Directions: Number your card using numbers 1 through 25. Make sure it is random. You will need paper and your writing utensil of choice (pencil, marker, crayon, colored pencil). Next, have someone pick a number 1 through 25 and complete that task. Once you've completed the task, color in the square and have an adult initial it when it is complete. Parents/Guardians: have your child tell them about their drawing. Quiz them on the elements of art (line, shape, color, value, texture, form, and space), primary colors (red, blue, and yellow), and secondary colors (orange, green, and purple). Have fun!

3. Draw a picture of your family (no stick figures...you got this!).
4. Draw a picture using only lines.
5. Draw a the silliest thing you can think of. Your drawing must include a balloon.

9. Draw something that makes you happy.
10. Draw a leaf.
11. Using the example, draw like Picasso.
12. Using the Artist Statement handout, write an artist statement on one of your drawings (3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th only).
13. Create a page full of patterns using shapes and lines.
14. Color one of your drawings.
15. Draw something in your house.
16. Create a drawing using only dots (big, small, overlapping, colored)
17. Draw a 2 headed monster with 11 eyes, 2 arms, 5 legs, and one mouth.
18. Draw a character from the most recent story you read.
19. Draw what you want to be one day.
20. Draw the cutest thing you can think of. Your drawing must include a plant.
21. Draw a flower with a design in each petal.
22. Draw a landscape.
23. Draw your favorite animal.
24. Draw the coldest thing you can think of. Your drawing must include a swirl.
25. Draw the Tooth Fairy, chasing Santa around a bowl of singing cherries.

1 Describe
your artwork.

Some questions to consider: What does your artwork look like? What is the subject matter? What is the title of your work? What elements or principles are most obvious in your work?

Some questions to consider: What media is your artwork made from? What tools, techniques or processes did you use to create your artwork?

2 How did you
create your art?

3 What is the *big idea*
behind your artwork?

Some questions to consider: What or who inspired your artwork? Does your work express a personal or social issue? What emotions did you try to show in your artwork?

Some questions to consider: What are your goals as an artist? Did this piece help you reach your goals? Why or why not?

4 What were your
goals for this artwork?

5 What are your
overall *thoughts*
of your artwork?

Some questions to consider: What did you learn in creating this artwork? Is the final piece what you imagined? How so? How will this piece influence your future artworks?
