IMPORTANT DHEC GUIDELINES FOR CLOSE CONTACTS

Anyone who lives in a home with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19 is considered a close contact. If you have been identified as a close contact, you should quarantine at home for a full 14 days...children should not attend school in person during those 14 days. They will ZOOM in with the other Hybrid Students. DHEC does recommend that if you are a close contact you get tested 7 days after your last contact with the infected person. Please inform Nurse Stickle if someone in the home has tested positive, and your child needs to quarantine at home. Literacy at Home: What can we do?

As students are working on assignments from home, here are several tips to make school work from home be a little easier:

Keep it varied. It is a bad idea to expect your child to spend large amounts of time doing anything or any type of thing. If one school assignment requires reading, then follow that with something very different—math problems, discussion, or some activity involving movement. Remember to take breaks.

Keep it reflective. Kids often hurry through their work, just trying to get it done. But that reduces the chances of learning. When they think they are done, get them to take a moment to think about it – what they learned or what they are able to do now as a result. If they have just read a chapter and slammed the book shut thinking its sandwich time, talk to them and ask them to summarize what they have read or done before taking a break.

Keep it literate. Whether there is a school assignment or not, your kids should **read and write and talk** about what they read and about assignments they complete. This is so important. Talk to your child(ren) about their assignments.

gifted & talented Referral Process

The Gifted and Talented Referral procedures ensure students who have demonstrated ability or potential for high performance in academic areas will have access to the Gifted and Talented Program. In accordance with R 43-220, Dorchester District Four's procedures allow for referrals from administrators, parents, teachers, and the students themselves. The Gifted and Talented Referral Window is now open. Forms are available at each school and on each school's website. Forms can either be mailed or taken to the District Office by the end of the day on November 13, 2020.



All second graders in South Carolina take the CoGAT and ITBS Tests, and our students will take ITBS November 4-5.

- Have your child at school on time each day of testing, so they can test in a familiar setting.
- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and eats a healthy breakfast.
- Make your conversation about the testing positive.
