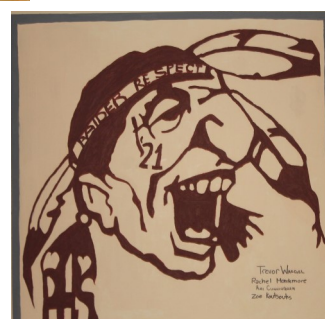
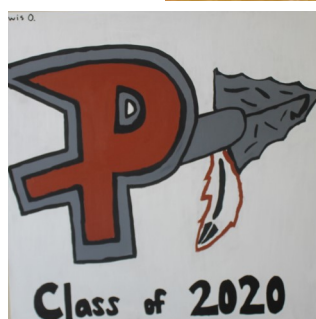
through. One message that was given during the discussion was to treat everyone with respect. The assemblies are good, but I
