Duke TIP's (Talent Identification Program) 4th-6th grade Talent Search is a non-profit organization that helps students with excellent performance on recent grade-level standardized tests to discover and explore their academic talents. Participation in the search is an honor, as very few students qualify.

It is important that the children arrive to school well rested and on time. If they need to eat breakfast at school, they need to arrive earlier to prepare for testing.





RCES holds first Boys of Distinction Club meeting




