Horseshoe Crabs and CTAE

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

- (3) **speakers bureau** established by Robins Regional Chamber of Commerce to be used as guest speakers for class and soft skills seminars
- (4) **work-based learning opportunities** where students are released part of the school day to report to work while they earn course credit, money, and work-experience

Chief Miller has been named the 2013-2014 Georgia AFA *Teacher of the Year* and Daughtry won *Outstanding Air Force Junior ROTC Cadet of the Year*. They will be recognized during a State Awards Luncheon held at 11:30 a.m. at the Landings Golf Course Clubhouse.

Both honorees were nominated for the state awards after winning the Carl Vinson Memorial Chapter 296 awards. They are pictured with Veterans High Principal Dr. Lionel Brown during the local awards ceremony.

The AFA Teacher of the Year award recognizes classroom teachers for their accomplishments and achievements in exciting students about science and math and preparing them to use and contribute to tomorrow's technologies. This award recognizes teachers who are furthering excellence and making class an adventure. Chief Miller was nominated by Lt. Col. (Ret.) Steve Atkins, Veterans High senior aerospace science instructor.

CMSgt Miller is the Veterans High aerospace science instructor. She retired from the U.S. Air Force in 2008 where she served as an aircraft maintenance manager. A graduate of Albert Sidney Johnston High School in Austin, Texas, she earned a BA in Business Administration from Wayland Baptist University and an MA in Management from Webster University.

Cadet Daughtry graduated with the Class of 2014 and will soon begin nursing school at Georgia State University in Atlanta. She was awarded an Army ROTC three-year scholarship. She was also nominated for the AFA award by Lt. Col. Atkins, her instructor. The Cadet of the Year displays: leadership characteristics which may lead to future positions of responsibility; a positive attitude toward training and all areas of school life; pride in personal appearance and wear of the uniform; personal initiative, judgment, and self-confidence; courtesy, promptness, obedience, and respect for customs; growth potential, capacity for responsibility, high productivity, adaptability to change, the highest personal and ethical standards and strong personal convictions.

Courtney O'Brien and Madeline Pilkey competed in the Chapter in Review Display and received a silver medal in the event. Dana Peck competed in the Interpersonal Communications Project and received a bronze medal in the event. 





BMS FCCLA Recognized by State School Superintendent




Adult Computer Classes Offered
