret that the people in this area are hardworking and dedicated not only to their families, but to others, too. James was shown this again when his father passed away during beet harvest last year. Friends and other locals showed up at his fields and harvested his crops without even being asked. 


