ESSA?

President Obama signed into law on December 10, 2015 the new Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), which reauthorizes the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA). Formula grant recipients will continue to operate in the 2016-2017 school year under the plans, procedures, and requirements that are in place for the 2015-2016 school year. Full transition to ESSA took place in the fall of FY2017-18.



What is Title I?

- Title I is the largest federal assistance program for our nation's schools.
- The goal of Title I is a higher quality of education for <u>every</u> child.
- The program serves millions of children in elementary and secondary schools each year.
 Both Quitman Schools are Title I schools.



How Title I Works

- The federal government provides funding to states each year for Title I.
- The Georgia Department of Education sends the money to the district.
- The school district identifies eligible schools and provides Title I funds.
- Quitman County School District implements a Schoolwide program. 100% students-free & reduced



Parent Right To Know & Teacher/Park Qualifications

- All teachers and parapros in Title
 I schools must meet
 requirements to be "highly
 qualified."
- Parents of students in Title I schools have the right to know the professional qualifications of staff working with their child.
- 100% Quitman County Teachers/

 Agrees Professionally Qualified



Teacher/Para Qualifications & Parent Right To Know cont'd PARAPROFESSIONALS

TEACHERS

- Whether the teacher meets the state qualifications and licensing criteria for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or provisional status because of special circumstances.
- Whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and.
 the field of discipline of the teacher's certification or degree.
- If at any time your student has been taught for four (4) or more consecutive weeks by a teacher(s) that is not highly qualified, then you will be notified. by the school.

The right to request information regarding the qualifications of the paraprofessional(s) assisting your child's teacher(s).

- Whether the paraprofessional has completed at least two years of study at an institution of higher education.
 - Whether the paraprofessional has completed an associate's degree (or higher).
- Whether the paraprofessional has met a rigorous standard of quality through our state's certification procedure for determining the quality of paraprofessional staff.
