## Student Codes of Conduct

Every school district in Texas has adopted a Student Code of Conduct ("SCOC"), as required by Texas Education Code section 37.001. That document is the underlying authority for all student discipline; it has the force of policy and generally will control as the more recently approved rule in the event that the SCOC is in conflict with any previously adopted Board policy.

With 2015 being a legislative year, there are bound to be some changes to the SCOC, though at this point, we do not know what those will be. Boards should expect to be reviewing and approving changes to the SCOC in July, perhaps early August.

Schools continue to wrestle with the "bullying" issues that seem to be inevitably tangled up in social media, cell phones, email, Twitter, Facebook, and the like. The legal die seems to be cast that the Tinker v. Des Moines Schools "reasonable forecast of disruption" standard is being applied in disputes over discipline of students for "conduct" that occurs at the student's home or any other place outside the school's usual jurisdiction. Thus, schools will not have responsibility or jurisdiction to discipline students for that out-of-school "cyberbullying" unless the district can show that there was actual disruption at school or that there was a reasonable basis for administrators to think there would be such disruption outside of school.

Students get more creative every year in coming up with conduct that no one would have imagined should be addressed in a disciplinary code. Whether the district uses the Eichelbaum Wardell Hansen Powell & Mehl, P.C. model Student Code of Conduct or another model, it is important that the district have its Student Code of Conduct legally reviewed each year for compliance with the requirements of Tex. Educ. Code, Ch. 37, and any changes in the law. Student discipline has always been a hotbed of litigation, and a district's Code of Conduct will be a prime evidentiary source in the event that its disciplinary policies are ever challenged.
