Spotlight on New Milford Schools

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NMHS Teacher Steve Donahue Named Teacher of the Year



NMHS Math teacher Steve Donahue has been named New Milford Public Schools Teacher of the Year for 2019-20. Mr. Donahue has taught at NMHS since 2001. He is a graduate of Western CT State University where he earned his Bachelor's degree in Secondary Education with a focus in Math, and his Masters degree in Educational Technology. Here's more about Mr. Donahue, in his own words.

"Teaching is my second career. I did not start college until the age of 35. I did not start teaching until the age of 40. I actually found that I had a gift for teaching through my son and daughter. As they became old enough to be involved with sports and scouting and clubs, I became involved as a volunteer coach and leader. I found that I related well to high school age students and I had some skills I wanted to impart to them. In my first career as a self-employed carpenter, I had the opportunity to hire some teenage students for summer work. I was surprised to find that even though they had an understanding of higher math concepts, they often did not have a good handle on how to apply math to the real world. It was almost like learning math and applying math were two totally different things. Something as easy to me as reading a ruler or calculating angles was beyond them outside the classroom. They truly never understood the answer to their question 'When will we ever use this stuff?'. I decided at that point to pursue becoming a math teacher and to include as part of all of my lessons the real world applications of whatever concept we were studying. I wanted to work with the students to create a bridge to span the void between memorizing facts and applying those facts to problem solving and real world applications. I found that my twenty years of work before becoming a teacher gave me a huge collection of experiences I could draw on to connect higher level math concepts with work situations that actually presented an opportunity to use those concepts.

The greatest contribution that I have made in my teaching career is that I have taught a generation of students to be thinking problem solvers. Math is pretty much using a set of rules and formulas to solve problems. Every word problem I have ever taught in class starts out

with the same set of questions: What am I being asked? What do I already know? How does this resemble other problems I have been faced with? What I focus on with the students is that these questions can be applied to any problem or decision that they will ever have to deal with. I like to put it in the context of weather forecasting. Every time you read the weather, it is based on analyzing the result of what happened when these conditions occurred before. You use the data you have to plan an approach and execute it using the tools you have learned.

My personal teaching style is to have as much of the learning be as self directed as possible. This is not always easy in math because of the fact that we have to learn the rules that surround each chapter we cover, but at some point in every chapter lessons like this occur. The students call it the 'Donahue-it-yourself' section of the chapter. It always involves having students dive deeper into the application aspects of the material. By the time the students get through my class, they understand that there will be times where I purposefully challenge them with tough problems. I do not believe that I am doing my job if I am not giving the students hard problems to work through. When they leave me and go off to college or the work force, I don't want any of my students coming back and telling me that they were not prepared to work through tough problems."

In addition to teaching Algebra 2, Honors Calculus, and AP Calculus, Mr. Donahue is also co-advisor to the high school's Gay Straight Alliance Club. "While I am involved in a lot of our school's community life, this club seems to be the best fit for something that has impact on the school's culture," says Mr. Donahue. "High school can be a tricky time for many students, especially if they feel that they do not fit in with the rest of the school population. Our club is thriving with approximately fifty active members. In the last couple of years, there have been more students that have joined not because they are LGBTQ, but because they respect the rights of those who are."

During his years at New Milford High School, Mr. Donahue has managed NMHS' theater, producing the school musicals for the past eighteen years, and he has also coached baseball and softball. "While these jobs do not directly connect my students with the community, they do all show how education transcends the classroom. Our musicals in particular have always been a big community event. Frequently there have been close to 200 students and parents involved in the process each year. The idea of being involved in something this big and technical provides the students with an immense feeling of belonging and accomplishment. I have been told by students and parents alike that being involved with the musicals has changed their lives."

In closing, Mr. Donahue says, "I do not think I am anything special. I see a lot of really good teachers every day that are just as deserving of this honor. I work hard and take my responsibility very seriously. I am one of the lucky people in this world that has found a job that I love doing. Students ask me pretty regularly what is the most important part about being a teacher. I think I surprise them when I tell them it isn't about mastering the subject matter, but being able to relate to and enjoy the students. If you love what you teach, and love the students you teach, great learning occurs all on its own."

Summer Math Success!

NMPS math coaches Cortni Muir and Carrie Allen are pleased to report on the success of the inaugural Summer Math Passport program. Mrs. Muir says, "The passport program had students visit fourteen local businesses to gather information and then solve real world math problems based on the businesses. The goal was to be a collaborative partnership of students, educators, family, and community working together. Once students completed the problem, the business would stamp their passport as confirmation." Students were asked to collect at least ten stamps from the businesses; if they did, they would receive a certificate of completion. Students who completed all fourteen stamps would get a certificate and be recognized through social media and other media outlets. Parents and students were able to share their math journey on social media using the hashtag #nmsummermath.

Was the program a success? At Northville and Hill and Plain Elementary Schools, 135 students participated and, of that, 74 completed all fourteen stamps. At Sarah Noble Intermediate School, 215 students participated in the passport program and, of that, 126 completed all fourteen stamps. "We are so pleased with the student response for the first year of this program and look forward to building on it next year," says Mrs. Allen.
