Begin with a topic sentence that identifies <u>one</u> conflict and that states whether it is internal or external. Provide specific details that <u>describe the conflict</u>, identify the characters involved, and explain its importance to the story. Explain whether or not the conflict is resolved. End with a well-written conclusion sentence.
