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PERFECTING THE CRAFT...

Setting high academic expectations has proven to improve student achievement. So, what is one way champion teachers demonstrate high expectations in their classrooms?

- **No Opt Out Techniques-** Everyone learns in a classroom with high expectations that it is not okay not to try. At its core is the belief that a sequence beginning with a student unable (or unwilling) to answer a question should end with that student giving the right answer as often as possible, even if it is only to repeat the correct answer.
- **Simple Example:** If you ask a student to locate the subject in a sentence and a student says "I dunno" You ask the class or another student "what is a subject." Once the question is clarified you ask the first student the same question again.. So without your stopping for a time-consuming and possible ineffective lecture, the student has learned he can't opt or not participate. He found out that he has to do the work in your class anyway.

This could also be applied to homework.....The whole premise of homework is to help students practice and learn the material. So, hold them accountable. Send them the message that it is not ok, not to do your work. Example: If you do a fun learning activity on Friday and they have an assignment that is not complete...they should complete the assignment before they earn the privilege of the fun activity.
