19 A. Campbell, School Business Administrator/Board Secretary.

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39 **2. DISCUSSION 2012-2013 SCHOOL BUDGET**

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41 ***Jason Murschell said the 2012-2013 has been approved for submission to the***  
42 ***County Office at the last meeting and it was approved today.***  
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1 **3. PUBLIC – AGENDA/NON-AGENDA ITEMS:**  
2

3 This is the time when anyone from the public who wishes to speak to the Board  
4 may do so. Please state your name, address and phone number. The Board will  
5 hear you concerns. The Board may or may not take action this evening. You will  
6 be notified either at this meeting, by letter, or telephone of any action the Board  
7 does take.  
8

9 **Michelle Pandolfo**, 251 Marshall Avenue, Gibbstown, has questions about the  
10 budget that was submitted to the County Superintendent. Under student  
11 instruction, she saw a \$108,000.00 cut in regular programs and would like to  
12 know what that entails and how Mr. Murschell understands those cuts to be? **Mr.**  
13 **Murschell** said the Business Administrator and the Budget & Finance Committee  
14 presented a budget and explained it line by line. He said he relies on the  
15 professionals as this is not his full-time job. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked if he felt  
16 comfortable with these decisions even if he doesn't know the details? **Mr.**  
17 **Murschell** said he was presented with all the details a couple of weeks ago.  
18 **Scott Campbell** said the \$108,000.00 decrease is the tuition for instructional  
19 costs for regular education, special education and vocational students going to  
20 Paulsboro High School, Special schools and Vocational school. **Mrs. Pandolfo**  
21 asked what the \$297,000.00 decrease in "undistributed expenditures" was and  
22 she wasn't sure what "undistributed expenditures" means if he can explain that?  
23 **Mr. Campbell** said that is instruction, attendance, social work, health services.  
24 **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked if he expected a \$297,000.00 decrease in all of that to  
25 which **Mr. Campbell** answered, "yes". He said instruction is all of your "190"  
26 accounts; teacher's salaries (regular education salaries-in house), supplies, staff  
27 salaries. With the re-allocation of teachers and moving them within programs,  
28 and with the one retirement, that is a decrease of approximately \$80,000.00  
29 without that being replaced plus there is a decrease in supplies. **Mrs. Pandolfo**  
30 asked if the cuts in technology supplies were part of these "expenditures"? **Mr.**  
31 **Campbell** said some of it would be because technology is split between  
32 numerous programs, let alone educational media and library account. There was  
33 a \$125,000.00 decrease in educational media and it is also split between  
34 educational software. Some of the programs also go through the  
35 Superintendent's office for internet costs. It is spread among many accounts.  
36 The educational support and software go through the educational account. **Mrs.**  
37 **Pandolfo** asked if our educational software is adequate for this upcoming school  
38 year? **Mr. Tarantino** said it is "more than adequate". **Mrs. Pandolfo** said when  
39 our technical software begins to become antiquated and once you set this budget  
40 at this level, you are only going to have a little room for that 2% that we "have to  
41 live with" and it seems to her that once things are cut, they are never coming  
42 back. She wants to know what the future is for our technology program? **Mr.**  
43 **Tarantino** said he realizes that technology is one of the "backbones of our  
44 education program" and over the years we have spent a considerable amount of

1 money in that area. He went on to say that the board had to look at every  
2 account and that particular one was "heavy" so we had to reduce it. **Mr.**  
3 **Tarantino** said at the elementary school next year, then will have a decrease of  
4 one position. Presently there are three classes of Kindergarten, two first grades,  
5 three second grades, three third grades and three fourth grades. Next year we  
6 will have three Kindergarten, three first grades, two second grades, two third  
7 grades and three fourth grades and one of his teachers is moving to the middle  
8 school to accommodate the over 60 children that will be moving from fourth  
9 grade to fifth grade. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked what classroom size there will be for  
10 the third grade? **Mr. Tarantino** said there are a lot of "pull-outs" from that grade  
11 so there would be in the area of low 20's per class. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said there is  
12 a cut of \$30,749.00 for special education and also a cut of \$68,500.00 for special  
13 education instruction. She would like to know a little about that. **Mr. Campbell**  
14 said there were decreases in supplies across the board; special education and  
15 regular education but the reduction in that line was the LLD program (Learning  
16 Language Disabled) which had a teacher partial salary and an aide partial salary  
17 and that teachers' salary and the aide salary was moved over to the MD program  
18 (multiply disabled). We don't receive any tuition students for the LLD program  
19 but we do receive tuition students for the MD program so we moved the teacher  
20 and the aide over where we will receive tuition money for them. **Mr. Campbell**  
21 said the \$68,500.00 decrease was for the cuts in clubs. **Mrs. Pandolfo** wanted  
22 to know what clubs were being cut? **Mr. Tarantino** said none of the clubs were  
23 being cut but he, along with Mrs. Whitcraft and Mr. Campbell redesigned the way  
24 clubs will be delivered to the students. The salaries for last year for the clubs  
25 totaled \$16,660.00 and this year we were able to provide every club for  
26 \$10,935.00. **Mrs. Pandolfo** wanted to know what the change was from year to  
27 year? **Mr. Tarantino** said more children will have the opportunity to participate in  
28 clubs. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said if you are paying less in salaries then it seems there  
29 is less "teacher time" in extra-curricular activities. **Mr. Tarantino** said some of  
30 the teachers have taken less of a stipend for the extra-curricular activities. He  
31 also said with the transportation not being provided for after-school clubs, some  
32 clubs had to be re-designed. **Mrs. Pandolfo** wants to know if someone can  
33 elaborate on the transportation line item? She said in the 2009-2010 school  
34 year, the expenditures were \$572,000.00 and going into this next school year, it  
35 has grown to \$632,000.00 and she would like to know what kind of savings we  
36 realized by out-sourcing the transportation? **Mr. Campbell** said the actual  
37 expenditures were for the 2010-2011 school year and they were audit  
38 expenditures. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked why there was such a big jump between the  
39 revised appropriations and the actual expenditures? **Mr. Campbell** said the  
40 2010-2011 school year is when we had our own in-house bussing and those  
41 expenditures covered that. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said in this 2011-2012 school year  
42 budget, you show the 2010-2011 school year revised appropriations at  
43 \$574,000.00 but in the upcoming budget, you show expenditures of \$645,000.00.  
44 **Mr. Campbell** said the \$645,000.00 was for the 2010-2011 school year and the

1 revised for 2011-2012 was \$633,000.00. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said in the prior budget,  
2 you projected a much lower number. **Mr. Campbell** said that at the time, we  
3 were contemplated what we were going to do; keeping in-house bussing or out-  
4 sourcing. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said when contemplating in-house transportation, the  
5 number is much lower. **Mr. Campbell** believes there were two or three students  
6 that moved into the district that were not planned and were private school  
7 placements that required transportation and one child required transportation  
8 plus an aide. Transportation plus an aide is very expensive. **Mrs. Pandolfo** then  
9 asked about the elimination of the part-time librarian. It says the educational  
10 media services/library program is being cut by 40.4% and it says part-time  
11 employee eliminated along with a decrease in supply purchases. **Mr. Campbell**  
12 said it is not the elimination of the librarian; it is the elimination of the part-time  
13 assistant to Mr. Grelli in the technology department. The part-time librarian  
14 position is still in place for next year. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said the Kindergarten  
15 through second grade will still get library services and the third through eighth  
16 grade will get no library services. **Mr. Tarantino** said fifth through eighth grade  
17 will still get library but it is different in the way the instruction is delivered. There  
18 is a part-time librarian that is here two days a week. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said the  
19 World Language is to be delivered weekly to grades three through eight. Right  
20 now, it is weekly for grades three and four and twice a week for grades five  
21 through eight. She wants to know if that is being cut to which **Mr. Tarantino**  
22 replied, "no, absolutely not". **Mrs. Pandolfo** wanted to know if that can be  
23 corrected and made clear for the rest of us? **Mr. Tarantino** said there was no  
24 intention to cut or eliminate the World Language. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said to Mr.  
25 Campbell that third and fourth grade get World Language once a week for an  
26 hour, fifth through eighth get it twice a week and Kindergarten through second  
27 get it a small amount. What does it mean, "taught through the Library"? How is  
28 World Language taught through the library? **Mr. Tarantino** said the current  
29 librarian is fluent in Spanish and Italian and she is able to incorporate world  
30 language through media time. At Broad Street School right now, the Italian  
31 teacher cycles through Kindergarten, first and second grades every six weeks  
32 and delivers instruction throughout the curriculum. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said under  
33 "bilingual education", that program was not budgeted for in prior years so it is  
34 showing a negative but in last year's budget, it was showing a positive. **Mr.**  
35 **Campbell** said it was for a student that came into the district but then moved out.  
36 She asked if it was under general instruction? **Mr. Campbell** said bilingual  
37 education is different from World Language. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said under "other  
38 purchased professional services", what is that and why are we exceeding our  
39 regional limit and who sets our regional limit? **Mr. Campbell** said that comes  
40 from our budget software and calculates if we are over our administrative costs.  
41 The state sets a regional limit and you have to be lower than the revised number  
42 for this year and the regional limit and we were both in the budget by roughly  
43 \$170.00 per pupil. The budget will not go through the "edit process" unless we  
44 were below both the revised and regional limit. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked what "other



1 purchased professional services” provide for? **Mr. Campbell** replied that the  
2 \$24,680.00 is the architectural costs, strategic planning costs and the policy  
3 consultant costs. **Mrs. Pandolfo** wanted to know why the expectation costs  
4 were around \$8,000.00 and this was \$24,680.00? **Mr. Campbell** said the bulk of  
5 that account is for the architects. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked about the “miscellaneous  
6 purchased services” and why does it seem we are \$14,000.00 over for the 2012-  
7 2013 budget? **Mr. Campbell** said it is the student accident insurance, bonding  
8 for himself, the cost for the printing of the election material, newspaper  
9 advertising and our expected election costs. She asked if we will be short in the  
10 election account this year to which **Mr. Campbell** said we probably will be. **Mrs.**  
11 **Pandolfo** then asked about the legal fees account and why did it almost double  
12 from \$4,200.00 in the 2009-2010 school year to \$8,200.00 in the 2010-2011  
13 school year and why now is it budgeted for \$15,000.00? **Mr. Campbell** said we  
14 budgeted \$15,000.00 for the 2011-2012 school year and kept it the same for the  
15 2012-2013 school year. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said it doesn’t seem like a lot but when  
16 you are “chipping away” on the after-school programs and teachers are forfeiting  
17 their stipends, they wouldn’t have to do that. She also wanted to know why the  
18 legal expenses are so high this year? **Mr. Campbell** said if you look at the last  
19 ten years, we have averaged around \$16,919.00. In the last three years, our  
20 legal costs have only been \$8,200.00, \$4,200.00 and \$6,700.00 so it has been  
21 brought down. The highest we have paid in the last ten years was \$30,000.00  
22 and \$24,000.00. **Susan Vernacchio** said that might have been a year when we  
23 had a referendum and could be why those costs were so high. **Mrs. Pandolfo**  
24 then asked about the custodial services being reduced by \$30,000.00. **Mr.**  
25 **Campbell** said we replaced a full-time evening custodian, who retired as of  
26 December, 2011, with a part-time custodian, the summer help program was  
27 reduced and maintenance supplies were reduced by \$18,000.00 as there were  
28 no “big ticket items” requested. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked if there were any plans for  
29 facility repairs or replacements in the upcoming school year such as painting or  
30 new tile floors? **Vincent Tarantino** said each one of the teachers will submit a  
31 work order for jobs to be done during the summer months and we will attempt to  
32 take care of all of their requests. **Mrs. Pandolfo** wanted to know who surveys  
33 and puts in requests for the bathrooms? **Mr. Tarantino** said the maintenance  
34 supervisor will put in those requests as part of an upgrade but we are hoping  
35 someday for a consolidation and then re-do the entire building. **Mrs. Pandolfo**  
36 asked if anything will be done or are we waiting for the consolidation? **Mr.**  
37 **Tarantino** said there is a scheduled maintenance plan for the summer. **Mrs.**  
38 **Pandolfo** asked if the maintenance plan was something she can “OPRA”? **Mr.**  
39 **Campbell** said anyone can “OPRA” anything. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked about the  
40 allowances on the contracts for Mr. Tarantino, Mr. Campbell, Mrs. Whitcraft and  
41 Mr. Harris and what are those allowances for? **Mr. Campbell** said it is for cell  
42 phones and organizations that we are all members of. **Mr. Tarantino** wanted it  
43 to be known that he pays for his own cell phone; the district does not pay for his.  
44 **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked Mr. Tarantino why his allowances went from \$1,000.00 to

1 \$2,350.00? **Mr. Campbell** said he doesn't have an answer right now. It is  
2 broken down into several categories and it merges into one total. When Mr.  
3 Tarantino was hired, he wasn't a member of some of the organizations that he is  
4 now and that could be where the increase in costs were but he will get back to  
5 Mrs. Pandolfo with that information. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked if the employees were  
6 contributing to their health benefits? **Mr. Campbell** said certain employees are  
7 paying 1.5% of their salary and certain employees such as himself are paying a  
8 percentage of the premium. Union employees are paying the 1.5% which will  
9 expire in 2013. After that, they will go into "year one" of the program. **Mrs.**  
10 **Pandolfo** asked with what is being paid now, how is it reflected in the budget? Is  
11 the contribution from what your benefits costs are, already taken out? **Mr.**  
12 **Campbell** said there is a separate page that they ask for in one of these reports.  
13 They ask what we currently receive for this year and what we project in receiving  
14 for next year. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said under "detailed appropriations", it is showing  
15 \$1.9 million for benefits. Does that include the contributions from the  
16 employees? **Mr. Campbell** said it is with the premium increases and after the  
17 contributions from the employees. He stated that we are looking at a 15%  
18 increase in medical and dental benefits. Mrs. Pandolfo asked if the district was in  
19 the state health benefits to which Mr. Campbell replied no. He said we go off of  
20 "broker recommendation". We have Horizon Blue Cross/Blue Shield for all of our  
21 benefits and are fully insured. **Mrs. Pandolfo** asked Mr. Tarantino about the  
22 three staff positions that are being eliminated. **Mr. Tarantino** said the  
23 Attendance Office position, which is part-time, is being eliminated and he and  
24 Mrs. Whitcraft will assume that responsibility. The part-time Treasurer position  
25 will be eliminated with Mr. Campbell assuming that responsibility. And as of right  
26 now, we eliminated the part-time technology position and Mr. Grelli will assume  
27 that additional responsibility. **Mr. Campbell** added that we reduced the payroll  
28 position in the business office from full-time to part-time and one of the classroom  
29 aides will not be replaced because the student will be moving on to high school.

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31 **Lee Lucas**, 361 Democrat Road, Gibbstown, remembers when the Democrats  
32 controlled the school board and there were no public portions during a work  
33 session. He likes the openness of this school board. He went on to say there  
34 was an article in the Gloucester County Times about "school choice". He doesn't  
35 see how "school choice" will benefit this community and he for one is against it.  
36 If he read it correctly, the district will only receive \$8,000.00 from the state. It is  
37 not going to meet the per pupil costs of this district. How do you save money  
38 from school choice when you have to hire another teacher? This could lead to a  
39 migration of failing schools to other schools. We are not running a mission here;  
40 we are here to provide an education for the children of this community.

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43 **Carol Lange**, 33 North School Street, Gibbstown, said she is the mother of a  
44 hearing-impaired child in the third grade. She loves every teacher and aide that

1 he has had. They call or e-mail her to let her know how he is doing and how to  
2 work at home with him on his speech. She called Superintendent Tarantino's  
3 office for a problem that her son was having and she left a message but received  
4 no call back from him. That was in February. Then on March 15, she called the  
5 Superintendent again and left a message and still did not receive a call back.  
6 She was then told he was not in but 30 minutes later after leaving a message  
7 with the County Superintendent, Mr. Robert Bumpus, she was told Mr. Tarantino  
8 was indeed in because Mr. Bumpus had just finished speaking with him. As of  
9 today, she still has not received a call back from Mr. Tarantino. **Ms. Lange** feels  
10 that parents have to be involved in their children's education; that is the only way  
11 they are going to learn. We have to support these teachers and back them at all  
12 times and she has done just that since he was in Pre-K and will continue to do  
13 that. She said but when she has a problem and wants to speak with the Principal  
14 or Superintendent, she expects a call back. She is asking her elected Board  
15 Members how she can have faith in a Superintendent who still has not returned  
16 at least seven of her phone calls? **Jason Murschell** said he will look into that  
17 and speak with Mr. Tarantino. **Mr. Tarantino** said when people call him and  
18 leave a message, he does call them back immediately. **Ms. Lange** then asked  
19 why she has never received a call back? **Mr. Tarantino** said he didn't know why,  
20 out of all the parents, she has not received a call back. **Ms. Lange** said Mr.  
21 Tarantino is sarcastic and that sarcasm has to go. She also said he cannot deal  
22 with parents and how does he expect to deal with children. **Mr. Tarantino** said it  
23 had nothing to do with Ms. Lange; it has something to do with his office and he  
24 will look into why he has is not getting her messages.

25  
26 **Kathy Seacrist**, 157 Swedesboro Road, Gibbstown, asked if the part-time  
27 technology position is being cut? **Vincent Tarantino** replied, "correct". **Mrs.**  
28 **Seacrist** said there is a lot of technology in the classrooms but it is only effective  
29 if it is working and Jen Landrum, whose position it is that will be cut, is an integral  
30 part of the Broad Street School. She keeps everything running smoothly and  
31 Mrs. Seacrist also understands that some things are run simultaneously between  
32 Broad Street School and Nehaunsey School. She wants to know how Mr. Grelli  
33 is going to be in two places at one time? **Mr. Tarantino** replied, "scheduling; we  
34 have to do more with less". **Mrs. Seacrist** wants to know what happens when  
35 she is in her classroom and her smart board goes out? **Mr. Tarantino** said Mr.  
36 Grelli will come over and help her. He then told Mrs. Seacrist that if she wants to  
37 discuss it further, she can see him in the morning.

38  
39 **Andrew Chapkowski**, 85 Adalisa Avenue, Gibbstown, asked when the user-  
40 friendly budget will be on-line? **Scott Campbell** said it will be online 48 hours  
41 after the public hearing. **Mr. Chapkowski** asked Jason Murschell what the  
42 status was of the five-year plan? **Mr. Murschell** said the board still has to  
43 schedule a meeting with EIRC and Dr. Ivory. **Mr. Tarantino** said as of right now,  
44 it is on hold. He has been speaking with Dr. Ivory and they have been trying to

1 pick some dates but it probably won't be until after April. **Mr. Chapkowski** said  
2 he doesn't mean to criticize Mr. Tarantino's position but does he feel it would be  
3 difficult to create a five-year plan effectively with an interim superintendent or  
4 does he feel we need someone full-time? **Mr. Chapkowski** remembers the  
5 previous interim superintendent, Mr. Suessmuth, making that statement in a  
6 previous board meeting. **Mr. Tarantino** said it doesn't come from the  
7 Superintendent; it comes from the constituency. The Superintendent contributes  
8 along with the teaching staff. **Mr. Murschell** said the plans come from the  
9 position; not the individual. He also said with the vast experience that Mr.  
10 Tarantino brings is an asset to helping with that long-term plan. **Mr.**  
11 **Chapkowski** then asked what is the current IT staff size? **Mr. Tarantino** said  
12 right now it is one and a half but will be down to one in the new school year. **Mr.**  
13 **Chapkowski** concluded by asking Mr. Worrell if he will be at the "Meet the  
14 Candidates Night"? **Mr. Worrell** said he has a scheduling conflict that night that  
15 he is trying to move but he is going to try to be there. **Susan Vernacchio** asked  
16 Mr. Chapkowski what day that will be held to which **Mr. Chapkowski** answered,  
17 "April 2". He said there is only one candidate on the slate so far. **Mrs.**  
18 **Vernacchio** asked if the PTA is sponsoring that and was told that they are. She  
19 then told Mr. Chapkowski that she has been to many "Meet the Candidates  
20 Night" where candidates don't show up but she still finds it important for him to go  
21 anyway and speak his mind even if he is the only person and she will come and  
22 listen so she make a good decision when she votes.

23  
24 **Jim Worrell** wanted to compliment Mrs. Pandolfo for what she did tonight with  
25 the budget. In the three years he has been on the board, no one has ever gone  
26 over the budget and presented the questions that she did and he wants to  
27 compliment her; she did a very good job. **Mrs. Pandolfo** said if he stays on the  
28 board, he can look forward to her doing the same thing for the next several  
29 years.

#### 30 31 **4. PRESENTATION**

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33 **Terry Lewis** of the New Jersey School Boards Association has the  
34 Superintendent's evaluations but she feels it should be done in executive  
35 session. The board of education self-evaluations, which can be done in public  
36 session, are not received yet.

#### 37 38 **5. EXECUTIVE SESSION**

27 Motion carried by unanimous voice vote.  
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29 ***Roseanne Lombardo*** said she attended the "Gloucester County Eighth Grade  
30 *Dialogue*" that the New Jersey School Boards put together. They pick students  
31 from Logan Township, West Deptford, Gateway, Greenwich Township, Delsea,  
32 Woodbury, Glassboro and Paulsboro. They nominate one student from each  
33 school and the student from this district was Morgan Gilcrest. Mrs. Lombardo  
34 was invited to go by the student from Paulsboro and Mrs. Whitcraft was there  
35 from Greenwich Township. She said it was very interesting. They asked the kids  
36 a lot of questions about what they feel about school, about education, where they  
37 think education is going and about technology. She said the kids did a very good  
38 job and they had a lot of good input. She just wanted to share that with the  
39 board.
