Parent Information





What is Telehealth?

- ► Telehealth uses computers, internet access, assessment tools, secure software, and camera devices to connect a health care provider with students and staff members from school.
- Information obtained is used to assess, diagnose, and treat common health issues, that include, but are not limited to: pink eye, ear infections, common cold, strep, flu, urinary tract infections, rashes, allergies, and lice.
- ► Testing supplies for strep, flu, and urinalysis will be available at all locations offering telehealth visits.

When will C.A.T.S. services be available?

- Target date of November 4th, 2019. Expect to receive packets SOON!!!
- ► Hours will be Monday through Friday, 8am-3pm.
- All students must have a completed C.A.T.S. Packet turned in to have access to telehealth services. Please ask your school nurse for more information.



Why is C.A.T.S. necessary?

- ► To promote health by diagnosing and treating illnesses early. This will decrease absenteeism.
- ▶ To decrease your time away from work or other important responsibilities.
- ▶ To identify healthcare needs of your child within the school system.
- ► To **assist** in establishment of primary care when it is not previously established.

How will we provide Care at the Schools?

- If your child presents with an appropriate complaint, the school nurse will connect the patient with a medical provider through computer access.
- The nurse will ALWAYS attempt to contact you prior to connecting with the medical provider.
- ► The nurse will ALWAYS be present during telehealth visits.
- Visit information will be forwarded to the patient's PCP if the appropriate form is complete.



Who will C.A.T.S. be available to?

ALL students and staff members of Rhea County Schools who present to the school nurse with an appropriate complaint that can be addressed via a telehealth visit.



What is the Cost of a C.A.T.S. visit?

▶ Students- \$0 (Insurance will be billed. Students with a copay, deductible or self pay will not be responsible for a visit fee).

What if?

- What if your child had instant contact with a health care professional to address their immediate medical need?
- What if your child did not have to miss school days because the illness is caught early?
- What if you didn't have to wait for an appointment and didn't have to check your child out of school for a medical visit?
- Every child has the potential to be a C.A.T.S. patient as long as the paperwork is completed prior to a visit!

- Your C.A.T.S. medical provider is Amanda Still, FNP.
- Amanda attended Cleveland State Community College for her undergraduate degree then received her Master's Degree from Southern Adventist University. She worked as a Registered Nurse for nearly 9 years with experience in pediatric nursing as well as emergency care before becoming a Family Nurse Practitioner.
- Amanda is also the C.A.T.S. Telehealth provider for Polk County Schools. This program began in August 2019.
