All students - Boys and Girls

Dress code consists of a white, navy blue, or red top with a collar, dark blue, black or khaki uniform bottoms (NO JEANS ARE PERMITTED), and dark belt if bottoms with loops are worn. Bottoms consist of pants, skirts, shorts, jumpers, or skorts.

Pants must be neat, clean and fit properly. <u>SAGGING</u>
PANTS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED. BELTS MUST
BE WORN AT ALL TIMES.

The length of skirts, shorts, jumpers and skorts must be no shorter than the end of the fingertip when standing and arms are down at the side. Shirttails and blouses must be tucked in when they are so designated.

Writing on tops is limited to school logo and/or name. T-shirts worn underneath tops must be white and have no writing on them. Reasonable cleanliness of both person and clothing is required. Hair must be kept clean and combed. Shoes must be worn at all times. It is recommended that for health reasons, socks or stockings be worn with shoes.

We encourage children to bring a jacket or sweater to wear inside the classrooms when they are too cool from either the airconditioning or changing weather.

Practical Parenting... "Homework"

The following suggestions are **HELP**FUL ways that you can

support your child with homework:

Be Available. Be near enough to simplify directions and answer questions that may arise.

Don't be too helpful. Give them support, praise and encouragement. Don't do it for them.

Encourage an "I can do it" attitude. Praise their effort for trying when they have done work well. Don't be TOO critical when they are struggling. Still praise them for sticking with it and continuing to try.

Take the FEAR out. When mis-

takes are made, FOCUS on what can be learned from them. Reassure them that making mistakes is part of LEARNING.

Help them to see progress. Remind them of things that they used to have problems with and NOW they know. Share your excitement about their progress with them.

Help them to get ORGANIZED.

Put papers in correct folders, have necessary materials (pencils, paper, dictionary, etc.) near their work area, and be sure everything gets put into the backpack and placed by the door before going to bed. DE-CLUTTER backpacks and work areas weekly.

Set a Timer to keep them on task. Together, estimate how long an assignment should take, set the time, and see if they can get it completed within the goal time. Challenge them to "beat the clock." This can help keep them focused and working.

Plan for break times. Break times should be brief and purposeful... restroom, a snack, or quick exercise.

Lastly, be sure your child gets plenty of sleep, well-balanced meals and lots of fresh air and physical exercise.

Don't forget to enjoy HOME-WORK... as Special time that you share with your child helping them to Learn.
