Ms. Valerie Barnwell! Ms. Barnwell has been teaching students diagnosed with severe and profound intellectual disabilities for six years. She earned a Bachelor's degree from Middle Georgia State University and a Master's degree from Georgia College and State University. Last

school year, Ms. Barnwell also completed the Teacher Support and Coaching Endorsement to allow her to mentor other teachers. Ms. Barnwell's love and dedication to her students is apparent when you visit her classroom. She individualizes activities to meet their cognitive and physical needs. She incorporates preferred items into instruction in order to engage her students. She often refers to her students as, "the most amazing kids ever." When asked why she loved teaching, she stated "I love teaching because my work has a true purpose. I strive each day to be the teacher that helps my students to see all of their abilities." When she is not teaching, Ms. Barnwell is spending time with her family and two dogs.

LITERACY



n December 11th and 12th, the Houston County Student Services Department, in partnership with The Georgia Department of Education Language and Literacy Initiative, provided Foundations for Literacy professional learning. Foundations for Literacy is a one-of-a-kind, evidence-based intervention, designed specifically for preschool and kindergarten-aged children who are deaf or hard of hearing (DHH). Classroom teachers typically implement Foundations for Literacy four hours per week. Targeted learning objectives included: vocabulary, narrative skills, alphabetic knowledge, phonological awareness, reading decodable words, and reading short connected text. Each instructional lesson includes strategies for differentiating instruction while incorporating multi-sensory, age-appropriate activities. Teachers will begin implementing the Foundations for Literacy program in January 2020.
