Plans for \$15 million SPMS revamp begin

Stuart Pepper Middle School (SPMS) will begin a new project towards the end of May. The school will receive major remodeling and improvements.

Renovations aren't being focused in just one spot of the building but the entire building. A brand new gym is being constructed, along with a larger office, a porch system and new parking for parents, staff and buses. Additions will also be made to science classrooms to create science labs instead of the average classroom.

The cafeteria is going to be extended using room from the current office, and the lobby will increase in size. A stage is going to be constructed in the current gym, similar to the layouts of Brandenburg Primary and David T. Wilson.

Renovations are also moving to the outside of the building. A new road will be created beside the middle school leading to the two schools behind it. This will lead to less of a traffic backup in front of the building



and a more efficient way of getting students to school without going through the subdivision.

Sherman Carter Barnhart is the architect. This is the same architect that has been used for the new Area Technology Center and several buildings in the district. They will do the design, then the board will receive several bids from contractors in April.

"It will be a big contract, but there will be a lot of companies that will want it," Dr. John Millay said.

The school is being renovated because it needs to be larger for the amount of

students that attend. Current space in the building is insufficient according to the new standards.

The total budget for the project is \$15 million. The construction usually costs up to \$13 million, but the cost increases with the price of the architect and furnishings

The school was built in 1978 and received a major add-on in 1996. SPMS underwent some minor updates and added a new library in 2003, but the school has not changed much since.

and nice. As far as all of the lighting, all of the heating and air, it's all going to be updated," Millay said.

With the new gym being constructed, the old gym is being divided to make extra space. Half of the gym goes to rooms for music, while the other half is being used as two multipurpose areas.

These multipurpose areas are where there may be class opportunities for MCHS pathways to be brought to the middle school to introduce students to these experiences before high school.

Not only is the school changing drastically in size,

but also these changes will make the school more energy and cost efficient.

"When it's all said and done, we'll have more room, and we should have a lower electric bill than what we pay now," Millay said.

Starting in May 2018, the project is predicted to be completed by July 2019. There are going to be several phases during the renovation, since the school will be occupied at the same time it is being constructed. The school is still expected to take about a full year to finish.

"Every one of our kids go there, every kid goes through Stuart Pepper, so we want that to be a great experience. That's why it needs a nice lunchroom, a nice learning space, adequate labs and a big comfortable gym for the school. It's making the school comfortable for the student body," Millay said.

SPMS is also updating all of the keys and locks to make the school a safer learning environment. All of these new additions to the school will hopefully make the school day better for both students and faculty.

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New immunization requirements for students

The state of Kentucky has recently passed a bill that increases the amount of immunizations required for a student to attend a public school in Kentucky. The new law will take effect in the 2018-2019 school year. Many schools are urging parents to get their children vaccinated as soon as possible in order to avoid a shortage of the shots caused by people waiting until the last minute to get immunized. This law will require all students to receive a Hepatitis A vaccine and all students aged 16 years and older to get an ACWY vaccine.

The Hepatitis A shot must be given in a series of two shots six months apart which is why many people are recommending that the first shot be taken in early Feb. in order to complete the whole series.

This bill was passed into law prior to the hepatitis A outbreak that had a total of 52 confirmed cases in KY last year. This recent outbreak also proves just how important these shots are, especially for those in Jefferson County which has had at least 12 cases.

This virus infects the liver and most commonly spreads through contaminated food but can also travel through water, people and objects. According to the Mayo Clinic some symptoms include: nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain (especially near the liver area), joint pain, fever, jaundice, fatigue and itchy



skin. Not everyone will develop symptoms but can still spread the disease.

The ACWY vaccine (MenACWY) is a Meningitis shot that protects patients from Meningitis A, C, W and Y. Getting this vaccination is very important because a case of meningitis can turn deadly very fast due to the fact that it affects the brain.

Meningitis is an inflammation of the meninges (membranes) surrounding the brain and spinal cord. It can be caused by a viral, bacterial or fungal infection.

Viral infections are the most common type, while bacterial is more deadly and fungal is usually slow growing.

A statement from the Mayo Clinic explains that symptoms of Meningitis in people older than two include: headaches with nausea or vomiting, sensitivity to light, stiff neck, high fever, loss of appetite and thirst, seizures, confusion, difficulty concentrating, sleepiness and Meningococcal Meningitis a skin rash may involve a skin rash.

In addition to students aged 16 years and older getting the Hepatitis A vaccine and Meningitis booster, all children must still follow the previous vaccine requirements. Ensuring that the child is properly vaccinated at the right time is the responsibility of the legal guardian. All students must be immunized against Pertussis, Diphtheria, Poliomyelitis, Measles, Tetanus, Rubella, Mumps, Hepatitis B and Haemophilus influenza disease at the correct times established by the Cabinet for Health and Family Services.

All students must show evidence of immunization by showing an immunization form from a doctor's office. The only exemptions from these new rules is if a medical condition of a student or their religion doesn't allow them to follow the requirements. One example of a religious exemption is if a student is a Christian Scientist, a faith that doesn't really believe in modern medicine.

All forms that relate to exemptions of these shots can be picked up at any facility that is licensed to care for children. These facilities include but are not limited to public schools, daycare centers, preschools, family-child care homes and private schools.




Once the New Year rolled around, the girls were more than ready to perform in the parade for over eight miles.


Back home, their coaches were beyond proud of them. Coach Beth Risen knew exactly what the girls were about to experience since she made the same trip when she was in high school.

Flu virus fights back stronger than ever

A widely known infection has become the talk of the town, or state for that matter. The flu has made its annual comeback throughout Kentucky, but something is different from previous years.

The flu is a common viral infection and symptoms that vary from congestion and headache to coughing and a fever, sometimes all of them. During the spring and summer seasons, the bacteria for this unfriendly infection usually die out however, as the autumn and winter seasons roll back around, they begin awaiting for their next host. During these months, doctors and nurses see several cases of the flu and flu-like illness, however, the past few months have kept them on their toes. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the flu activity reported is sim-



ilar to the flu peak of 2014-2015 which was the years of a high severity flu.

Dr. Robert Kupper works with Meade County Pediatrics and has also noticed a change in flu cases this year.

"From what I've seen, the clinic has seen more cases of the flu much earlier than previous years. We usually begin to get cases around January and February," Kupper said.

The flu is very contagious and is spread by airborne respiratory droplets, by skin-to-skin contact and touching contaminated surfaces.

"If you watch human behavior, you begin to notice how many surfaces we touch on a daily basis. I see it everyday in the clinic," Kupper said.

Kupper says the best way to avoid getting the flu is to avoid eating and drinking after people, wash hands frequently and avoid kissing partners during the flu season.

If flu symptoms begin to appear, it is best to go to your nearest family physician and request a nasal swab flu test. Remember to arrive within the first 48 hours of the first signs of flu symptoms. If diagnosed quickly, the flu can be treated with Tamiflu but only if caught within those first 48 hours. Other treat-

ments include rest and fluids.

"Our flu test is a verv specific test to the flu, therefore, if you test for the flu and it comes up positive, we know that it cannot be another infection like strep," Kupper said.

Most cases of the flu do not end in long term effects unless a person has a chronic illness then the flu can affect them differently.

More than three Kentucky school districts have canceled for the year 2018 due to lack of attendance amongst students and staff. According to officials, schools close when the attendance drops below ninety percent due to illness.

Meade County now faces the same problem as attendance rates are quickly dropping due to absences caused by the flu.

Passing civics tests becomes mandatory to graduate

The civics test is usually reserved for immigrants who come to the United States of America in the hopes of becoming a citizen, but now it has become a requirement for all students to pass in order to walk the line and receive a diploma.

This is not unique to MCHS. In 2017, Senate Bill 159 was passed by the Kentucky General Assembly so that students are required to complete a 100 question test prepared by their local board of education.

Students must answer questions about presidents, laws and other information relating to the U.S. When asked sophomores Clint Reardon and Ethan Fackler agreed that the information on the Civics Test was common knowledge that students should already be familiar with. "It is everything we already learned in elementary school that we don't need to be tested over anymore. It's common sense," sophomore Clint Reardon said. Ty Barnett, MCHS social studies teacher, argues that even though most students are born U.S. citizens they do not

In 1974 the modern budget process began with the Budget Act of 1974. As of now the government has had 18 shutdowns since this program's creation.

So what does it mean when the government shuts down? During a government shutdown they close non-essential federal programs because Congress can't agree on a budget for the programs. The most recent government shutdown was on Jan. 20 when they shut down for nearly three days because parties could not agree on a plan.

Not all shutdowns are the same, and this one had one thing different: many federal employees were placed on furlough. Furlough is when federal employees do not report to work or are simply not paid. Only eight out of the previous 18 shutdowns have affected federal employees.

This editorial is not meant to be political in nature or to attack a political party or their decision. The editorial board of The Current simply does not believe that it is fair that some citizens go without pay because they work for one of these "non-essential programs."

reported that 2,819,960 people are employed by the federal government, and up to 800,000 of those employees were asked to stay home due to the shutdown. What is the ironic part of this situation? The politicians responsible for the controversy still get paid throughout the shutdown. This is due to the fact that their salaries are not funded through annual appropriations, their salaries are actually written into permanent law.

The only time that Congress men and As of June 2017 the Labor Department women can change their salaries is at the start

of a new term, so even if they want to change their situation they can not.

Following the shutdown a piece of legislation was signed guaranteeing that the workers will be compensated for the pay they missed, but that doesn't stop the bills from coming. It is great that they are trying to make it up to the workers, but that doesn't mean that they do not need that pay for groceries or a car payment or any other bill that may come.

In some households multiple members are employed by the government, and when shutdowns like the one in Jan. occur they lose not only one paycheck, but all of their necessary income.

The editorial board understands that Congress may need to step back after a debate to clear their heads, but it is over dramatic for them to initiate a shut down that affects hundreds of thousands of Americans. The lives and jobs of American citizens are not something that should be easily changed just because a group of people can't agree on how to handle a budget.

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
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


How do you feel about snow days?






We talk about standing for feminism but how do we support this statement?

streets on the anniversary of Trump's inauguration to opinionize these matters of public interest.




Women, now is the time to educate ourselves on the subjects that matter.

After completing high school, French wants to be a Pediatric Oncologist. She wants to save the world, more specifically, save the world of kids with cancer.


French's favorite subject is English. It gives her a reason to express her emotions through writing, which she believes, is such a beautiful thing.

The Current gets creative with polymer clay

Drawing is one of the first steps into the artistic world, but imagine if you can take your 2D art and turn it into a 3D reality.

Clay is a form of art where you take the image of something and use your hands to create said image. However, there are many different types of clay and each type is better for certain use. Pottery clay is best used to make dishes like bowls and vases but if you're the type of person who wants to make charms, jewelry or mini figurines, polymer clay is the best type of clay for that.

Polymer clay is a versatile and pliable substance that is easy to mold to form shapes and hardens when exposed to heat, such as baking it in the oven. Polymer clay arranges in multiple colors and it comes in small packages that can be bought at multiple crafts stores like Michaels. To make sure that you have the right clay, look for brands such as Craftsmart, Fimo, and Sculpy.

Like every hobby, polymer clay is a craft that you have to practice at to master, the more the practice, the more the detail you can add. Most sculptures and charms made from this material are small, sometimes no bigger than the size of your thumb, so many tools are useful to make your sculpting easier.

Cleaning the little charms is simple as all you need is some rubbing alco-

hol or nail polish remover, this will help remove dust and fingerprints.

The first on the list may actually surprise some people as it is a nail tool used in beauty salons. Dotting tools have a round metal ball on each end, each a different size for different uses. On nails they are used to make dots or flowers, but when dealing with clay, they are used to make eye sockets for characters or used to smooth out edges and combine lines. Unfortunately dotting tools cannot be found at craft stores, but they are found at beauty parlors or nail salons. The next item on the list a fairly simple one but dangerous as it is not a toy. X-acto knives are handy when cutting clay to make any straight line. Having an X-acto knife is perfect for dealing with clay as you won't have to use your perfectly good kitchen knife. Other tools are helpful as well but can be replaced with household items, for example, toothpicks work just as well as a pointed tool.

Polymer clay is obviously soft when sculpting but in order to make your masterpiece permanent, bake in the oven and follow your package instructions that each block of clay is wrapped in.

A common mistake in sculpting is assuming that every little detail must be sculpted, such as faces but the good news is after baked, acrylic paint is a great way to paint on the rest of the detail. However, if the clay is held often, the paints will slowly rub off. In order to seal in the paint, use a polymer clay Craftsmart glaze. All that is needed is one coat brushed onto and once dry, the clay piece becomes shiny and smooth. DO NOT USE CLEAR FINGERNAIL POLISH, the clay will become smudged and paint will smear.

When asked my favorite literary classic, I turn to F. Scott Fitzgerald's "The Great Gatsby."



The language of Gatsby is beautiful, using color to provide symbolism and tone.



That blend of the real with the artistic, the idea of getting insights into life from what is obviously a supremely crafted work of art -- that's what makes The Great Gatsby my favorite literary classic.




"I think Gospelfest went well. Escalante is an amazing conductor who can take any production and make it great," senior Elizabeth Richerson said.


"Gospelfest was such a fun experience I had a great time singing about Jesus and getting into the music with my friends," said junior Madison Benham.




