Project LIT member Rachel Pierce said, "I loved the book, and I felt like I learned a lot from it. It really opened my eyes to racism back then and today. Even though in the book apartheid ended it never truly did because people are still judged by the color of their skin. The book held my interest the entire time, and I would 100% recommend it to anyone."

Anyone is welcome to join Project LIT. The meeting this month was cheerful, warm, and friendly. October's book is Dear Martin, a story about a young man who finds himself the victim of racial profiling. Books are available to check out from the library.

VOLUNTEER TO MAKE A FURRY FRIEND BY JADEN FRAME

The Henderson Animal Shelter is actually a city pound, not a true shelter. It is run by one city employee and a few volunteers. There are only 5 kennels/runs. They used to be a high-kill shelter but due to volunteers working hard to find homes, they rarely (if ever) have to euthanize an animal. Current adoption fees are \$37, but if a dog is spayed or neutered within 30 days of adoption, there is a \$25 refund.

Janice Morris is a local volunteer who also runs the "Friends of Henderson of City Animal Control" page on Facebook. This page is where pictures are posted of available dogs, which allows people to share and assist with adoption. Over the past few years, local residents have pushed for improvements to the pound since it is very small and limited on resources. She says that change is on the way. "There are LOTS of improvements coming. We've gotten a new room air conditioner and a new hot water heater was donated and installed. A fencing company has been by to estimate for building a large play/meet-and-greet area for the dogs. Plans are to repair or replace the five kennel runs and install flap strips to cover the entry from outside kennel to inside. The roof will be examined and possibly replaced with a metal roof. The building will be pressured washed in preparation for painting inside and out. Plans are to also add a mural to provide a bit of curb appeal. We are hoping that all of this can be accomplished before weather becomes an issue, if not it will be finished as soon as possible next spring."

For those who are interested in volunteering, there are opportunities. Morris said, "We have volunteers to help walk the dogs and socialize them. In summer months, we walk early mornings due to heat. Currently we are walking about 10 AM and as winter approaches, it will be around noon or 1 PM." She said if any students would like to volunteer walking, cleaning, or socializing the dogs after school, arrangements can be made. 




INCEPTION (2010) BY DEVIN AUSTIN

BB'S BISCUITS BY ANNA HOWELL

My great-grandmother Mary Dell Gilchrist ("BB") was raised on these biscuits. Her mother, Inez Connor, made biscuits from scratch for my BB and her 11 other siblinge every morning. At that time there were no frozen or canned biscuits, and even if there were, they wouldn't have been able to afford it. My BB learned from simply watching her mother make them over the years and started making these biscuits on her own when she married in 1956.

Ingredients

- ½ 5 lb bag White Lily self rising flour
- 1/8 cup solid shortening
- 1/3 cup whole milk
- Clean Vienna sausage can with holes poked in top (for best results but a biscuit cutter will do, too)

Preheat oven to 500 and place 8x8 cast iron pan in oven to heat.

Sift flour into a large bowl (note: you won't use all of this flour but it's necessary to do this step). Make a 1-inch deep, 4-inch wide crater in center of flour in bowl. Place shortening in crater. Pour milk gradually while mixing the shortening and flour by hand. Don't stir in all the flour, just enough to get it slightly softer than playdough.

Place on a dough board that has been sprinkled with dry flour. (brown paper sack can be used in place of dough board). Shape dough into a round balls.

Remove pan from oven and carefully grease with shortening. Roll out dough $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch thick.

Cut out biscuits with can. Dip can in flour from time to time. Bake biscuits in pan on the middle rack for 8-10 minutes or until brown. Enjoy with a cold glass of milk!

ARE SCHOOLS TRULY PREPARING STUDENTS?


