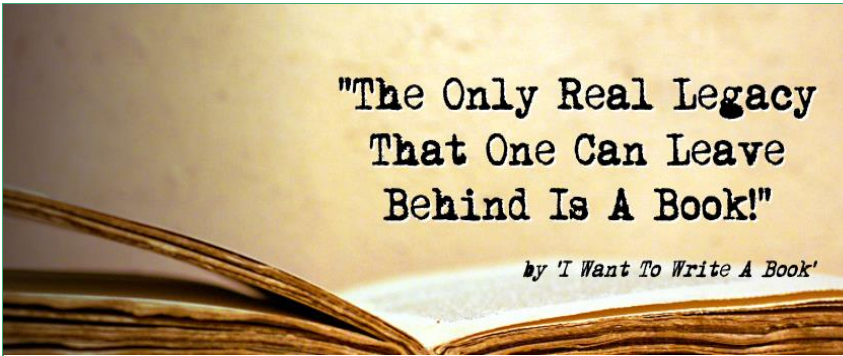

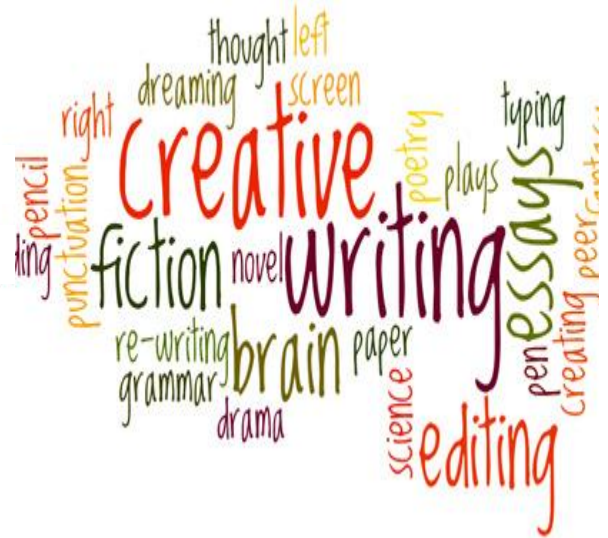
SUGGESTED BOOK FOR THE ADMINISTRATORS:
