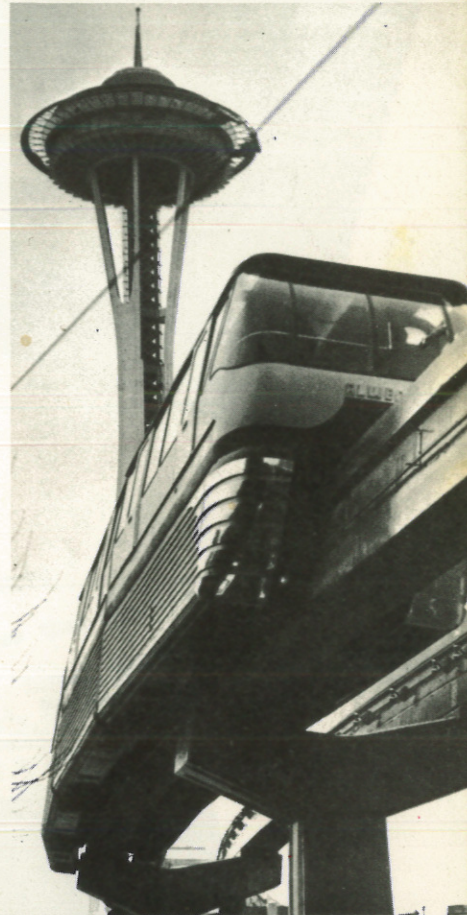

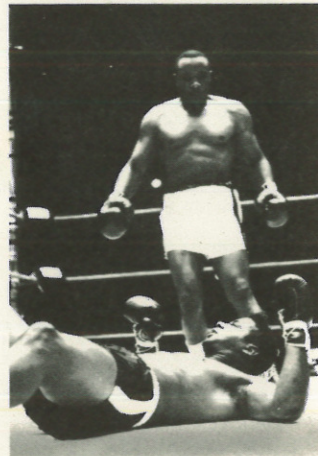

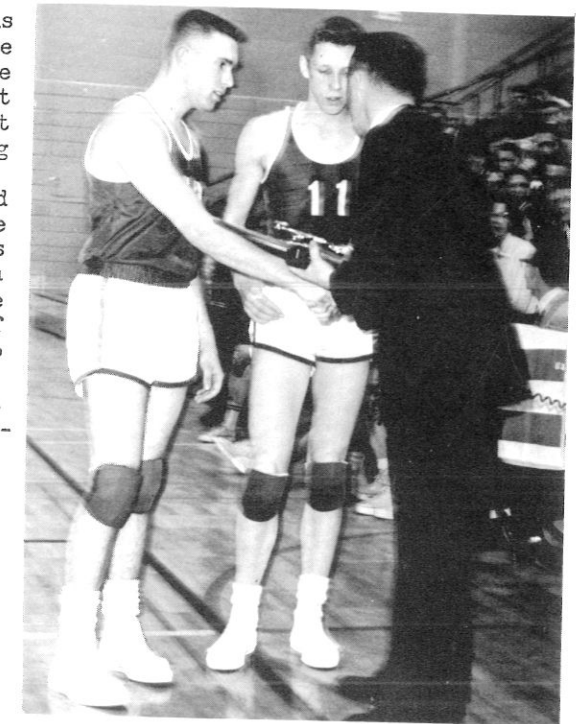
CHEERLEADERS

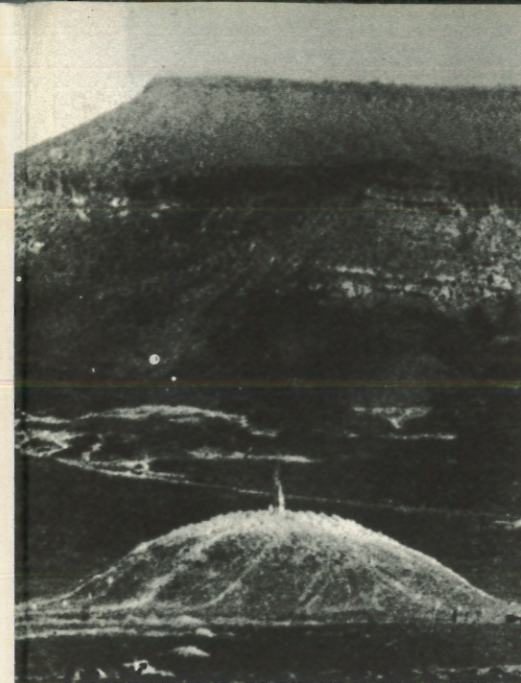




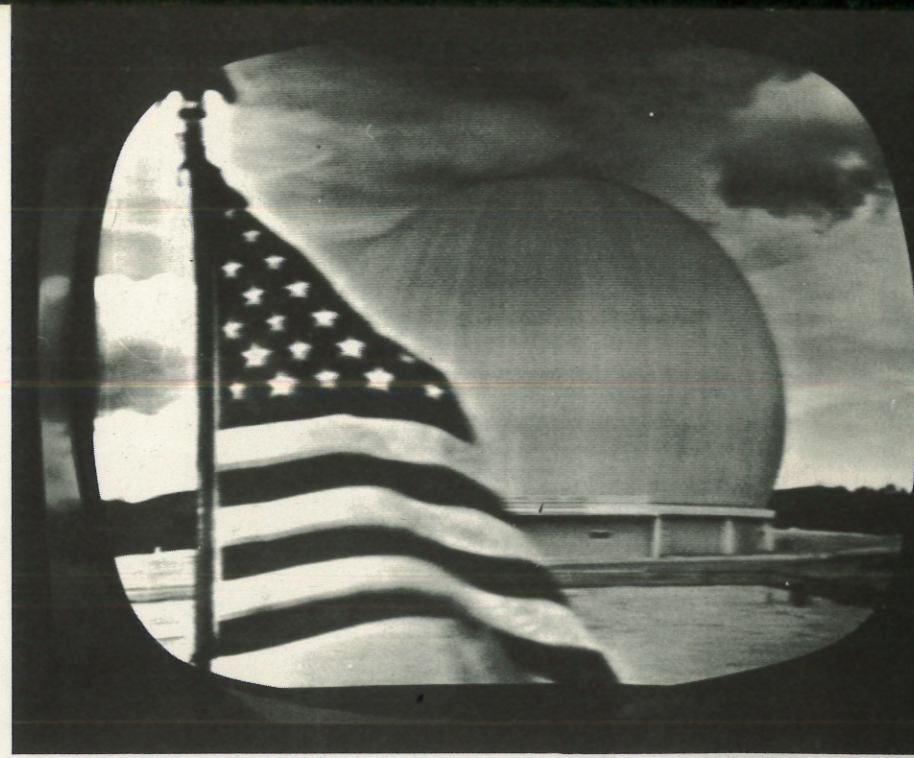




Indian army mules packed supplies toward the Himalayan front in a futile attempt to halt Chinese invaders.
