Coffee County 21st Century Community Learning Center (21st CCLC) Initiative

June 2017

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I. Overview and History of Program

The Coffee County Board of Education and the joint applicant, the Boys and Girls Club of Coffee County Region, Inc. received funding to support the Coffee County 21st Century CLC Initiative. The after school program operates for 34 weeks for a total of 170 days and a summer program which will operate for six weeks for a total of 30 days.


The target population is 110 low performing students in grades kindergarten – 8th and their family members. These students attend five targeted schools which include: Coffee Middle School; Eastside Elementary School; Indian Creek Elementary School; Satilla Elementary School; and Westside Elementary School.

The academic focus of the program is reading, mathematics and science. Instruction is provided through small group instruction, a blended instructional model, project-based learning experiences, assistance with homework, individual tutoring and mentoring. Parents participate in sessions designed to provide them with knowledge about the three areas and to teach them strategies they may use in providing help and encouragement to their children. Instructional strategies are employed that emphasize active student engagement. Teachers seek to identify each student's passion and build on that interest to increase motivation. High interest activities are conducted in a positive learning environment with an emphasis on experiential learning.


II. Student Attendance and Enrollment

The Initiative had an enrollment of 158 students during the 2016-2017 school year.


Race and Gender: Seventy-seven percent (77%) of the participating students are African American, 8% are Caucasian, 8% Hispanic and 7% are of another ethnicity. This is compared to a school system profile of 47% Caucasian, 31% African American, 19% Hispanic and 4% other. Regarding gender, 56% of our students are male and 44% female.



<u>**Grade Levels and School:**</u> Our participating students are enrolled in grades Kindergarten – 8.

Free and Reduced Lunch Status: One hundred percent (100%) of our students receive free and reduced lunch.

After school sessions were offered from August 8, 2016 thru May 12, 2017. A total of 155 sessions were offered, totaling 17,976 student contacts. The average student attended 114 sessions. The average daily attendance was 115 students.

P.M. to 7:00 P.M. (2 groups separated by school level, elementary and middle). Students arrive at the program is immediately after the regular school day, greeted with a nutritious snack. The primary focus of the program is academic instruction and enrichment in core subject areas, including math, reading, and science, as well as time for homework completion. Students enjoy a variety of recreation and enrichment activities, including Go Noodle, games rooms, outside activity, art, music, Project Learn, and the SMART program.

Success Stories

As I was walking up to the lobby area, I noticed one of our students crying and talking with his mother. This happens to be one of our students that have low self-esteem issues. The child was very upset about not getting to play football this year. The mother was explaining to the child that she had to work and was unable to get the child to and from practice. After talking with the mother and telling the family the story of Hershel Walker and how he trained at home and worked out every night in front of the TV, and became one of the greatest to play in the NFL, the child lifted his head and stopped crying. I promised the child that I would get a workout from a

college coach that he could use and he could train and get faster and strong and when it became financially better for his family, he would be faster and stronger than the other children and he could play football. I kept my promise and even had one of my old coaches, who is coaching in Mississippi to give the student a call and talk with him. This made this child's day, and helped motivate, and improved his self-esteem. The mother thanked me for everything. (Program Director/Site Coordinator, Q1)

After several discipline referrals on one student, I called the mother in for a meeting. After explaining the events that took place with her child, the mother began to cry uncontrollable. After speaking with the mother, it was determined that she was going thru a divorce and it was very hard on her and the children. She stated that this child was really taking the divorce hard. After counseling the mother and giving her information of where to get help, the mother made the comment that she did not know what she was going to do on single income (the mother works and has had a job the entire time her students have been in the program). I called the Sheriff of Coffee County and the student and two other siblings were put on the "Shop with a Cop" list. This has allowed the mother to not worry about Christmas gifts for three children and focus on paying her bills. The school counselor was made aware of the family situation and received counseling. (Program Director/Site Coordinator, Q2)

One of our sweet little girls and her mother wanted to talk to me after the program one day. Apparently, some of the other girls were talking about her child's shoes. The little girl did not want to come back and was very upset. After talking with the parent and the student, I assured the parent that I would address the issue. I spoke with the other children in reference to bullying and what it does to people. We are in the process of working with the two children that made fun of the girl's shoes and the litter girl who was harmed. The parent was very happy to know that we are working with her daughter (building up self-esteem, problem solving, dealing with harmful people, etc.). (Program Director/Site Coordinator, Q3)

The biggest success story would have to be seeing the kids' faces lighting up when their names were called at the Awards Night. The kids got to experience this with the family and friends. We had so many family members that came out and supported the kids. It was heartwarming to see some of the kids get awards that might not have ever received an award. (Program Director/Site Coordinator, Q4)

Due to several students not returning this school year due to moving out of the school system, we were able to allow new students who have been on the waiting list. Numerous parents excited to hear that their children were finally able to attend. (Family Services/Parent Coordinator, Q1)

The Fall family event was a success. I was very concerned about not having enough meat to serve the boys and girls and their parents. But God worked it out. He multiplied it where there was enough for everyone. (Family Services/Parent Coordinator, Q2)

The "Project NO MORE" seminar was a success. "Project NO MORE" is an anti-bullying organization created by Mrs. Tangala Robinson-Coney to address awareness of bullying by sharing her story and testimony. The boys and girls were engaged and focused on Mrs. Coney as she spoke on suicide, wanting to belong but just existing, helping boys and girls to see that we can overcome the hurt but also helping the bully to speak out. Boys and Girls Club staff and parents were so moved by her informative words, that after the seminar, Mrs. Coney was asked by one of our teachers to talk with some individual boys and girls (one-on-one) about some bullying issues that have occurred at the Boys and Girls Club. She stayed an additional hour to address the issues. I haven't heard from the teacher of anymore bullying issues. Therefore, Mrs. Tangala Robinson-Coney visit with us was a success. We really appreciated her and look forward to her returning in the near future. (Family Services/Parent Coordinator, Q3)

Many of the family surveys of the Boys and Girls Club Awards Banquet were completed on that evening of the event. This makes it easier to have the exact amount (100%) of parents/guardians signing in and family surveys. Also, parents/guardians give the best answers when the surveys are done at the event. (Family Services/Parent Coordinator, Q4)

Family Literacy and Involvement Activities

Twenty-four (24) family literacy and involvement activities were held during the school year. An

average of 13 parents/guardians attended each of the events offered. A total of 110 parents/adults attended at

least one event, with a total of 315 contacts.

IV. Quality of Staffing

During the year, a total of 26 staff members were employed. This included: a Program Director/Site Coordinator; Family Services/Parent Coordinator; 3 certified teachers; and 21 paraprofessionals and other non-certified staff. All teachers utilized by our program are certified. Seventy-seven percent (77%) of the staff are female and 23% are male. The student:staff ratio is no more than 10:1 for academic activities and 15:1 for enrichment activities.

Staff and volunteer training is a major focus throughout the program. A total of eight (8) training opportunities were provided, with an average of 2 participants.

V. Assessment of Objectives

Description of the Evaluation Design

The goals of the project include: (1). Increase student learning in reading, mathematics and science;

(2) Improve student attendance, behavior and active participation in the classroom; and (3). Provide

opportunities for families of participating students to improve literacy, language and parent skills.

Gathering Results Level Indicators:

Short-Term:

Annual surveys were distributed to participating students, their parents and teachers at the end of the

2016 - 2017 school year. The contact information was obtained from the Cayen Afterschool 21 database.

Intermediate:

The initiative obtained the students' grades, attendance, behavior, classroom participation, homework

completion and year-end status information regarding the 2016 - 2017 school year.

Long-Term:

The drop-out and high school graduation information regarding these students are long-term indicators and will be tracked in upcoming years.

The evaluation data was collected by the identified staff members. Demographic, contact and grades data and regular classroom teacher surveys relevant for the state's Cayen Afterschool 21 database was subsequently entered into the Cayen Afterschool 21 database by staff. Additional data collection tools (e.g. additional worksheets, student surveys, parent surveys, after school program staff surveys and key stakeholder focus group sessions) and key results data (attendance, test score and year end promotion records) were forwarded directly to the evaluator (Norris Consulting Group). Norris Consulting Group staff subsequently downloaded relevant demographic, student and parent contact and grades information from the Cayen Afterschool 21 database and combined it with the other identified data to establish a county evaluation database. They utilized the information from this customized local database; an analysis of the student, parent, regular classroom teacher and after school program staff surveys; and a compilation of other relevant quantitative and qualitative information to prepare this report.

Status of Achievement of Goals and Objectives

As of June 15, 2017, the program met 7 of the 12 outcome objectives.

Goal #1: Increase student learning in reading, mathematics and science

Objective #1.1: A minimum of 50% of students actively participating (attending at least 30 sessions) in the program will improve their reading grades.

<u>Did Not Meet Objective #1.1</u>: 38% of the regularly participating students improved their reading/Language Arts grade during the 2016-2017 school year. Twenty (20) of these students improved by at least one letter grade and 5 students raised a failing grade to a "C". In addition, 62 students maintained an "A" or "B" throughout the school year.

Objective #1.2: A minimum of 50% of students actively participating (attending at least 30 sessions) in the program will improve their mathematics grades.

<u>Did Not Meet Objective #1.2</u>: 43% of the regularly participating students improved their math grade during the 2016-2017 school year. Twenty-eight (28) of these students improved by at least one letter grade and 10 students raised a failing grade to a "C". In addition, 67 students maintained an "A" or "B" throughout the school year.

Objective #1.3: A minimum of 50% of students actively participating (attending at least 30 sessions) in the program will improve their science grades.

<u>Did Not Meet Objective #1.3</u>: 48% of the regularly participating students improved their science grade during the 2016-2017 school year. Twenty-seven (27) of these students improved by at least one letter grade and 11 students raised a failing grade to a "C".

Objective #1.4: The percentage of actively participating students meeting or exceeding the state standard on the reading section of the Georgia Milestones Assessment System will be a minimum of 65%.

<u>Did Not Meet Objective #1.4:</u> 60% of the regularly participating students scored at the developing learners achievement level or above on the ELA section of the Georgia Milestones.

Objective #1.5: The percentage of actively participating students meeting or exceeding the state standard on the mathematics section of the Georgia Milestones Assessment System will be a minimum of 65%.

<u>Met Objective #1.5:</u> 79% of the regularly participating students scored at the developing learners achievement level or above on the mathematics section of the Georgia Milestones.

Objective #1.6: The percentage of actively participating students meeting or exceeding the state standard on the science section of the Georgia Milestones Assessment System will be a minimum of 65%.

<u>Did Not Meet Objective #1.6:</u> 63% of the regularly participating students scored at the developing learners achievement level or above on the science section of the Georgia Milestones.

Goal #2: Improve student attendance, behavior and active participation in the classroom

Objective #2.1: A minimum of 85% of the students actively participating in the program will be absent from school for 10 days or less.

<u>Met Objective #2.1</u>: 93% of the regularly participating students actively participating in the program were absent from school for 10 days or less.

Objective #2.2: A minimum of 65% of the students actively participating in the program will demonstrate improvement in behavior.

<u>Met Objective #2.2</u>: 93% of the regularly participating students actively participating in the program, who needed to improve, demonstrated improvement in behavior.

Objective #2.3: A minimum of 65% of the students actively participating in the program will demonstrate improvement in class participation.

<u>Met Objective #2.3</u>: 96% of the regularly participating students actively participating in the program, who needed to improve, demonstrated improvement in class participation.

Goal #3: Provide opportunities for families of participating students to improve literacy, language and parenting skills

Objective #3.1: A minimum of 50% of the CLC students' families will participate in at least two family night sessions.

<u>Met Objective #3.1</u>: 50% of the students' families participated in at least two family night sessions.

Objective #3.2: Parents who need English language instruction will be identified and 75% of those identified will participate in sessions to improve English usage.

<u>Met Objective #3.3</u>: There were no parents identified as needing English language instruction during the 2014-15 school year.

Objective #3.3: A minimum of 80% of the parents who attend at least one PASS session will state that they have gained increased knowledge regarding encouraging and supporting their child's academic success.

<u>Met Objective #3.3</u>: Ninety-three percent (93%) of the students families, who completed a family program survey, stated that they have gained increased knowledge regarding encouraging and supporting their child's academic success.


The Initiative also obtained the grades, attendance and year-end status information for the 2016-2017 school year for the majority of the

Regarding their Math grade:

of the 2016-2017 school year.

- More than <u>one out of every three students</u> (43%) improved their Math grade.
- 28 students improved by at least a letter grade.
- 10 students raised a failing grade to at least a "C".

Regarding their Reading/Language Arts grade:

- More than <u>one out of every three students</u> (38%) improved their Language Arts grade.
- 20 students improved by at least a letter grade.
- 5 students raised a failing grade to at least a "C".

Regarding their Science grade:

- Almost <u>one out of every two students</u> (48%) improved their Science grade.

- 27 students improved by at least a letter grade.
- 11 students raised a failing grade to at least a "C".

Preventing Academic Failure:

The initiative was able to document 75 instances of a student improving his/her grade by at least one letter grade and six instances of a student's grade increasing by at least two letter grades. Furthermore, we have documented 26 instances of participating **students raising a failing grade to a "B" or "C".**

Absenteeism:

Ninety-nine percent (99%) of the regularly participating students were absent 15 or less days during the 2016-2017 school year. The average participating student was absent four days during the year.

Year End Academic Status:

We also reviewed the status of the regularly participating students at the end of the 2016-2017 school

year. 99% of these students were promoted to the next grade level and 1% was retained.

Satisfaction with the Initiative:

We distributed surveys to participating students and their families. Their responses indicate a high

satisfaction level with initiative related activities. For example:

- 81 of the elementary school students reported that they liked the After School Program. Another

11% disagree, 6% were uncertain, and 3% did not respond.

- 92% of the elementary school students stated the program helps them complete and turn in

homework on time. 3% disagree with this statement, 2% neither agreed nor disagreed, and 4% did not

state an opinion.

Annual Family Surveys:

A total of 135 families completed and returned annual satisfaction surveys.

- 99% of parents are satisfied with the after school program. 1% did not respond.
- **83% of parents reported improvement in their child's behavior** since participating in the program, while 4% disagree, and 13% neither agree nor disagree that their child's behavior has improved.
- 92% of parents reported improvement in timely homework completion since participating in the

program. Another 5% disagreed, and 4% neither agreed nor disagreed

Classroom Teacher Feedback:

The program staff interacted regularly throughout the school year with the students' regular classroom teachers. They discussed the students'

strengths and weaknesses in order to be able to help each student. Throughout this interaction, the importance of ongoing communication between

the regular classroom teacher and the after school program staff was emphasized.

The students' regular classroom teachers completed a survey at the end of the 2016-2017 school year. Feedback was obtained regarding 95%

(n=150) of the participating students. This feedback indicates improvement in a variety of areas.

In summary, we are committed to sustaining the 21st CCLC Initiative and have the demonstrated track record to make this happen over the next several years.

VIII. Overall Recommendations

Conclusions:

The Coffee County 21st Century Community Learning Center Initiative is successfully

providing quality after school programming. It continues to meet both the requirements of the state 21st Century Community Learning Center Initiative and expectations of the parents of enrolled children. In addition, the participating students like the program and look forward to attending. For example:

- **81 of the elementary school students reported that they liked the After School Program.** Another 11% disagree, 6% were uncertain, and 3% did not respond.
- 92% of the elementary school students stated the program helps them complete and turn in homework on time. 3% disagree with this statement, 2% neither agreed nor disagreed, and 4% did not state an opinion.
- **78% of the middle school students reported that they liked the After School Program.** Another 4% disagree, 15% were uncertain, and 4% did not respond.
- 70% of the middle school students stated the program helps them complete and turn in homework on time. 15% neither agreed nor disagreed, and 15% did not respond.
- 99% of parents are satisfied with the after school program. 1% did not respond.

- **83% of parents reported improvement in their child's behavior** since participating in the program, while 4% disagree, and 13% neither agree nor disagree that their child's behavior has improved.
- 92% of parents reported improvement in timely homework completion since participating in the program. Another 5% disagreed, and 4% neither agreed nor disagreed

Commendations and Recommendations:

In preparing the annual evaluation report, the evaluator conducted a series of key local after school program (ASP) stakeholder focus groups with 32 individuals on April 10, 2017. These groups included: students enrolled in the program, key informants, partners, regular classroom teachers, paraprofessionals and parents of program participants. The purpose of these focus groups was to obtain insight and feedback regarding their perceptions of the after school programs. Feedback from each of these groups is summarized below.

General Comments:

When asked to rate the program on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, they rated the initiative between a 8 - 9.5. Reasons include: there are some things we need to work on, because we have only been established two years and it takes a couple years to get a solid foundation, but we're going in the right direction; we have seen a difference that it's made for the kids – study habits are better and testing is better; there is always room for improvement in anything you do, but I really feel like it's a good program and we have good instructors, leaders that are involved; results speak for themselves, with one of the primary results is producing the statewide "Youth of the Year"; Mr. Brown and the staff reaches out to the classroom teachers and staff to make sure that what they're doing supports what's happening in the classroom; it's a

good program because they help the kids with their homework, they give them snacks, do different programs with them; it's a good program for working parents; it's a safe place for them to come; we get to introduce them to things they may not experience; for outdoor activities; would like to see more diversity in enrollment; need to reinforce the standards that the students are learning at the school level and to incorporate those more; align some of our data sources to make sure that what actually happens in the classroom with each child is differentiated at the site, as well as an extension of what's happening in the classroom; and we tend to lose several pieces of equipment, or it gets torn up throughout the year, and it takes us a while to have more.

Strengths repeatedly identified included: High quality of teachers, instructors, and leaders; able to bolster our staff with federal funds through the 21st Century Learning Center grant, which gives us the ability to hire top quality staff, which leads to a better program and a more fulfilling experience; academics is a strength along with the community part of the program and the life skills; those individuals providing the guidance and motivation to the children are our biggest assets; and the structure of the program itself provides great opportunities for the kids to understand and develop those characteristics of a structured life as well – they understand the expectations and accountability; good communication with parents; the programs are pretty strong; and safe, clean environment; have seen a difference that it's made for the kids – study habits are better and testing is better; and the way after school teachers work in coordination with the students classroom teachers at their school – constant contact, which allows them to coordinate the needs of the students; it is a safe and fun place for children to come; children learn to get along, share with each other, and be more respectful of each other; the lunch program is very helpful, as some kids don't have food after they get out of regular school; teaching respect,

responsibility, empowerment, and increases their self-esteem and teach them self-worth; have a good school climate for students; and staff is knowledgeable.

- Suggested opportunities for overall initiative improvement included: more diversity in enrollment; focus more on the standards that the children are actually learning at their grade level at their school; decrease staff turnover; we acquired a pre-existing building and remodeled it and it looks great, but we're still working on the outside/transition areas; increase security fencing/gating; the facility is limited and it meets the purpose, located in the center of town, but is limiting in the fact that there is only so much square footage to work with; need to expand our services there is a tremendous opportunity to serve 10 times as many students as we serve now in our community and surrounding areas that need it as well; need more playground equipment; need to add a gym, so even if it's raining, they can play; need additional community involvement the community knows we're here, but a lot of people don't know how they can contribute or how to be involved; and community members could even possibly mentor just take an active role with the kids; and more social media outreach.
- Suggestions to improve parent/family activities to increase their participation included:
 need to collaborate with school events; have the kids do something such as performing, so
 they're inviting their parents to come see them do something; offering the program at later times
 and on Saturdays some parents don't get off until later in the evening; continue to host holiday
 events such as a Thanksgiving meal and Christmas family event; the restrictions we have is that
 we don't have a facility large enough to house everyone, so we're limited in how we can do that
 can consider holding activities off site, but that takes away the benefit of the parents being able
 to see the program; continue to ask for feedback from the parents; reach out more to the
 community; let people know what we have to offer; and more social media outreach.

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Overall, these individuals are pleased with the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Initiative. Despite being able to suggest constructive comments to continue to improve this initiative, they sincerely believe that this initiative has been beneficial for students and families, especially those most at-risk.

We are pleased with the positive trends documented in this evaluation report and will continue to place great emphasis on collecting evaluation information. In particular, we are also pleased with obtaining the official objectives with the exception of the objectives relating to the grades and ELA and science milestones. We are pleased that 67 of our students (45%) maintained an "A" or "B" average in Math throughout the school year and 62 (42%) maintained an "A" or "B" average in We are also encouraged by the fact that 99% of our regularly participating students were promoted or placed into the next grade level at the end of the 2016-2017 school year. Moreover, the initiative was able to document 75 instances of a student improving his/her grade by at least one letter grade and six instances of a student's grade increasing by at least two letter grades. Furthermore, we have documented 26 instances of participating students raising a failing grade to a "B" or a "C".

Recommendations and Next Steps:

We realize that the positive trends we have documented cannot be explained entirely by their participation in the Coffee County 21st Century Community Learning Center Initiative. The Coffee County School System and other community partners provide a variety of other academic and youth development programming for the children and families in our identified target group.

Our key recommendations and next steps are continued from last year and include:

- The management team and advisory committee will thoroughly **review the evaluation feedback** (including the focus group discussions) and utilize the suggestions for improvements, when

possible, in continuing to make programming and policy modifications. This includes researching and discussing the underlying reasons for not obtaining the grades and ELA and science milestone scores related objectives. We will subsequently develop an action plan to address these issues. The evaluator is recommending that we consider revising our three grade related objectives to include consideration of the students who maintain either an "A " or "B" average in addition to the students whose grades increase. Many of the students have worked hard to maintain their "A" or "B" average and it may be unrealistic to expect a grade increase for a student who already has an "A" or "B".

- Continue to explore ways to enhance the exterior of the facility to include additional playground equipment, outdoor facilities and security features. This suggestion was made repeatedly by the participating students and parents. There have been many significant improvements in these areas during the past two years and more will continue to be made as additional resources are identified.
- Continue to encourage and promote increased parent participation. This includes distributing a parent feedback survey at every parent education/involvement opportunity.
- We will share the information contained in this report through an ongoing community awareness campaign. This campaign needs to consider expanding its activities related to social media. Many of our participating students and parents suggested relying more heavily on social media related communication.
- The collaborative will intensify ongoing efforts to recruit and retain dedicated community volunteers to support the initiative's programming efforts.

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 The collaborative will continue to track the participating students as they progress through their local academic career. We will track them long-term until they graduate from high school.

Appendix H: Focus Group Notes

In preparing the annual evaluation report, the evaluator conducted a series of key local after school program (ASP) stakeholder focus groups with 32 individuals on April 10, 2017. These groups included: students enrolled in the program, key informants, partners, regular classroom teachers, parapros, and parents of program participants.

The purpose of these focus groups was to obtain insight and feedback regarding their perceptions of the after school programs. Feedback from each of these groups is summarized below.

Key Informant Focus Group General Comments (n=5):

- They described the program as a nurturing, fun, structured, learning environment for their child where they can have a supervised after school place to be; an extension of their learning day, that they already have at school where they reinforce the skills they're learning every day; a extra activity that is safe and an alternative to going home and doing nothing or unproductive things.
- When asked to rate the program on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, they rated the initiative an 8.6. Reasons include: align some of our data sources to make sure that what actually happens in the classroom with each child is differentiated at the site, as well as an extension of what's happening in the classroom; Mr. Brown and the staff reaches out to my teachers and staff to make sure that what they're doing supports what's happening in the classroom; any program can be better and anytime we're trying to deliver a program we can do better, but I think they're off to a good start, doing a good job, but you can always try to be better; would like to see more diversity in enrollment; and reinforce the standards that the students are learning at the school level and to incorporate those more.
- **Strengths repeatedly identified included:** the kids are always engaged in fun activities and even though their learning experiences are different than what you'd see in the school day, the kids always seem to be highly engaged in whatever the activity is; The staff itself, the teachers are highly qualified and are devoted to the children and their success; and Michael Brown is a great leader who comes with a lot of enthusiasm and energy and is always positive, no matter what.
- Suggested opportunities for overall initiative improvement included: diversity in enrollment; focus more on the standards that the children are actually learning at their grade level at their school; lower turnover in staff it's really hard to keep quality staff; they acquired a pre-existing building and remodeled it and it looks great, but we're still working on the outside/transition areas it's a little unfit in my opinion, as far as an educational setting if there was a way in the future to increase security fencing/gating it might be the next step for the facility; and the facility is limited and it meets the purpose, located in the center of town, but is limiting in the fact that there is only so much square footage to work with, but at some point down the road, we'll either need to put more funding into this facility, or look for a new facility to operate this program in but I think you can get another 10 years out of this facility.
- If funding was not a barrier, the following suggestions were made: larger, nicer, newer facility, more up to date, with room for activities; technology updating the available hardware for students to use, so they can link what's happening in the classroom to what's happening in the program; and the possibility of field trips, where some of these students may not get the opportunity to travel outside of Douglas, such as to Jacksonville, the Museum of Aviation, or the aquarium different places the children aren't able to experience.

- **Suggestions for improving communication with parents included:** it's always a challenge, but they are doing a good job with constant communication through newsletters; many of the parents pick up their children and the staff are here to greet those parents and have that conversation with them; and they also have very good attendance on the parent events.
- **Suggestions to improve parent/family activities to increase their participation included:** piggybacking with some kind of school event; have Thanksgiving meal for parents; and activity at Christmas that gave all the children gifts.
- Existing barriers identified included: improve the continued partnership between the Boys & Girls Club and the schools, keep in contact every nine weeks; check-in regarding grades throughout the year, rather than waiting until the end of the year; have teachers surveys about the participating students on their roster, done at the end of every nine weeks, to help know the needs of the students; break it down to individual students on what standards they are not mastering, and then let 21st Century know so they can reinforce those standards during the program; and improve communication between the program and the school regarding the data that is being pulled.
- Additional comments included: the children who attend from Indian Creek really love it, are enthusiastic about coming, hardly ever miss, and they enjoy having a safe place to learn and have fun after school; Only hear positive comments from the parents and students; the "Youth of the Year" program was absolutely wonderful was organized and planned out well, where several of the youth talked about the after school program; impressed watching the program grow from the ground up, although it hasn't been easy, it's been worth it and you see it make a difference in the lives of these young people who are attending; the fact that the children have caring adults with them here in the building working with them academically and socially; and we've been blessed to have this program.

Community Partners Focus Group General Comments (n=4):

- They described the program as a program for the children that assists them in their day to day living experiences; helps with school works; an overall good place to be, rather than out on the streets; a place where children can go in the afternoon that provides assistance with their education, provides a meal, and provides positive role models; where the kids can develop and learn and have a good time; a place where the kids who need us most can go to enhance their grades, to give them a place where they feel like they belong; a safe place for them to be after school, which focuses on giving them healthy life choices as far as what they eat; helps them in school through EXCEL and gives them special interaction; an emphasis on life skills that the Boys & Girls Club and 21st Century provides, and understanding of what the children's roles are in society, and having an understanding right from wrong.
- When asked to rate the program on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, they rated the initiative a 9.25. Reasons include: always room for improvement in anything you do, but I really feel like it's a good program and we have good instructors, leaders that are involved; results speak for themselves, with one of the primary results at the top of our minds is producing the statewide "Youth of the Year"; all of our members are improving their grades, behavior, and are having a good time doing it; I tend to rate us at the very top of the scale; the last report we received regarding grades and behavior all show an upswing from when the students first started coming to current, which is the desired trend we're looking for; to be 2 years out of the block and to have the "Youth of the Year" is phenomenal; and I think we're absolutely a top notch club at this time, although we have improvement we need to look at.
- Strengths repeatedly identified included: High quality of teachers, instructors, and leaders; able to bolster our staff with federal funds through the 21st Century Learning Center grant, which gives us the ability to hire top quality staff, which leads to a better program and a more fulfilling experience; academics is a strength without a doubt, along with the community part of the program and the life

skills; those individuals providing the guidance and motivation to the children are our biggest assets; and the structure of the program itself provides great opportunities for the kids to understand and develop those characteristics of a structured life as well – they understand the expectations and accountability.

- Suggested opportunities for overall initiative improvement included: Expansion of our services there is a tremendous opportunity to serve 10 times as many students as we serve now in our community and surrounding areas that need it as well; have internal organization/structural aspects that need to be made better; and board development is one of our challenges and one of our greatest opportunities for improvement, with that in mind, it might help us as a board to have parents on the board, so that children have representation at the voting table, and increase communication with parents.
- If funding was not a barrier, the following suggestions were made: expansion of our services there is a tremendous opportunity to serve 10 times as many students as we serve now in our community and surrounding areas that need it as well; a new building or a total renovation of our current building to give us a symbol of who we are, including an athletic facility; enhance technology as we know that technology is a driver in the future, and unfortunately, those people who do not jump on that bandwagon will be left behind; being able to enhance the ability to assure the children have that ability to learn the new technology requirements going forward; and want the school and after school to be on a similar level for the children.
- **Suggestions for improving communication with parents included:** formulate a plan for newsletters and an annual report a web site form where parents can log in and find out what's going on at the Club and how to participate; and open door policy involve them.
- Suggestions to improve parent/family activities to increase their participation included: the restrictions we have is that we don't have a facility large enough to house that, so we're limited in how we can do that can consider holding activities off site, but that takes away the benefit of the parents being able to see the program.
- Existing barriers identified included: we're limited to the number of students we can serve; don't have the facilities to put into place programs we want; and we are an "instant club", so our financial position isn't as strong as we'd like or need it to be in order to be aggressive on some of the programs we'd like to put in place.

Parents Focus Group General Comments (n=5):

- They described the program as a good program because they help the kids with their homework, they give them snacks, do different programs with them; it's a good program for working parents; they provide after school help with schoolwork and they also do programs; it's more than just after school tutoring they teach them some social skills and life skills and keep them involved, such as letting them pick activities and build skills; share with the parents that they have the STAR program, which helps the children want to achieve more; and the staff is easily accessible and they're friendly and easy to talk to, so you could come to them regarding your children.
- When asked to rate the program on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, they rated the initiative a 9.5. Reasons include: the teachers do a good job, they're concerned teachers; it's a good program because they help the kids with their homework, they give them snacks, do different programs with them; it's a good program for working parents; and things can always be improved.
- **Strengths repeatedly identified included:** The staff and teachers are highly qualified; parapros have lots of enthusiasm; there's good communication with parents; the programs are pretty strong; and safe, clean environment.
- Suggested opportunities for overall initiative improvement included: more security for the children
 this space has a lot of open space; more playground equipment for the kids, as they really don't have

anything except for a basketball goal; a gym, so even if it's raining, they can play; and the facility is a weakness – it's not big enough for the number of kids they serve and they've had bathroom issues.

- If funding was not a barrier, the following suggestions were made: bigger, state of the art facility; playground for each grade, so each grade has their own space; more technology; and the ability to go on reward trips right now, the field trips have to be educational, so they're limited on positive reinforcement.
- Suggestions for improving communication with parents included: they communicate pretty well, they have a texting system; and don't have a problem with it, as I can e-mail or call, and someone will respond – they do a pretty good job of communicating.
- Suggestions to improve parent/family activities to increase their participation included: seeing our kids actually doing things, such as performing; later times some parents don't get off until later in the evening, but they hold the activities early; and have Saturday events.
- **Existing barriers identified included:** funding; and the facilities.
- Additional comments included: it's structured, but I would like to see one-one-one help, rather than only learning in a group, such as Power Hour; for being a 3-year old program, it's pretty decent, and as they've moved on, they've made improvements every year; my kids love it, they don't even want to go home; it has give me a peace of mind, I'm able to work better, knowing that they're somewhere safe and being able to do their homework and have opportunities that I may not be able to give them; and they make sure they have their snacks, although it's not good food if they get their bigger facility, they need a kitchen.

Regular Classroom/After School Program Teachers Focus Group General Comments (n=4):

- **They described the program as** it's a really great program, especially for working parents who work late and don't have time to help with homework; we help with homework and tend to other needs that the child may have; we serve as a mentor to a lot of these kids; sometimes kids don't have help at home with homework, so they get help here; they get homework help, and they're given a meal in the evenings, and they're taking home, which, some students may not receive a meal or homework help at home; parents know that there's someone here who's going to help their kids; it's a great way to have your child do something productive after school, rather than go home and be there by themselves; and there are wonderful teachers who help the student with their homework, and tutoring, as well.
- When asked to rate the program on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, they rated the initiative an 8. Reasons include: there are some things we need to work on, because we haven't been established for about 2 years, and I feel it takes a couple years to get a solid foundation, but we're going in the right direction; and have seen a difference that it's made for the kids study habits are better and testing is better.
- Strengths repeatedly identified included: have seen a difference that it's made for the kids study habits are better and testing is better; and the way after school teachers work in coordination with the students classroom teachers at their school constant contact, which allows them to coordinate the needs of the students.
- Suggested opportunities for overall initiative improvement included: more community involvement
 the community knows we're here, but a lot of people don't know how they can contribute or how to be involved; and community members could even possibly mentor just take an active role with the kids.
- If funding was not a barrier, the following suggestions were made: have more activities to do outside; more equipment for them to play on outside; and more money to go long distance for field trips, as some students haven't even left the county, so it would be a good experience for them.

- **Suggestions for improving communication with parents included:** we communicate with them to the best of our ability; we send notes home and we have a text system that texts their phones with updates; and we have a Facebook page.
- **Suggestions to improve parent/family activities to increase their participation included:** have the kids doing something, so they're inviting their parents to come see them do something.
- **Existing barriers identified included:** student's behavior by the time the students get here, they're tired from a long day, so it's a challenge to find activities for them to do to keep their attention or keep their interest; and towards the end of the school year, there can be a lack of motivation.

After School Program Parapros Focus Group General Comments (n=4):

- They described the program as a great opportunity with the programs that we have, the help with homework; it helps social skills; and it introduces them to STEM, technology, cooking, cheerleading, and art and inspires children to pursue different areas.
- When asked to rate the program on a scale of 1-10, with 10 being the highest, they rated the initiative a 9.3. Reasons include: if I was a kid, I'd want to come here and get all the free stuff that they get; one child the other day said they were glad they could come here, because they have fun here; it's a safe place for them to come; we get to introduce them to things they may not experience; for outdoor activities, we tend to lose several pieces of equipment, or it gets torn up throughout the year, and it takes us a while to have more; and their grades do seem to be improving in some of the classrooms.
- Strengths repeatedly identified included: safe and fun place for children to come; children learn to get along, share with each other, and be more respectful of each other; the lunch program is very helpful, as some kids don't have food after they get out of regular school; teaching respect, responsibility, empowerment, and increases their self-esteem and teach them self-worth; have a good school climate for students; and staff is knowledgeable.
- **Suggested opportunities for overall initiative improvement included: b**etter building; air conditioning; better playground; and more equipment.
- **If funding was not a barrier, the following suggestions were made:** a pool; bigger classrooms; more cooked food; and more playground equipment.
- **Suggestions for improving communication with parents included: m**ore direct e-mails or phone calls; update paperwork as a lot of numbers and addresses change; and more contact with teachers about how the child is doing at school.
- Suggestions to improve parent/family activities to increase their participation included: we do
 pretty good on that; we ask for feedback from them; reach out more to the community; let people know
 what we have to offer; and more social media outreach.
- Existing barriers identified included: students not being responsible for their homework, such as students telling us they don't have homework, but it turns out they do; and need better communication or direct communication with teachers.
- Additional comments included: I'm glad it's here it's really grown, and will grow bigger; the kids seem to show interest in activities, especially the Friday activities; kids seem to be more involved and enjoy coming here and look forward to; and if we had a pool, we could really get them coming.

Elementary School Student Focus Group General Comments (n=5):

- **The best thing about the after school program is:** lots of fun; I like making new friends; we go to the pool; we get to do activities; I get to come here after school and see friends who have moved.

- **Students gave the following suggestions for additional activities in after school:** pool; trampoline; a playground; and a zoo.
- If we had all of the money we wanted, the following suggestions were made: make the building more bigger; expand the building; and make the building better.
- We can get more parents and other adults to come to family activities by: beg them and show them papers that the after school program gave us; tell them we've been good; show them papers and tell them the Boys & Girls Club wants them to come; go home and ask your parents and show them the papers; and ask them for more help.
- **Suggestions to make the after school program better:** we can get more stuff; more equipment for us to play with; and raise money.
- How the program has helped students: helps me a lot, make better grades, helps me with my homework so I can get better and stuff; helps me get better grades and do homework better; helps me with my homework and turning in homework when I get to school; helps me with my homework and things I cannot do; and it helps me because the teachers help me turn in my homework and helps me get better grades.
- Additional comments included: I love it because all the stuff we get to do is very fun; very exciting getting to do activities; helps you with homework and helps you make new friends; and makes you get better friends and treat them nice.

Middle School Student Focus Group General Comments (n=5):

- The best thing about the after school program is: It helps with our homework; the fun we get; the Fridays where we get to do different stations like STEM, basketball, and gaming; going outside to play basketball; playing.
- **Students gave the following suggestions for additional activities in after school:** Better food; more playtime, let us be here longer; more College students; and a little bit more time in the game room and more games to play.
- If we had all of the money we wanted, the following suggestions were made: Build a pool; build us a playground for Kindergarten through 2nd grade; bigger place; and obstacle course.
- We can get more parents and other adults to come to family activities by: Call them; e-mail them; and parents could volunteer for things.
- Suggestions to make the after school program better: More time doing work.
- How the program has helped students: It keeps my grades up and gives me a chance to do homework; make new friends; and they help us if we're stuck on a question, they easily help us figure it out, step by step.
- Additional comments included: It's fun and it's helpful; we should get more people to come, instead
 of having a waiting list; let people come so it's easier; make sure people sign in; and make it bigger so
 more people can come.

Overall, these individuals are pleased with the 21st Century Community Learning Center Initiative. Despite being able to suggest constructive comments to continue to improve this initiative, they sincerely believe that this initiative has been beneficial for students and families, especially those most at-risk.
