


2019-2020 INITIATIVES

- To enhance and improve services for students with special education needs
- To increase our capacity to reduce emotional and behavioral dysregulation
- To provide professional development and imbedded support to ensure that both general and special educators understand the complexities of mental health disorders, dyslexia, and other disabling conditions
- To provide instruction in the least restrictive environment and increase time with non-disabled peers: collaboration, co teaching, specialized instruction, shared expectations
- To work collaboratively with parents and provide ongoing support and training
- To prepare our young adults for transition from high school to post secondary/vocational settings


K-12 SPECIAL EDUCATION YEAR-TO-YEAR DEMOGRAPHICS



NMPS OCTOBER 1ST ENROLLMENT YEAR-TO-YEAR




NMPS K-12 POPULATION % SPECIAL EDUCATION



EXCEL PRE-SCHOOL SPECIAL EDUCATION POPULATION 6 YEAR COMPARISON






YEAR-TO-YEAR REFERRALS TO SPECIAL EDUCATION





SPECIAL EDUCATION SUPERVISOR PROPOSAL PRE K - GRADE 5

> Support for HPS, NES, SNIS, SMS

SPECIAL EDUCATION SUPERVISOR PROPOSAL PRE K - GRADE 5

- ▶ Depth of knowledge: need for supervision, support, and training from a person highly trained in special education law, best practice, instruction, policy, IEP development, and procedures. This is a special skill set, unlike a building administrator.
- improved IEP development and case management resulting in reduced legal issues, cost impact
- Challenging Planning and Placement Team Meetings: procedures, compliance, best practice
- Support for general ed and special ed staff and administrators in the areas of: disability awareness, specialized instruction, co teaching, and collaboration

A SPECIAL EDUCATION SUPERVISOR WILL...

 Assist school teams by working effectively with families and teachers to improve special education delivery of services

 Chair Planning and Placement Meetings (PPT's) which require the skills and expertise of someone with education, (BS, MS) experience, and training in the area of special education

 Provide additional support and resources for students who exhibit mental health needs in the early grades

A SPECIAL EDUCATION SUPERVISOR WILL...

- Work closely when placing students out-of-district, as well as return to district, as appropriate
- Assist in supervising and evaluating special education staff, which will provide school administrators with additional time to focus on school initiatives, instruction, building-based issues/concerns.
- Assist in recruiting and retaining special education staff.
- Support and train staff in research-based practices to improve student performance in literacy and math (DLET Survey results CSDE, 2017)
- Liaison between the PPS Director, building administrators, staff, parents and the community


SWD SMARTER BALANCE TESTING RESULTS MATHEMATICS


