Course Name: English

Length of Course: Two semesters

Grade Level: 7

Course Description

The first semester of English 7 will include a study of the elements of fiction, nonfiction, and poetry. Students will also study basic grammar and usage, including subject and predicate, parts of speech, and subject-verb agreement. Students will write two compositions and two poems using the NCREL 6 Traits as a guide and assessment. Spelling and vocabulary will be studied on a weekly basis, and daily work will include Daily Oral Language, discussion, and note taking. As a class, students will read and discuss one novel, <u>The Outsiders</u>, and as independent work, students will be required to read and test on three Accelerated Reader books, as well as fulfill an independent reading contract.

For the second semester of English 7, students will continue to study grammar with a focus on punctuation and capitalization. Using the 6 Traits, students will write two more compositions. Weekly work will continue on spelling and vocabulary, as will daily work on Daily Oral Language, discussion, and note taking. There will be more work on fiction, with a focus on drama. Independent work will again consist of reading and testing on three Accelerated Reader books, as well as fulfilling an independent reading contract. As a class, students will also read and discuss one more novel, <u>Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry</u>.

Essential Learner Outcomes

*Students will be able to first summarize, then analyze and interpret a variety of literature from diverse cultures through understanding its elements, vocabulary, and structure, while supporting their ideas with cited evidence.

*Students will be able to summarize, analyze, compare and contrast, and evaluate the arguments within a variety of informational texts through an understanding of explicit and inferential information and the development of central ideas, while demonstrating knowledge of vocabulary, structure, and author's point of view.

*Students will be able to construct well-supported arguments, informative texts, and creative texts. Students will also conduct short research projects using evidence from multiple sources.

*Students will be able to cooperate and engage effectively in collaborative discussions, analyze and understand speakers' arguments in various formats, and use this knowledge to present information verbally and through multimedia work to an intended audience.

*Students will be able to effectively use proper English grammar, capitalization, punctuation, and spelling in written and verbal communication. Students will build vocabulary and an understanding of figurative language and word relationships.
