It is with pleasure that I present the 2015-2016 Annual Report for the Alexander City Schools. As you will see, it was an exciting and successful school year. We are extremely proud of all the wonderful accomplishments by our students, staff, programs, and schools.

From a district standpoint, we are proud of progress to date in carrying out ACS2020, our strategic plan. The plan has 108 action items with a goal for completion by the year 2020. At the close of the past school year, approximately 85% of the action items had been completed or were significantly in progress. Below, I share a few related highlights of the past year:

- Realized general fund financial reserves approaching a goal of three months;
- Purchased 2,500+ Google Chromebooks for 1:1 student technology initiative in grades 3-12;
- Completed technology infrastructure upgrades in excess of \$500,000, allowing for a wireless data flow of up to 10 Gbps;
- Over 25% of students in grades 7-12 completed the Wildcat Community Service Challenge 10/25 hours;
- Completed a new BRHS career and technical education lab and added a related teacher;
- Expanded Pre-K program with two new units, now serving 54 students;
- Expanded our After the Bell program, now serving 200+ students (K-6); and
- Initiated ACS Training for Prospective Administrators.

The aforementioned accomplishments, as well as those at each school, are a result of the collaborative expectations for excellence in Alexander City. Our faculty and staff strive daily to live up to our motto in everything that we do - *High Expectations and Success* for ALL. Our students never cease to amaze us with their academic accomplishments, athletic achievements, talents in the fine arts, and their spirit of community service. And, our community is exceptionally supportive of our schools. Together, we are Alexander City!

- BRHS welcomed Amanda Fennel, Courtney Davis, Hagen Vickers, Latriesha Moon, Kimberly Davis, Robbie Childers, Jennifer Clanton, Jeremy Stanford, Chase Horn, Huane Wright to the BR family of teachers.
- The Class of 2016 received \$5.2 million in scholarship offerings. This amount is the most scholarship offering amount in school's history.
- BRHS met their goal of having at least 25% of the student population doing 25 hours of community service.
- Mrs. Emily Sassano was selected by the faculty as Teacher of the Year and was selected as the Alexander School District's Teacher of the Year.
- Dr. Anthony Wilkinson was named as a National Mentor in Education Leadership by NASEP and Auburn University.
- The Bridge Program Initiative was created to bridge the gap between dream careers and reality.
- BRHS implemented blended Project Based Learning.
- BRHS integrated Evidence Based Learning by reverse engineering on learning critical thinking skills. The EBLs led up to more encompassing Project Based Learning.
- The Dreams Meet Reality PBL forced students to have a dream career but also a plan for that dream.
- Business EXPO had almost 50 business leaders touring and interacting with students.
- Open Door Wednesdays gave parents and community leaders a chance each month to visit our classrooms where students were in professional attire.
- Reality Check gave over 230 ninth graders a lesson in real-life financial awareness.
- Senior Blitz gave over 220 12th graders an opportunity to create a resume, dress in professional attire and endure a rapid fire of interview questions from over 25 community and business leaders.
- Student-led Conferences gave every student at BRHS an opportunity to showcase their leadership skills and technology skills as they had to present their resumes, digital portfolio of their learning, reflective essays and endure interview questions from their administrators, counselors, advisors, and parents. We had almost 70% attendance by parents.



- The Wildcat Showcase was a competitive end-of-the year celebration of student learning as selected student groups from each core and career tech class competed in the Oral Presentations and Floor Presentations on their EBLs and PBLs.
- BRHS welcomed over 1,000 parents, community, and business leaders through Open House, Open Door Wednesdays, Student-led Conferences, and other opportunities.
- BRHS hosted the Leadership Lake Martin team of community leaders for a tour and walkthroughs.
- BRHS hosted the ACS Administrators to an instructional round on student engagement. Presentations by the Men and Women were awesome!
- The faculty and staff participated in Project Based Learning professional develop to help increase active student engagement. PBL is where students learn how to learn content by applying critical thinking skills to solve real-world problems in a hands-on environment.
- BRHS students and faculty adopted the 8 C's of being College and Career Ready. Students and faculty had to have proof of students addressing how they are learning the following 8 skills: Character, Communication, Collaboration, Critical Thinking, Creativity, Computer & Tech Skills, Community & School Service, and the Call of Leadership.
- BRHS hosted a team of instructors from Auburn University on how to transform a high school.
- Drama students performed Disney's "High School Musical" and "I Never Saw Another Butterfly."
- BRHS Drama competed for the first time in the Alabama Conference of Theater District competition. Students placed 2nd in the One-Act Division, received a Best Ensemble Acting Award, and many students received excellent and superior ratings individually. BRHS Drama also qualified and competed at the Trumbauer State Festival in the One-Act Division. Laney Green received a Best Actress award for her portrayal in the one-act. The drama team has been invited to perform their show for the Holocaust Museum in Birmingham in August 2016.
- Both the Art program and Choral program participated in the Holiday Open House in Alexander City. The Show Choir also performed at the January Board of Education meeting.

- The football team had a 12-2 record and made it to the 6A semi-finals.
- The BRHS football team boast of four consecutive seasons of 10+ wins in football
- Legendary Coach Danny Horn is only 23 wins away from reaching the 300 wins mark in Alabama High School Football history. He is currently the 8th most winningest coach and 4th with most state championships.
 There are currently only four coaches in Alabama High School history with 300 wins or more.
- Tyre Gray was named 1st Team All-State in 6A Football and signed an athletic scholarship in football with Murray State University in Kentucky.
- Anthony Parker signed an athletic scholarship in football with West Alabama University.
- Tae Robinson signed an athletic scholarship in football with Union University in Kentucky.
- NeColby Maxwell was named 2nd Team All-State in 6A Football.
- Volleyball Team was Elmore County H. S. Invitational Tournament Champions, Area Tournament Champions, and finished in the Top 16.
- Volleyball Team volunteered to open car doors at Jim Pearson, Stephens, and Radney Schools as evidence of their community and school service hours
- BRHS Cheerleading Team had 7 UCA All-Americans and 6 UCA Staff Bids.
- BRHS formed a first year competitive AHSAA bowling team. The "AlleyCats" Bowling Team finished in the Top 8 AHSAA State Finals Championship out of 140 AHSAA teams in the State of Alabama.
- Bryant Ray placed 2nd individually in the state finals of bowling.
- The varsity boys' basketball team finished the year with a record of 9-17. This year's team finished runner up in the regular season area play

- and was eliminated in the semi-finals of the area tournament. The team was the tournament champion of the 2nd Annual Lake Martin Slam Fest.
- BRHS Girls' Soccer team ended the regular season with a 11-10-1 record. They were Southern Shootout Runner Up-Gold Division, Area 6 Champions, Second Round Playoff Appearance.
- Daly Wagoner was named to the South AHSAA All Star Team in Girls Soccer.
- Charley Lutz and Karina Naranjo signed an athletic scholarship in soccer with Pine Manor College in Boston.
- Joseph Schouten signed an athletic scholarship in water skiing with Louisiana-Lafayette. This is the first scholarship in skiing for BRHS.
- BRHS Varsity baseball completed the 2016 season with a record of 24 wins and 11 losses. The varsity team advanced to the second round of the AHSAA Playoffs.
- The BRHS baseball program finished and dedicated a newly built dressing room facility on location at the Sportplex, naming the building in honor of our longtime manager of the baseball program, Shane Boos.
- BRHS baseball hosted the 21st annual Lake Martin Classic with a field of 18 teams.
- Two Wildcat seniors, Sean Rape and Corley Woods committed to furthering their baseball / academic careers with Division I, Jacksonville State University. Four varsity players were selected in the top 120 showcase to be held at Troy University.
- BRHS Junior Varsity baseball completed the 2016 season with a record of 24 wins/ 6 losses. They won the Elmore County Invitational tournament, going undefeated during the tournament.
- BRHS Softball Team was the Reeltown Lady Rebel Invitational Champions. They participated in the City Wide Clean-Up and Wildcat Softball Camp.
- Loren Bishop signed an athletic scholarship in softball with CACC.

Gifted Education Services:

- 259 ACS students are served in grades 1-12.

Direct Special Education Services:

- 479 ACS students with disabilities, ages 3-21 years of age, received special education services.
- 25 Pre-K students in various Headstart and daycare programs received special education services.
- 89 ACS students received services for a Speech/Language Impairment, only.
- All remaining students with disabilities are served based upon various exceptionalities.
- ACS students with exceptionalities are served by 27 special education teachers and 9 paraprofessionals.

504 Services:

- Each school in the Alexander City School System has an appointed 504 Building Coordinator.
- 21 ACS students received a 504 Plan at Benjamin Russell High School.
- 29 ACS students received a 504 Plan at Alexander City Middle School.
- 11 ACS students received a 504 Plan at Radney Elementary School.

Nursing Services:

- Each of the five schools in the Alexander City School System has a school nurse that meets the healthcare needs of students, faculty, and staff.
