Types of Gifted Students

Pleasant- teacher pleaser

Obnoxious Rebel- inappropriate behavior,
hates repetition

Underground gifted- hides giftedness to
appear “normal”

Dropout- angry at self and others,
frustrated and resentful

Handicapped- physical, emotional, or
learning disabled

Independent Self -Directed-
self-motivated, life-long learners

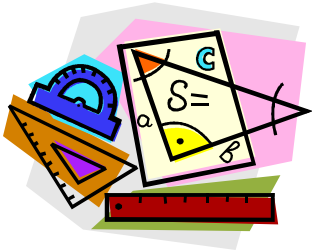

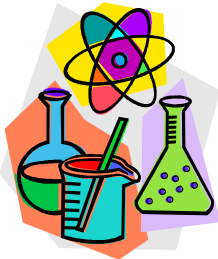

Intellectually gifted children are children who are found to have an exceptionally high degree of intelligence as documented through the identification process.



Students, who demonstrate high achievement, require a uniquely qualitatively differentiated educational program that is not available in the regular classroom. This program enables the gifted students to realize their potential contributions to self and society.



REFERRAL CRITERIA

Three of the following criteria must be met at the referral level before moving forward to the assessment level:

1. Group measure of intelligence (OTIS LENNON - OLSAT 90th% or above)
2. Published characteristics of giftedness measure (GIFTED RATING SCALE-GRS Total Quotient in Superior Range—84% or above)
3. Published measure of creativity (GIFTED RATING SCALE - GRS Creativity in Superior Range—84% or above)
4. Published measure of leadership (GIFTED RATING SCALE - GRS Leadership in Superior Range—84% or above)
5. Achievement test scores (individual or group) (i.e., WOODCOCK-JOHNSON-IV Total Reading, Total Math, Total Science, Total Social Studies at 90th percentile or Total Language or Composite Score at 90th percentile)
6. A score at or above the 90th% on a normed measure of cognitive abilities.
7. Existing measure of individual intelligence that has been administered within the past 12 months at or above 90th percentile.

Final Individual

Intelligence Criteria

A student must score at or above the 91st percentile (composite/full scale IQ of 120 (i.e., WNV, RIAS-2, etc.)

**Anyone may refer a child for gifted education.
