Happy New Year, SJOG Volunteers!

For this month's issue I thought I'd switch it up a little for my monthly article. For those of you who do not know, I received my bachelor's degree in International Studies from the University of Scranton in Pennsylvania. It is a private school that is affiliated with the Society of Jesus (commonly known as the Jesuits). Their founder St. Ignatius Loyola is particularly known for creating the examen or "examination of conscience" in which an individual reflects upon their day (for about thirty minutes or so) using a list of questions to see where God made Himself present. It's a way for people to "notice, be grateful, and experience the desire for change" (Martin, 2019). Though it's encouraged to undergo this experience every day a particularly well-known (and locally raised) Jesuit named Fr. James Martin, S.J. recently posted an article in America magazine (December 30, 2019) suggesting that an examen can be a great exercise when reflecting upon the previous year- which many people tend to do around New Year's Eve.
