Have you recently moved or changed your contact information? Please make sure your information is updated at your child's school. This helps the school update its database in the event that we need to contact you and provide you with important information. Thank you for your help.

Ways to keep your trick-or-treating safe:

- Establish ground rules. Your child shouldn't be digging around a candy bowl, touching multiple pieces. Ask them to choose one and stick with it.
- It's hard to ask kids not to run around the street, you should ask them to stay as far away from people outside of your household, to continue to do social distancing even outside."
- Don't share props, toys or bowls. Keep the words, wands and tiaras from being passed around if you can.
- Ask each of your children to hold onto their own candy bags.
- Bring hand sanitizer, and practice not touching your face. "It's always good to take a break, do a check in and give kids some hand sanitizer to clean their hands between multiple homes.
- This is also an opportunity to give kids a break from wearing a mask if they need it, in a safe spot away from others where they can remove their face mask while cleaning their hands
