







#### Fourth graders learn how Earth's rotation affects day and night

Mrs. Hewitt's fourth grade science students have been studying how the Earth's rotation affects day and night. During this lesson, the students used a globe and a lamp to see how the Earth's rotation causes day and night, and how places move in and out of the light (sunrise and sunset).

Using the knowledge gained, they later created day and night picture books **like the one below**.



Left to right, Caleb Breaux, Shuler Apgar, and Mo'Reece Singleton investigate how the rotation of the Earth creates day and night.




Left to right, La'Nayshia Clemons, Aubrey Faust, and Paige Ulmer investigate how sunrise and sunset arrive as the Earth rotates.
