Local Methodists Set Youth Week

Perry Guardsmen in Parade At Stewart Before Governor

FORT STEWART, Ga.—For the 12th consecutive summer, tanks of the 48th Armored Division, Georgia Army National Guard, thundered over the Fort Stewart military reservation in annual training maneuvers.

The Guardsmen attending summer field training July 16 through July 30 include the 50 officers and men of the Company A, 1st Battalion, 108th Armor, Perry, which is commanded by Capt. Grant B. Heller.

Approximately 8,000 citizen-soldiers of the all-Georgia "Hurricane" Division have put aside the comforts of air-conditioned homes and offices to pursue a rugged military schedule.

The 48th Armored Division is composed of units from 65 widely scattered communities in Georgia. Its commanding general is Major General Benjamin F. Merritt, who in civilian life is the mayor of Macon. Assistant division commanders are Brigadier General Charles L. Davis, Savannah, and Brig. Gen. Roy W. Hogan, Macon.

Guardsmen are developing skills foreign to their back-home activities, including tank driving, infantry squad-and-platoon tactics, patrolling, reconnaissance and repair and maintenance of vehicles.

All units will spend a minimum of four days and nights in field bivouac during the two weeks' training. One 24-hour period will be completely tactical to include dispersion, camouflage, tactical feeding, field sanitation, personal hygiene, light and noise discipline and warning measures applicable to nuclear and chemical-biological-radiological warfare.

Each Guardsman will devote at least 88 hours to training in his military specialty. At the close of the encampment more than \$1.2 million pay and allowances will be distributed to members of the division.

In a highlight of the summer maneuvers, the massed brigades, battalions and separate units of the 48th Armored Division passed in review Saturday, July 22, before the state's National Guard Commander-in-Chief, Gov. Lester G. Maddox.

Parents: Return 'Choice' Forms

About one third of the Houston County parents who were asked to indicate their choices of schools for their children to attend still have not returned their "choice" forms.

Houston County school officials said they have received only about 10,000 of the 15,000 choice forms sent out to parents, leaving 5,000 forms still unreturned.

The forms were sent out by the Houston County Board of Education under orders of the Middle District Federal Court.

More integration of the schools is the aim of the court order.

The deadline for returning the choice forms is Aug. 1. Those received by the board after Aug. 1 will be placed at the bottom of the list when student assignments are made.

On Monday and Tuesday evenings there will be recreation, supper, study groups, and a closing worship led by the pastor, Rev. Billy Key.

On Wednesday night there will be a banquet, followed by a concert of folk music featuring Kent

Kilbourne and closing with a communion service. Kent Kilbourne, a junior at Asbury College in Wilmore, Ky., is spending this summer, as he has the last several, traveling with his guitar singing American Folk Music. One summer Kent worked with Ed Beck at Daytona Beach. Kent is the son of a fourth generation missionary family. He was born in Peking, China, and lived most of his life in Korea where his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Ed Kilbourne, are serving now.

Thursday will be spent at the Callaway Gardens and will end with a service in the lovely little Chapel in the Gardens.

Rev. Gene Strange, summer youth director, is in charge of the over-all plans for the week. He is being assisted by his wife, Joanne, the church staff and the Church School youth leaders and the many interested mothers who will be preparing the meals.

All the youth of the community are invited to join the Methodist young people for a week of fun, fellowship, and spiritual uplift. A registration fee of \$1 will be charged.

Tax Relief for Elderly Sought by Councilman

Councilman Richard Goodroe will go to Perry City Council for the fourth time tonight in an effort to pass a law cutting in half the ad valorem taxes of persons 65 and over on their homes and furnishings.

Mr. Goodroe said he seeks the 50 per cent reduction for persons 65 and older because they are suffering from inflation and cannot continue to pay higher taxes from fixed incomes, such as social security and pensions.

Mr. Goodroe estimates that the city would not lose more than \$3,500 a year and that this would be considerable relief for older persons who are living on small incomes. He proposes that the reduction would apply only to property owned and occupied by persons 65 and over.

"Keep People in Perry" His second reason for seeking the reduction is that the lower tax would keep more people living in Perry after they reach retirement age.

He calls attention to the fact that the City of Warner Robins eliminated ad valorem taxes on homes for persons 62 years and over. The officials of Warner Robins said they want to keep as many of the retiring persons living in that city instead of moving to another city with a lighter tax burden.

Mr. Goodroe said the officials of Warner Robins are pleased with the reaction of the people to the move to ease the tax burden.

The Councilman said he has brought his proposal before city council of Perry three times and his effort tonight will be his fourth attempt. He said the only argument he

has heard is that a "thorough study" had not been made. Mr. Goodroe said he has eliminated that argument by studying the tax books of the City of Perry and found that the city will not lose but \$3,500 in tax revenue by taking this step.

Must Make Application The city asked the taxpayers to report their ages when they returned taxes during 1967. He said these records show that only a small amount of revenue will be given up by the city. He said the tax reduction would be allowed only upon application for the reduction.

Mayor Richard B. Ray said that he is in favor of Mr. Goodroe's proposal but he feels that he and other members of city council have not had time to study the proposal to make a sound judgment. He said he feels that Mr. Goodroe has failed to get enough information on the effect his proposal would have on the city's revenue and that the city attorney has not ruled on whether the plan is in proper form.

Mayor Ray said he would ask Mr. Goodroe to furnish the following information to City Council tonight: the amount of property tax involved, the number of citizens affected, net revenue affected, and a statement from the city attorney concerning the legality of proposed legislation.

The 45-bed hospital will include 32,208 square feet. The lot on Morningside Drive is 1,000 feet by 871 feet.

The hospital will be operated by the Houston County Hospital, which has a 110-bed hospital at Warner Robins.

Austin Click, who retired recently at Robins Air Force Base, has been named assistant administrator of the Houston County Hospital at Warner Robins and will be the "clerk of the work" during the construction of the Perry-Houston Hospital.

Centerville School To Be Held Next Term In Shirley Hills Bldg.

The Houston County Board of Education has determined that the Centerville School will be organized for the 1966-67 school year and attend at the Shirley Hills Elementary School on double sessions with the Shirley Hills students attending the morning session and the Centerville students attending the afternoon session.

The Houston County Board of Education has defined the Centerville School area as follows: That area north of Sandy Run Creek and west of U. S. Highway 41 to the Peach County line. This line to run east along Sandy Run creek to the point where it crosses the Houston Lake-Centerville Road. This area will extend east on Crowder Leverette Road to Leverette's Store and will include Carter Woods.

It will include that area known as Knodishal Drive, Laurel Hills, Carter's Circle and south on Nelson Drive to the Bay Gall Branch thence west on Watson Boulevard and Centerville Road. This zone will also include that area in and around Elberta, Georgia west of the Southern Railroad along Dunbar Road and Story Road and extending north to the Bibb County line.

Perry School Buses

The Houston County Board of Education has further determined that for the school year 1966-67 the Perry School buses that served this area during the 1965-66 school year will be routed over the same routes as last school term and those students and only those students who attended the Perry School during 1965-66 school year will be permitted to attend the Perry Schools during the 1966-67 school year with the understanding that beginning with the school year 1967-68, when the new Centerville Elementary School will be completed, all students living in the Centerville School zone will attend the Centerville Elementary School, Tabor Junior High School and Northside High School with the exception of those students who have been attending Perry High School, and will be seniors during the 1967-68 school year will be permitted to attend Perry High School and graduate with that class of 1968 provided they furnish

their own transportation to and from Perry High School. Additional information concerning the time for the double sessions at Shirley Hills School will be published in next week's paper.

Information on all other school zones will also be published in next week's paper.
