Reading strategies were multi-sensory and hands on games that are easy and fun for all family members. Preschool and VPK families learned about letter recognition, letter sounds, and sight words. Kindergarten through 2nd grade families learned about high frequency words, phonics, phonological awareness, reading comprehension information and literature and vocabulary. Students received free books and a chance to win a kindle with a \$25 gift card to buy books for the device. We had a wonderful turn out and appreciate all the support we received from each and every one of our families.

STEINHATCHEE SCHOOL

What is CTE? Career and Technical Education (CTE) is coursework that prepares secondary and postsecondary students with technical, academic and employability skills for success in the workplace and in further education. CTE provides students with real-world training that they need to enter high-wage, high-skill careers.

There are several benefits to CTE. Research shows that students in CTE programs have increased academic achievement, lower dropout rates and increased earning potential. Additionally, students have opportunities to earn industry certifications and licensures (at no cost). Many industry certifications earn high school credit (math and/or science), articulate (earn) college credit (saves money) and make students eligible for the Bright Futures CAPE Scholarship (pays 70% of cost of postsecondary CTE program).

Taylor County Schools offer 17 different career programs including exploratory courses in Agriculture, Business, Digital

Design and Health Science offered at TCMS. TCHS offers courses in Agriculture, Culinary Arts, Digital Design and Television Production Technology – and will offer new programs next year in Nursing and Finance. TCHS students can also dual enroll in many of the programs offered at Big Bend Technical College (BBTC) which include Diesel Maintenance Technician, Diesel Systems Technology 1, Electrical & Instrumentation 1 & 2., Electronic Technology 1, Massage Therapy, Medical Coder/Biller, Millwright 1 & 2, Patient Care Technician, Practical Nursing, Welding Technology and Welding Technology Advanced.

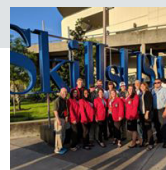
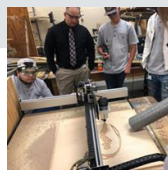

CTE – Education that WORKS!

The year is flying by at Steinhatchee School! Our students recently completed their mid-year I-Ready progress monitoring assessments. The results showed substantial growth from the beginning of the year for our students and reflects a similar trajectory to last year's successful outcome. 78% of students met their learning gain targets for Math and 75% met the learning gains target for ELA. The results are a testament to the hard work going on in our classrooms. Students who met 5 of 7 goals related to Attitude, Attendance, and Achievement attended a reward event before the break. Our Family Center was transformed into a cinema for the Goals Movie Theater produced by our Parent Involvement Team.

Steinhatchee students have also been active in extra-curricular activities. Many of our students performed for audiences during and after school with the return of the "Wholiday" Grinch play facilitated by the Stingray chapter of the Boy's and Girl's Club. Students received an additional opportunity to perform in the inaugural community-wide celebration of "The Greatest Gift", a collaborative effort between Character Education Now and our Parent Involvement Team, in the lead up to Christmas.

Our school was blessed to receive a \$2,000 grant from Wal-Mart recently. The funds will be used to upgrade our media center in order to provide a greater selection of books for our students. We are thrilled about the possibilities as students are given more opportunities to engage with literature. Stingrays are excited for the future at our growing school!

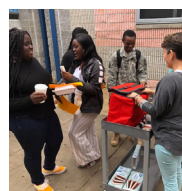

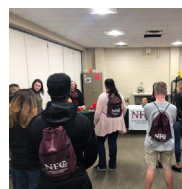
