This all changed, back in 2017, when we partnered with Dan Perdue of Perdue Blackberry Farms located right here in Perry, Georgia. Perdue Farms individually quick-freezes their berries at the peak of ripeness, so that we are able to serve them throughout the school year in all of our schools. The berries are especially delicious in our Berry Blast Smoothie and Cobbler! This year, along with continuing to offer Perdue Blackberries, we have also been able to serve two other items from small, family owned, local farms. The first



was Fuyu Persimmons from Glennville, Georgia. Laura Wirht, part of the husband and wife farming team, delivered the persimmons to three of our elementary schools that participate in the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program. Recently, we offered gourmet lettuce from Stonecreek Hydroponics located near Lake Hartwell, Georgia. Their lettuce is grown in hydroponic towers. This means the lettuce never touches dirt or pesticides, making it exceptionally safe and healthy to eat. All of our high schools received an assorted case filled with different and unique varieties. We are proud to support our local farmers and Georgia Grown community! Hopefully next year, we will be able to build even more relationships with the hardworking farmers in our state.


