# Superintendent J. Darrell Cooper, Ed.D.

Greetings from the Alexander City Schools!

I am happy to present this publication as a brief record of the many outstanding activities and accomplishments of the Alexander City Schools (ACS) during the 2014-15 school year. As you will see, we have much to be thankful for and proud of in our school system.



In sharing a few highlights, I must start by calling attention to how blessed we are in the ACS to have such a quality staff. We have 324 teachers and support staff who work daily with a sense of dedication and passion to provide the very best for our students. Beyond their outstanding job in the classroom, our teachers dedicate countless hours to training and other professional activities, evidenced by the 8,298 hours or 41.3 hours per teacher of professional development training completed in the past year. We have many "super" teachers, but this year, we are especially proud of the accomplishments of three teachers – Mrs. Kenyatta Simmons (SES) and Mrs. Sharon Brantley (BRHS), finalists for the prestigious Jacksonville State University Teacher Hall of Fame, and Mrs. Susan Green (ACMS), ACS Teacher of the Year. I send a big THANK YOU to our staff for a very successful 2014-15 school year!

The relationship between our community and the ACS is truly special in Alex City. Whether it's monetary support, a helping hand with school projects, support for our academic programs, or cheering on Wildcat athletic teams, our community is ALWAYS there with support. At the same time, we want our students to understand the importance of having a giving community spirit. Each year, our students at all grade levels are involved in many efforts to raise thousands of dollars for both local and global fundraising initiatives to support worthy causes. This past year, we moved to challenge our students to an even greater level in this area, implementing the *Wildcat Community Service Challenge*. Students in grades 7-8 are challenged to complete ten hours and students in grades 9-12 to complete twenty-five hours of community service per year. Meeting this challenge is now a requirement for the Honors Diploma.

Words cannot describe how excited we were in the past year to implement a K-12 comprehensive fine arts program. The opportunity was made possible through a financial commitment from the Alexander City Council. Due to this generous allocation, we implemented offerings in music and visuals arts to all students in grades K-4; music, visual arts, and drama in grades 5-6; and band, choral, drama, and visual arts in grades 7-12. Just like the students' academic or athletic experiences in our schools, these programs will enrich the lives of our students throughout a lifetime.

Other notable accomplishments over the past year include:

- Establishment of first Pre-K class at JPES, with an enrollment of 18 students, served by two certified teachers;
- Expansion of our after-school program, After the Bell, to include students in grades 2-8, increasing participants to over 150; Welcoming three new principals to our schools Mr. Jamie Forbus, JPES; Mr. Andy Caves, RES; and Dr. Anthony Wilkinson, BRHS;
- Earning district-wide accreditation through the *AdvancEd* accreditation organization;
- Expanding our Career and Technical Education Department through a \$503,000 purchase of equipment; the addition of a career teacher in the areas of robotics, engineering, and electronics; and expanding our cooperative education program from 21 to 42 students;
- Continuation of our award-winning elementary and middle school robotics programs and our expansion of robotics to BRHS, where we established our first BEST Robotics competitive team;
- Completing network upgrades that provide up to 1 GB at BRHS and expanding the overall bandwidth across the district to 400 MB;
- Completion of the 1:1 iPad initiative at BRHS (grades 9-12) and providing additional units across the district, raising our totals to approximately 1,600 units, with each grade level having a minimum of 30 units;
- Completion of a comprehensive, district-wide facilities assessment, which will be used in the coming year to complete a 30-year comprehensive facilities plan; and
- Implementation of strategic teaching and student engagement teaching principles across the district, which was strengthened by training, visitations, and the support of Ron Clark and the Ron Clark Academy.

As you can see from the items above, we have much to be proud of in the Alexander City Schools. We're a strong school system with outstanding community support, and I look forward to the coming year, as we strive to climb to even greater heights!




