Learning & Thinking

The student...

- is willing to complete tasks and try new things.
- carries on a conversation using complete sentences.
- states full name, address, phone number, and birthday.
- shows an interest in books and reading.
- matches, recognizes, and names at least five colors.
- puts together simple puzzles.

Numbers & Counting

The student...

- identifies numbers 0-10.
- counts from 1-10 in the correct order. Encourage counting past 10.
- Counts at least 5 objects.
- Identifies basic shapes like circle, square, triangle, and rectangle.
- Identifies two and three dimensional objects.

Language Development

The student...

- carries on a conversation using complete sentences.
- identifies some letters in random order; including those in their name.
- names common things-has a good vocabulary. Talk to your child a lot by answering those "What's that" questions.
- says or sings familiar songs and nursery rhymes.
- recognizes when words rhyme, such as 'cat' and 'hat'.
- follows directions in a simple game with other children or adults.

Physical Development

The student...

- holds pencil, marker, crayon correctly.
- colors carefully by trying to stay in the lines.
- holds child-sized scissors correctly and has had experience cutting straight and curved lines.
- practices zipping, buttoning, snapping, and tying.



Social/Emotional Development

The student...

- takes care of own needs such as toileting, washing hands, and dressing.
- adjusts to new situations without parent being there.
- can share toys with other children and is willing to take turns.
- listens to an adult and follows directions.

To provide your child with the best start on their educational journey you can...

- take time each day to talk to your child about anything and everything.
- read to your child every day and talk about the story and /or details with them after.
- teach your child to recognize the colors.
- play shapes and sizes games with your child.
- have simple puzzles available.
- teach your child to make various patterns ie. red, blue, red, blue, etc.
- involve your child in activities and games that require listening and following directions.
- read and sing nursery rhymes with your child.
- support and encourage your child's independence with brushing teeth, washing hands, putting on shoes, buttoning and zipping clothes, riding a tricycle, and buckling their seatbelt.
- provide opportunities to play with other children.
- encourage work values such as effort, persistence, and initiative.
- encourage responsibility by having them pick up toys, care for belongings, and assist with simple chores.
- provide them with materials to draw, color, and write.

Dear Parents,

During the Kindergarten year, many terms will be used when referring to reading planning, instruction, and assessment. Here is an explanation of some of the words you may hear.

Phonological awareness- is a broad skill that includes identifying and manipulating units of oral language – parts such as words, syllables, and onsets and rimes.

Phonemic awareness-The ability to hear, identify, and manipulate the individual sounds in spoken words. (Example: hearing and making rhyming words)

Phoneme-The smallest part of spoken language that makes a difference in the meaning of words.

Letter Naming Fluency-Children quickly name letters that are in random order.


Phonics-The understanding that there is a relationship between letters and sounds.

Phoneme Blending-Children listen to a sequence of separately spoken phonemes (sounds), and they combine those phonemes (sounds) to form a word. Example: Parent or teacher says, "/d//o//g/". The child says "dog".

Phoneme Segmentation-Children break a word into its separate sounds, saying each sound as they tap out or count it. Example: Parent or teacher says: "cat". The child **says**, "/k//a//t/".


Nonsense Word Fluency-Given a number of nonsense words, such as "vaz", students produce the letter-sounds or blend the sounds to make a word. Child may say, "vaz" or /v//a//z/.




I CAN COUNT TO 10






