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Track Tricks

On Wednesday, April 10, the Calhoun Eagles traveled to Preston to compete in the Skyline Invitational. Senior Tylar White placed 4th in the 400 with a time of 1:06.37. She also competed in the 100 meter dash and the Long Jump. Freshman Autumn Rusche run the 300 meter hurdles in 1:06 and also competed in the 100 meter dash. The Lady Eagles finished 13th overall, out of 17 schools in the Knob Noster Invitational

Track meet with only two team members (Tylar White + Autumn Rusche). Tylar finished 5th in the 100 meter dash with a time of 14.25, while Autumn finished 15th with a time of 14.97. Autumn also competed in the 300 meter low hurdles with a time of 59.69 and run the 200 meter dash in 31.59. Tylar White finished 8th in the 400 meter with a time of 1:06.35.

Geography Wizard

Geography Bee school winners must take a geographic knowledge test. If the school winners score high enough on that test, they qualify to participate at the state level. If you can think about how many schools there are in Missouri, and each school has a Geography Bee, and each of those school winners takes the test to qualify for the state competition, the odds of scoring high enough to meet the qualifying

threshold is low. Andrew Knecht was one of the students selected to participate on March 29, at the University of Missouri. He ended up tied for 11th place out of 103 students in total, which is a fantastic result. Members of the middle school scholar bowl team tagged along to Columbia to cheer him on, and everyone had a great time visiting the campus of Mizzou.
