Textbooks and Other Required Materials: Prentice-Hall *The British Tradition*; in lieu of purchasing our additional texts, students will pay a one-time \$10 book/resources fee to cover the costs of the additional texts and resources that are used in these higher-level classes. All enrolled students will pay this fee.

Course Purpose, Goals, and Objectives

Course Description/Information: A further study of written English and practice in composition. Readings and research writing with documentation. Predominantly a skills course. Students must complete ENGL 110 or 111 and 112 in sequence. In order to complete the university's General Education curriculum Communication requirement, students must complete ENGL 112 with a grade of C or higher.

General Course Objectives: This course fulfills all of the learning outcomes of the General Education curriculum's Communication requirement. The purpose of the Communications requirement is to prepare students to communicate information, thoughts, and viewpoints through oral and written forms of expression.

Requirements/Expectations:

Requirements, Assessments, and Evaluations:

- Be here. Poor attendance and poor punctuality *will* affect your performance in this class. Expect make-up tests to be significantly more challenging. Excessive absences (more than three per trimester—approved school trips do not count) <u>WILL affect</u> your UTM grade: counting attendance in grading is standard college practice.
- Your UTM course grade may be different from your DHS grade. Your UTM grade will be weighted by this ratio: 25% Quizzes, Homework, Classwork, Tests; 50% Essay; 25% Final Exam (In-Class Essay)
- Grading scale: A=90-100; B=80-89; C=70-79; D=60-69; F=below 60

Major Assignments, Exams and Make-Up Work (names and due dates)

- We will write about 5 major essays, approximately every 2-3 weeks, depending on the time needed for review, remediation, and discussion. Most essays will be submitted online. The final exam, an in class essay, will be given the third week of April.
- We complete one research project in MLA8 format.
- Responsibility for make-up work lies with the student. ASSIGNMENTS MADE IN ADVANCE ARE DUE
 ON THE DUE DATE. SEND YOUR WORK BY ANOTHER STUDENT BY THE BEGINNING OF THE
 HOUR IT IS DUE OR HAVE SOMEONE TO PLACE IT IN MY MAILBOX BY THE BEGINNING OF
 THE HOUR IT IS DUE.
- **Tests** missed must be made up within one week following the absence. Tests made up after that time will have a grade penalty. **Other work** missed must be given to me within the same number of school days as you have missed. Example: If you are out two days, you have two days to turn in make-up work.
- Late homework must be turned in to me within 24 hours and will ONLY receive ½ credit. For full credit for your work, do your work on time. Promptness is a life skill.
- I do not allow students to complete make-up work during our class hour. EVER.
- In cases for which I have only one make-up test version, I require that the test be completed at *a single agreed-upon time* and under my supervision with the others who missed the test.

Overview of Major Topics: Writing process, grammar and usage, essay structure, revising and editing, essay modes, documentation by MLA8 as well as major literary works from *Beowulf* through Shakespeare's *Macbeth*. Additional works, usually Aldous Huxley's *Brave New World* and Sophocles' *Oedipus*, trans. J.E. Thomas.

Student Learning Outcomes: The learning outcomes listed below for ENGL 112 are observed in all sections. Instructors pursue these requirements through a variety of approaches. Individual instructor syllabi, which document how these outcomes are met, are on file in the English department office.

Students in all sections of ENGL 112 will demonstrate the ability to:

- A. Further develop a variety of discourses that make up expository writing (e.g., narration, causal analysis, comparison, argumentation); demonstrate writing abilities from process to product*; and distinguish among opinions, facts, and inferences, which is the heart of research writing. [Learning Outcomes for Communication (LOC) 4]
- B. Articulate a primary idea—a single, compelling thesis in a logical and convincing manner, in a process that involves reading, writing, and revising through which students discover ideas and develop those ideas into coherent sentences, paragraphs, and essays using standard American edited English diction, syntax, usage, grammar, and mechanics. [LOC 3]
- C. Write in a variety of situations, including special functions they are likely to encounter in other classes (e.g., journals, timed essays/exams, out-of-class writing), and those that involve writing beyond the university experience. [LOC 1]
- D. Analyze and evaluate written expressions in multiple sources (e.g., essay, fiction, film, hypertext, poetry, and drama) and use these texts, particularly drama and poetry, as a basis for analysis, reflection, and writing. [LOC 1]
- E. Analyze and evaluate written expression by listening and reading critically for elements that reflect an awareness of situation, audience, purpose, and diverse points of view through explorations of style, organization, logic, rhetoric, and grammar. [LOC 1]
- F. Synthesize and organize into a piece of writing information gathered from multiple sources including those available through the university library. The research project component allows students to demonstrate these research skills. [LOC 2]

^{*}The writing process includes planning, organizing, composing, revising, editing, and presenting.

Grading Procedures: Students will produce a minimum of five writing projects. At least one of these writing projects must be a documented research paper that students have revised at least once. By the end of the semester, each student will have produced at least the equivalent of 15-24 typed double-spaced pages (approximately 5000-7500 words) of finished text. Individual instructors provide students with grading rubrics, and individual syllabi specify the weighting of each assignment. Individual instructors will return submitted text in a timely manner so students can learn and apply instructor feedback in required revisions or other tasks.

Signature Assessment for ENGL 112 for Communications Requirement: The required research paper in the course according to common assessment rubric.
