Fall sport's season have been underway with modifications. We would like to thank all of our parents and athletes for their understanding and patience as we are experiencing things that are out of our normal operations. At this time we know that winter season will start a week later on November 9th. The game schedules are still being modified. Each school we will travel to will have a per site decision on fans and their own Covid policies. You are more than welcome to call the athletic office to find out if other schools will be allowing fans. Below is our current Lake Havasu High School Guidelines.

<u>LHHS ATHLETICS SCHOOL GUIDELINES TO START 2020 FALL SPORTS -</u> LAKE HAVASU HIGH SCHOOL

Admission: \$5.00 general admission, \$3.00 students (k-12), seniors (65+), and Military. AIA Passes

are accepted. Exact change is preferred and appreciated. There will be no re-entry.

Concessions: Limited concessions will be available if possible. Coolers will not be allowed in the gym or

in the football stadium. Food will not be allowed in the gym. Individual water will be al-

lowed.

PPE: Masks must be worn by spectators and coaches at all times when inside and on the Lake

Havasu High School Campus. Masks must be on when in the gym and inside the football stadium. Spectators are encouraged to bring their own hand sanitizer and wash their hands

regularly.

Fan Limitation: Each member of the home team (players/coaches/managers/band/spiritline) will be provid-

ed three (3) guest passes and lanyards. Guest passes will be kept the entire season by the athlete and are good for their respective fall sport and athlete's specific game. LHHS Guest Pass and Face Mask are required for entry into the facility. Facemasks are required to be

worn at all times. Admission will still need to be paid upon arrival.

Seating: Please seat away from others. Available seating on the bleachers is identified by an "X." You

must sit at an identified "X." Additionally, please do not sit immediately behind the team

bench and score table. Thank you.

<u>Live Stream:</u> A live stream of the home match/game will be provided most of the time, when available.

The live stream link will be shared with the opposing team the day of the match. The link will also be posted on the HAVASU ONLINE TV LIVE Facebook page prior to the start

of the match.

Spectators: We ask all home team spectators to socially distance as a family unit. Families who reside

together can sit together. Once your athlete is done competing, we ask that you do not stay and socialize. **No Away Team Spectators Will be Allowed at This Time.** Please follow all posted signage and use common sense. Stay home if you show symptoms or if you have

been in close contact with a positive case of Covid-19 in the last 14 days.

Visiting Schools:

At this time, <u>No Away Team Spectators Will be Allowed</u>. Only those traveling with the team and are deemed necessary will be allowed.

Persons on the sidelines (sideline personnel) will be restricted to players, coaches, athletic trainers, athletic directors, school administration, and game administration personnel. Sideline personnel must wear face masks. Officials have the authority to notify game administration.

Sideline Personnel:

Spectators are expected to follow LHUSD and Athletic Dept. guidelines. Failure to follow LHUSD and Athletic Dept. guidelines will result in removal from the event with no refund. No Re-entry.

Once there you will click on the 20-21 Athletic Packet for all the necessary paperwork for tryouts. Please make sure you fill out 20-21 paperwork some browsers can pick up paperwork from previous years. For completed paperwork due dates see the tryout schedule above.

The following 20-21 completed paperwork is mandatory for all athletes to be able to tryout or compete in sports.

- *A completed 20-21 AIA sports physical (4 pages, must be done after March 1, 2020)
- *Two emergency cards (parent and student signatures)
- *Handbook form, Inf. Consent & Enrollment Verification (parent and student signature)
- *AIA Concussion form (parent and student signature)
- *Proof of Health Insurance (student insurance is available if needed)
- *Booster Club Form
- *Copy of a birth certificate if you are a Freshmen or new student.
- *Brainbook Concussion Class Certificate (aiaonline.org website) if you are a Freshmen or new athlete.
- *Athletic Trip Consent Form A (required for each sport)
- *20/21 School Year Only Parent Waiver Form (for 19/20 physical usage)

Sick Day Guidelines (When to keep your student home.)

SHOULD I KEEP MY CHILD HOME OR SEND HIM OR HER TO SCHOOL?

School policy requests a child **stay at home** if he or she:

Has a fever of 100.4 degrees or higher.

Keep your child home until his or her fever—100.4 or higher—has been gone for 24 hours without fever-reducing medication.

Has been vomiting or has diarrhea without a fever.

Keep your child home 24 hours after the last vomiting or diarrhea episode.

Has symptoms that keep him or her from participating in school, such as:

Very tired or lack of appetite.

Cough that he or she cannot control.

Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing.

Moderate to severe headache, body aches, or earache.

Sore throat—a minor sore throat is ok for school, but a severe sore throat could be strep throat, even if there is no fever.

New loss of taste or smell.

If COVID-19 is diagnosed or suspected, your student will need to stay home:

10 days from the first symptoms.

And, Symptoms are improved with 24 hours with no temperature and no fever-reducing medications taken.

If your student was exposed to someone with COVID-19 they will need to quarantine at home for 14 days from the last exposure.

If no symptoms occur, they can then return to usual activities. Including school.

We recommend that you contact your students' doctor for instructions.

When to Seek Emergency Medical Attention

Look for **emergency warning signs*** for COVID-19. If someone is showing any of these signs, **seek emergency medical care immediately:**

- Trouble breathing
- Persistent pain or pressure in the chest
- New confusion
- Inability to wake or stay awake Bluish lips or face

Call 911 or call ahead to your local emergency facility: Notify the operator that you are seeking care for someone who has or may have COVID-19 Arizona COVID-19 Hotline: **1-844-542-8201**

^{*}This list is not all possible symptoms. Please call your medical provider for any other symptoms that are severe or concerning to you.

Online Academy Update

Are you curious about what the Online Academy has to offer? Mrs. Pressley can be reached for additional questions and assistance.

Lake Havasu Unified School District (LHUSD) is providing a virtual option for the 2020-2021 school year for K - 12th grade students who would like to remain in an online learning environment for medical or personal reasons. A student may elect to return to the distance learning or in-person option at any time. The LHUSD Online Academy is only available to students enrolled in Lake Havasu Unified School District. The District is using SchoolsPLP for course content and has selected AZ Bright Thinker, eDynamic and Lincoln Learning for core and elective classes. The District has utilized this vendor for credit recovery courses prior to the adoption of the platform for the 2020-2021 school year. There are no honors or AP courses offered through the Online Academy. The Lake Havasu High School grading scale is used for all grade 9 - 12 courses.

These courses are designed to be self-directed, self-paced and aligned to Arizona State content standards. The online courses are NOT the same as LHUSD courses taught in person by LHUSD teachers. Students will be assigned a licensed teacher who can help troubleshoot problems with content, the online system itself, and pacing; however, there will not be daily interaction with their assigned teacher.

Students in grades 9 - 11 will be enrolled in six courses, while those in grade 12 must enroll in a minimum of 4 courses. Online courses in grades 9-12 will allow students to earn credits towards graduation. These classes will align as closely as possible with our in-person learning classes which will allow students to seamlessly transition back to the LHHS campus. Students enrolled in the LHUSD Academy will continue to have the opportunity to participate in extra-

curricular activities and athletics.

DRESS CODE/PERSONAL APPEARANCE

It is the philosophy of the Lake Havasu Unified School District #1 Governing Board that student appearance, dress and conduct reflect the individual school and the school district. Dress should be clean, neat and appropriate in material and style for a businesslike educational atmosphere. Students must have appropriate hygiene. Attire that is distracting, disruptive, or derogatory interferes with the orderly operation of the school (POLICY JFCA). The Board has approved standardized shirts available in several colors. Standardized wear is available for purchase only at the high school:

UNACCEPTABLE DRESS

The **standardized shirt** must be long enough to cover the midriff, navel, stomach and underwear when worn with low-rider pants or skirts.

Bottoms must be fingertip length. This means long enough so that when standing straight, hand at sides, the hem is at the edge of the fingertips. Leggings must be thick enough that the behind or underwear is not showing. **From waist to fingertip, clothing must be opaque with no holes, rips, tears, or frays.** Pants or shorts may not be worn so low that underwear can be seen.

Caps, hats or head coverings, including but not limited to bandanas and hair nets, are not permitted on campus between 6:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

Clothes, jewelry, or accessories, such as belt buckles made to look like fake knives,

bullets, etc. or bearing phrases or slogans which are sexually suggestive, show nudity, promote use of drugs/alcohol/tobacco/ pornographic material/offensive or vulgar language (or are suggestive), or contain racial or ethnic slurs or other inappropriate references are not allowed.

Chains, including wallet chains, studded dog collars or clothing adorned with safety pins are not permitted.

Shoes: No metal-toed shoes and boots. No slippers may be worn.

No altering of standardized wear, including coloring, writing on, tying or cutting shirts or jackets in any way; nothing may be added, attached or affixed to standardized wear







Students are expected to wear the approved clothing when they enter the campus each morning and until 4:00 p.m.
