

## Economics Advisement 2020

### School-Based Dual Enrollment (DE) Economics

- This is a one-semester DE course offered by Central Georgia Technical College (CGTC) on the high school campus. Successful completion of this course will result in 1.0 unit of credit on the high school transcript. Students who attend a college within the University System of Georgia will receive college credit for Economics and the grade will become a part of their college transcript and GPA. If a student chooses to attend a college outside the university system of Georgia, they may receive credit.
  - Students in this course have a minimum PSAT score of Reading 17, Writing 17, Math 21 OR a Core GPA of 2.6 after 10<sup>th</sup> grade.
  - Drop/Add dates do not apply to this course. Students are required to remain in the course for the full semester.
  - High school Economics teachers will serve as adjunct professors and teach the DE course within the regular school day.
  - The college-level course will require a higher degree of independent responsibility and accountability.
  - The highest grade that can post on the high school transcript is 100.
  - This course counts as a rigor course for HOPE.
  - Grading weights will be set by CGTC. The grades in this course will be viewable through Infinite Campus.
  - This course has a final exam instead of an End of Course (EOC) test. Final exam exemption does not apply to this course.
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### Economics – High School Version

- Students that do not meet the requirements for the DE Economics course will be registered for the Georgia Standards of Excellence Economics course.
  - This is a one-semester course that will result in 0.5 unit of credit on the high school transcript.
  - The Economics End of Course (EOC) test is required and counts for 20% of the overall class average.
  - The highest grade that can be posted on the high school transcript is 100.
  - Students are eligible for final exam exemption if they meet all requirements as listed in the student handbook.
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### Advanced Placement Economics

- Students may pre-register for AP classes prior to evening advisement. Documents are in the Counselors' office.
  - AP Macroeconomics and AP Microeconomics are yearlong courses.
  - Students earn 0.5 units of credit each semester for a total of 1.0 units of credit in Economics.
  - Students may earn college credit by achieving a qualifying score on the AP exam in the spring.
  - Students do not take the End of Course (EOC) test if they are in the AP Macroeconomics or AP Microeconomics course.
  - Students receive five quality points added to their class average; therefore, the maximum grade that can be posted to the high school transcript is 105.
  - Course work may be more rigorous and challenging than the Georgia Standards of Excellence Economics course and will require a higher degree of independent responsibility and accountability.
  - This course counts as a rigor course for HOPE.
  - Students are eligible for final exam exemption if they meet all requirements as listed in the student handbook.
