<u>3rd Grade Reading Requirement:</u> Continued reading over the summer will help children maintain their reading levels and promote vocabulary growth. Students should read at least two novels over the summer. In addition, students should read other short texts.

Each student must turn in a Book in the Box project (see back for requirements) when school begins for the 2020-2021 academic year. Book reports are due on the second day of school. Students will receive a reading grade and a speaking and listening language grade for the project. The book <u>must</u> be a chapter book and students should be prepared to take an AR test on the chosen book. <u>Students do not have to bring the book to school</u>. Books do not have to be on the suggested reading list. However, books not on the list must have an AR level no lower than 2.5.

## Summer Book in a Box Project

- Be sure to include the title of the book on the box, as well as your name.
- Find at least <u>eight</u> objects that represent the important parts of the book. You can use pictures if the object(s) you want to use are too big to fit inside the box.
- For each object, make a note card that includes the name of the object at the top and a <u>detailed</u> paragraph about how the object is an important part of the book.

## Tips for success

- $\checkmark$  As you read the book, keep a list of ideas for objects that you might want to use.
- ✓ If you use pictures, glue them onto cardboard backings to make them more durable and appealing.
- $\checkmark$  Try to find at least one object for each chapter of the book.

- Practice subtracting whole numbers (up to 3 digits) with and without regrouping.
- Practice adding numbers with multi-digits with and without regrouping.
- At the end of second quarter, we will begin learning multiplication facts 0-9. Starting third quarter fact drills will be multiplication facts.
