Spotlight on New Milford Schools

Superintendent Search Update

The Board of Education held a special meeting on February 21st to review the New Milford School District Leadership Profile Report. The report presents the findings of the Leadership Profile Assessment conducted by Hazard, Young, Attea & Associates (HYA) in January of 2019, in support of the search for the new superintendent of the New Milford Public Schools. The data was obtained from input HYA Senior Associate Dwight R. Pfennig and HYA Associate Don Macrino received when meeting with focus groups and individuals in either an interview setting or larger group settings on January 23 and 24, 2019, and from

the results of the online survey completed by stakeholders between January 11, 2019, and January 30, 2019.

In total, twenty-two stakeholder interviews and focus group meetings were used to collect information regarding the strengths of the district, the challenges that it will be facing in the coming years, and desired characteristics for the new superintendent. The online survey was used to collect data relevant to ranking desired characteristics in the new

superintendent, as well as to gather open ended comments regarding those characteristics, the district/community in general, and suggestions for prospective superintendent candidates. All told, 453 respondents either completed the online survey, attended a focus group, or did both.

In the area of district strengths, several topics were consistent:

- Focus Group participants were obviously proud of New Milford as a community supporting their schools.
- Focus Group participants expressed appreciation for teachers and building level administrators who have remained dedicated to the students of the New Milford Public Schools.
- Students frequently spoke of bonding with teachers to assist

them in times of academic need and in general acclimation to the school environment.

- Focus Group participants spoke of the strength of New Milford's Special Education program and Talented and Gifted Program.
- It was generally agreed that the facilities were well maintained and adequate.
- Parent and student Focus Groups spoke highly of the music and art programs offered by the district.
- The presence of law enforcement and practical safety procedures has made students, staff, and community members feel more secure within the teaching and learning environment.

When addressing challenges to the district, topics raised included concern regarding changes to district leadership, inconsistencies attributed to lack of systems knowledge of policies and procedures, district funding, the need for greater support for "students in the middle" and concern regarding teacher attrition.

In looking forward, Focus Group and survey participants consistently reported several characteristics that they desire to see in the next superintendent:

- Most Focus Groups and survey participants want an experienced educator with deep passion for developing and supporting visionary operational and academic strategies that may be transformed to New Milford's strategic movement forward.
- The new superintendent should provide evidence of successful engagement and transparency with all community constituents built upon trust, honesty and integrity, regardless of issues at hand and/or problems to be solved.
- The new superintendent must demonstrate strength as an educational evaluator with the ability to recruit, employ and retain effective personnel throughout the district.
- It is expected by most Focus Groups that the new Superintendent will provide evidence of a clear understanding of student achievement through detailed analysis of data.
- Key to all aspects of the new Superintendent's work will be the ability to communicate effectively with all constituents.



The Leadership Profile will become part of the HYA recruitment package so that all prospective candidates will get a sense of what is important to the community. In turn, the Board of Education, in conjunction with HYA, will use this knowledge to measure how well a candidate's skill set will match with the community's desired characteristics. Interviews are expected to take place during the month of April.

NMHS CNA Students and HOSA: Future Health Professionals

On Friday, January 4th, NMHS Health Department Chair Denise Duggan accompanied six of her CNA (Certified Nurse Assistant) students to the CT Tobacco Free Youth Leadership Summit hosted by HOSA at Naugatuck Valley Community College. At the conference, there were speakers and representatives from groups such as Tobacco 21, the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, and more.

HOSA: Future Health Professionals is an organization created to allow students who are interested in joining the healthcare field to have opportunities to go to educational conferences and apply for scholarships and grants. There are five membership divisions of HOSA: middle school, high school, post-secondary/college and universities, professionals, and alumni divisions. There are around 250,000 international members of HOSA, over six hundred of which are from Connecticut. All members share a mission "to empower HOSA: Future Health Professionals to become leaders in the global health community through education, collaboration, and experience."



At the summit, students were provided with breakfast as two representatives from the Campaign for Tobacco Free Kids gave a presentation on the effects of tobacco products and the e-cigarette and vaping epidemic. This presentation was the first step for students to be able to teach others about the health risks associated with smoking. When asked about what she got from the summit, NMHS student Lucy Burns said, "It's important that we take what we learned and bring it to our own school and our own community." Mrs. Duggan thought the

same thing, and is working with the Students Against Destructive Decisions (SADD) advisor, Mrs. Elizabeth Schlicher, to bring their groups together and host a Kick Butts Day event (March 20) at New Milford High School.

After breakfast, students were split into six groups to attend different workshops about the tricks that cigarette companies use to draw in youth and how to spot them. The students were also shown how to move forward in advocating for the end of smoking by youth. NMHS student Lilly McDermott said after the summit, "It was an eye-opener to a serious problem that I never paid much mind to before." Reactions like this are what can cause change in the use of tobacco products by youth around the world.

During lunch, also provided, students gathered together to hear from Senator Richard Blumenthal. He spoke about his thoughts on the smoking and vaping epidemic and how he has worked to put a stop to it. He also congratulated all of the students for being part of a group

that, as the future of our country, can put a stop to problems such as this one. After his speech, Senator Blumenthal took pictures with some of the students.

To end the day, students spent time hearing from their HOSA student leaders about the benefits of being part of such an important student organization. Katie Calderon, a new member from NMHS said, "The HOSA idea is a great way for kids like us to get involved with the health profession field early on."

The HOSA: Future Health Professionals students at New Milford High School are excited to be part of this amazing organization. They all learned so much at the summit and can't wait to share it with their community and make a difference.

Unified Sports Program Flourishes at NMHS

The New Milford High School Unified Sports program is an athletic team composed of students with special needs and their peer partners. Students have the opportunity to participate in the program during both the Fall and the Spring. Students train and compete in Soccer during the Fall, and Track and Field during the Spring.

During each sports season, the teams train after school twice a week and then compete against other Connecticut schools. Supervisor of Special Education Tracy-Ann Menzies says, "During this past Fall season, the team competed in soccer tournaments at both Bunnell and Newtown High Schools. These sports programs not only develop the athletic skills of the student athletes, but also help to promote friendships and teach teamwork."

On January 30th, the Unified Sports Team sponsored a bowling tournament at *Dolrbill's Bowling* in New Milford. Student athletes and their peer partners from New Milford High hosted the Unified Teams from both Brookfield and Bethel High Schools. In total, over 60

athletes along with their partners took part in this fun competition. After the event, all of the students shared pizza and enjoyed baked goods made by the students of New Milford High School.

Ms. Menzies sums up the event nicely when she says, "This was a wonderful demonstration of the power of sports to bring our students together to develop a sense of community and celebrate each other's successes."

SMS students in grades 6-8 recently participated in the annual National Geographic Geography Bee. Grade 8 Social Studies teacher Tracy Olmsted says, "The Geography Bee continues to be a favorite event at SMS as it includes all children in the student body, celebrates a sense of belonging, and promotes global awareness."

Preliminary competitions were held during Social Studies classes in late December. Class winners advanced to a semi-final round in early January and competed against each other for a place in the finals. Fifteen students had scores high enough to qualify for the final

round that was held on January 23rd. Dr. Len Tomasello was the master of ceremonies and presided over an intense battle of geography giants, all of whom displayed an impressive knowledge of our fascinating planet.

Piper Literary Magazine Receives Superior Ranking







BOE Adopts 2019-20 Education Budget

New Milford Public Schools Interim Superintendent Steve Tracy and administrative team members presented the proposed 2019-20 education budget to the New Milford Board of Education for consideration on the evenings of January 22, 23, 30 and 31 in public session. The 2019-20 Superintendent's Budget, as proposed, was \$65,065,296 which is an increase of \$2,054,710 or 3.26% over the current year's budget. **The Board of Education's Adopted budget, as approved on January 31, 2019, was finalized at \$64,642,589, which represents a 2.59% increase over the current year's budget.**

Dr. Tracy said he had four priorities when developing the budget: attracting, developing and retaining top talent; improving instruction; enhancing Special Education services; and protecting the district's investment in facilities. The budget proposal meets the contractual obligations of the district, capitalizes on declining enrollment where possible, and eliminates pay to play. "Of 171 towns and regional districts in Connecticut, New Milford ranks 151 in per pupil spending", says Dr. Tracy. "The New Milford Public Schools represent a solid economic value to the town, providing a fine program with an efficient base."

Over the course of several nights, the Board heard detailed presentations regarding each of our five schools, and from the departments of Instruction, Pupil Personnel/Special Education, Facilities and Technology, and General Administration. Public comment was offered each evening. Budget documents from the four evenings of deliberation can be found under the <u>Budget tab</u> on the district website here.

On January 31, 2019 the BOE deliberated at length before adopting the final 2019-20 budget. The Superintendent's proposal was decreased by \$422,707. The cuts included decreases to workers' compensation and property liability insurance line items based on updated numbers, the elimination of an assistant principal position at Sarah Noble Intermediate School, the elimination of the proposed Director of Curriculum and K-2 head teacher positions, the elimination of all capital from the budget, the elimination of requested field and arena cameras at the high

school, and a decrease to the high school athletic supply line.

Board of Education Chairperson David Lawson says "This is a compromise budget that maintains quality education throughout the district." The BOE Approved Budget now goes before the Town Council and Board of Finance for review and approval before being voted on at referendum.

National Bird Feeding Month



National Bird Feeding Month dates back to February 23, 1994. On this date, a congressional proclamation was issued by Congressman John Porter (R-IL), as he read a resolution into the Congressional Record.*

Here are a couple key statements from that reading:

"Mr. Speaker, I would like to recognize February, one of the most difficult months in the United States for wild birds, as National Bird Feeding Month. During this month, individuals are encouraged to provide food, water, and shelter to help wild birds survive. This assistance benefits the environment by supplementing wild bird's natural diet of weed seeds and insects. Currently, one third of the U.S. adult population feeds wild birds in their backyards." Congressman Porter went on to say: "In addition, Mr. Speaker, backyard bird feeding is an entertaining, educational, and inexpensive pastime enjoyed by children and adults."

This month, bird lovers were also invited to participate in the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC), held February 15-18. Participants are asked to count birds for as little as 15 minutes (or as long as they wish) on one or more days of the four-day event and report their sightings online at birdcount.org. According to the Audubon website, each checklist submitted during the GBBC helps researchers at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society learn more about how birds are doing, and how to protect them and the environment we share. Last year, more than 160,000 participants submitted their bird observations online, creating the largest instantaneous snapshot of global bird populations ever recorded.
