
#### **Registration and Scheduling**

#### Welcome to School Breakfast and School Lunch

Back to school also means back to school breakfast and lunch. We asked Mrs. Sandra Sullivan, Food and Nutrition Services Director, to provide an overview of this year's program:

Our friendly Food Service staff members are looking forward to serving your children healthy, well balanced meals and providing them with the nutrition they need to succeed in school.

Daily Breakfast Menu

Breakfast is available to all students every morning before school. The cost is \$1.40 for grades K-5, \$1.75 for grades 6-12, 30 cents for reduced students and no charge for free students. Cereal, muffins, juice, fruit and milk are just some of the selections.



There is a wide variety of lunch choices daily, ranging from a hot meal or cold meal, to salads and sandwiches. Meals are a great value and convenient for busy families. Students are offered a selection of low fat and fat free milk, colorful portions of fresh fruits and vegetables and a variety of whole grains and lean proteins. The cost is \$2.35 for grades K-5 and \$2.60/\$3.10 for grades 6-12, 40 cents for reduced students and no charge

for free students. Our full menus can be viewed on the New Milford Public Schools' district website under the Food and Nutrition Services tab.

A la carte snacks are also available for purchase. All snacks meet strict nutrition guidelines. Choices can include muffins, fruit, yogurt, baked chips, popcorn, frozen desserts or a whole grain cookie. If you have concerns about your child's purchases, please call the cafeteria to discuss how limits may be placed on their account. Concerned about allergies?? Labels of all the food we serve are readily available for viewing.

For your convenience an easy online payment system is offered to fund and view your student's meal account at <a href="MySchoolBucks.com">MySchoolBucks.com</a>. Payments can also be made with cash or a check in the cafeteria. Additional information can be found on the district website under the Food and Nutrition Services tab. Information regarding Free and Reduced Lunch will be distributed to all students in August and can be accessed on the <a href="district website">district website</a> as well.

#### **Interested in Volunteering?**

The Board of Education recognizes that volunteers can make many valuable contributions to our schools. The Board supports a volunteer program that encourages community residents to take an active role to become school volunteers subject to suitable regulations and safeguards.

The New Milford Public Schools recognizes that just about any volunteer situation may result in direct contact with students. Our obligation to take appropriate measures to keep our children safe is one of our primary concerns. We require criminal history checks, at no cost to you, of all adults who wish to act as volunteers in our schools or chaperones on our field trips.

In order to volunteer, whether in the classroom, school or on a field trip, it is necessary for you to be fingerprinted. This takes place through the district's Human Resources department. Fingerprinting dates will be made available through the school office once school begins and will also be posted on the district website.

If you have already been fingerprinted and have volunteered each year, it is not necessary for you to be fingerprinted again. You will still need to sign up with your child's teacher at the beginning of the school year.

If you have never volunteered before, or have not done so annually, fingerprinting will be necessary. You will need to sign up with your child's teacher at the beginning of the school year and will subsequently receive information about fingerprinting. It is recommended that you sign up earlier rather than later in the year to ensure that you will be able to be fingerprinted in time for the event/activity for which you may be interested in volunteering during the year.

More information will be given to you by the schools. We look forward to having you as a volunteer.

#### NMPS Teachers Prep for the New School Year



Get to know all of New Milford Public Schools' new staff in next month's issue of *Spotlight*.

As the final few days of summer wind down and students are enjoying their last little bit of time in the sun, our district's teachers are hard at work preparing for the first days of school. Assistant Superintendent Alisha DiCorpo says "The 2016-17 school year starts extra early for teachers new to the district who will be welcomed to New Milford during New Teacher Orientation on August 23th and August 24th. During the orientation, new teachers will learn about the district's curriculum, meet with administrators and fellow

teachers and will have the opportunity to learn about the systems in place and the support they will have throughout their first year."

August 25th is the first day back for all teachers and they will spend it settling in and making sure they are ready for students' return. They'll also be busy on August 26th and 29th, attending staff meetings and the annual all district convocation, as well as welcoming students and parents to open house activities.

On August 29th and 30th, all teachers from across the district will come together to take part in a series of professional learning opportunities tied to the work of teaching and learning. Teachers will meet with their grade level teams and departments to review curriculum, engage in discussion around student work and to look at data to determine next steps for instruction.





In addition, each afternoon, teachers will take part in four, thirty-minute sessions called "Ed Camps". These learning sessions are created by teachers for teachers and are on the cutting edge of professional development in education.

During the two days, each teacher will be provided with a menu of options from which to choose sessions to attend.

Ms. DiCorpo says that "Teachers from different schools will work together on topics

such as technology integration, Writer's Workshop preparation, review of new curriculum, developing math routines and number talks, and data analysis, just to name a few. With just over 135 sessions to choose from over the two days, teachers will leave the sessions feeling prepared and excited to return to the work they love, teaching the students of New Milford."



#### Working Hard to Get Ready

Each summer, the New Milford Public Schools Facilities Department works diligently to make sure our buildings are ready for the return of students and staff in August. Facilities Manager Kevin Munrett says there are a multitude of projects going on at each building. The department receives cooperation from administrators and staff and works around the summer activities of the schools and community.

There are some projects that happen every summer. District wide, all floors are re-waxed, all carpets shampooed, restrooms sanitized, and walls and other surfaces cleaned. The department sands and recoats every wood gymnasium floor, and seals the synthetic gym floors throughout the district, as well as inspects and services all gym partition doors.

Workers pump, inspect and dispose of waste from every septic and grease tank at each of our facilities that have such



tanks. All fire extinguishers, fire alarms, emergency lights and fire suppression systems are inspected and repaired as needed. All kitchen ductwork and hood systems in every kitchen in the district are cleaned and inspected. The staff cleans, services and repairs all boilers, burners and hot water heaters in every Board of Education building. And, of course, there is always mowing!

Our custodians and maintainers also tackle the myriad of work requests which are submitted by staff members as needed, everything from painting to small repairs - the types of things that may be required in any household, especially one as big as NMPS!

This summer the Facilities staff were very busy with school specific projects as well:



At HPS the crew completed the final pieces of relocating the greenhouse from JPS and are happy to report it is fully functional for use in the fall.

At NES the crew installed ceiling fans in six rooms for additional cooling as needed.

At SNIS the rear student entrance "catwalk" has deteriorated over time and is in the process of being replaced this summer.

At SMS several projects are ongoing including a major roof replacement. It is expected that one layer of roofing will be fully in place before the start of school. In addition, the facing has been painted hunter green for contrast. The art rooms are having new sinks and lighting installed. The main office is getting a new intercom system so that multiple desks may activate the front door buzzer as needed. Cooling units are being installed to protect the district's investment in our computer lab and servers.



At NMHS the hallways, bathrooms and staircases are being painted. A new art kiln is being installed. Projects are taking place on both chillers. Entrance doors and hardware are being replaced to allow for increased handicap accessibility. Crews are working on additional wiring to support Project Lead the Way classrooms, the Video Production classroom, and the LMC.

The community's Turf Field project is almost complete and the Facilities staff has received training on proper maintenance prior to the highly anticipated opening of the fields and track. The district has installed walkways and curbing to the fields for handicap accessibility. A lighting ceremony took place on July 22nd at dusk when the lights were turned on for the first time publicly. The district will celebrate the facilities' official opening for the 2016-17 school year with a formal dedication ceremony on Thursday, September 8th. Details to follow.









As summer draws to a close, the Facilities staff will continue to put the finishing touches to each building going forward so all are ready and welcoming for the return of both staff and students alike.

## Transitioning from Summer to Back to School Routine
