On Thursday March 22, the Varsity Calhoun Eagles traveled to Sherwood for the first meet of the year. The track team this year includes Tylar White, Kendra Phillips, Anthony Hilbert, Makaila Carranza, and Mekhi Kinner. Junior Tylar White won the 100 meter dash with a time of 13.50 and ran a 1:09.89 in the 400 to finish

4th. Senior Anthony Hilbert received 2 medals by winning 3rd in the high jump with a jump of 5'10" and 3rd in the long jump with a jump of 15' 9 ½". Senior Kendra Phillips captured the 2nd place medal in the 3200 with a time of 16:29.70 and 4th in the 1600 with a time of 7:16.33. Sophomore Mikaila Carranza finished 8th in the 1600 with a time of 8:08.02. The Eagles will go on the road Wednesday to compete at the Archie Invitational.

Students from Calhoun School District attended the annual Missouri Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) State Leadership Conference, March 11-13, at Tan-Tar-A Resort, Osage Beach. There were more than 1,600 students (grades 6-12) and their teachers in attendance.

This year's student-developed conference theme was "Unmask Your Leadership Powers". The conference featured speakers and workshops on topics such as preparing for college and careers, leadership skills, and traffic safety. In addition to leadership training, honors and recognition, more than 640 students participated in 30 competitive events, including early childhood education, entrepreneurship, culinary arts, fashion design, career investigation, chapter service learning projects and sports nutrition.

Scholar Bowl

On Thursday, March 15th, the Calhoun Scholar Bowl team competed in the Belton After-School Invitational Challenge. Although the team did not manage to win at this competition, nearly all of the games Calhoun participated in were extremely competitive. Our scholars were impressive, considering most of the schools at the meet are classified as Class 3 or Class 4. In the closet game of the match, Calhoun lost to Truman of Independence by just one question, with the final score being 70-80. Another close game that could have gone either way was against Fort Osage of Independence, which Calhoun lost to by two questions with a final score of 60-80. Calhoun also competed against Lee's Summit North (final score: 40-300), Sherwood (final score: 40-170), Butler (final score: 40-80), and Van Horn of Independence (final score: 30-150). Students on the Scholar Bowl team include: Elana Hollinger (captain), Taylor Trull, Brennan Hartgrave, and Nicholas Rusche.

Calhoun High School will be hosting the 2018 Mid-State Conference Championship Scholar Bowl Tournament this year. The tournament will start at 9:30 am on Saturday, April 7th. Calhoun, Chilhowee, Kingsville, and Heartland Christian (Belton) High Schools will compete on that day for the conference title. Each school will play three games in the morning in a round robin bracket; then, after the lunch break, they will be seeded one through four based on wins and points scored. Whichever school can win two games in a row after lunch will be the 2018 Mid-State Conference Scholar Bowl Champion.

Another important meet coming up is the District Championship for Scholar Bowl. This year, Leeton is hosting that competition, and it will be held on Saturday, April 14th. Schools that will be competing for the Class 1 District 6 championship include: Calhoun, Chilhowee, Drexel, Green Ridge, La Monte, Leeton, and Northwest (Hughesville).

Science Fair Projects

The annual Science Fair was held last month. All of Mr. Duensing's students participated, and a few projects look to be contenders in this competition. The winners will be announced during the end-of-year awards assembly.

Helping Students Tackle Testing

We think of test anxiety as something that crops up when teenagers take the SAT or some other important exam, but the truth is that even very young children can experience it. With the increase in tests and assessments at the elementary school level, more and more young children are experiencing symptoms of test anxiety.

There are a few steps you can take to help your child tackle this problem before it becomes overwhelming.

1. Ask questions to clarify. Often, the process of saying their worries out loud helps young children work through their feelings. Understanding the thought patterns that trigger anxiety can help parents develop strategies to target specific concerns. Try asking these questions:

- o How do you feel when you first see the test?
- o What's your biggest worry about taking a test?
- o Do you feel worried when you think about a test or only when you see the test?

Questions like these help us to avoid assumptions about why kids feel anxious.

2. Teach test-taking basics. Young children have very little experience taking tests. Kids may feel empowered simply by talking through basic strategies, such as reading the directions, asking questions about the directions, looking for questions they know they can answer right away, and passing over tricky questions for a moment.


3. Talk to the teacher. Some young children become overwhelmed by things like timed math computation tests and spelling tests because they look at the whole page instead of focusing on one answer at a time. If this is the case for your child, the classroom teacher might be able to implement some simple solutions such as using a piece of paper to cover the majority of the page so that your child only focuses on one line at a time. Other kids experience anxiety when they look around and see everyone working quickly. They become distracted by the noise of the pencils scratching on the papers. A quick fix for this is a privacy shield at the desk or being seated in a separate area at the back of the room.

4. Encourage positive self-talk. Cognitive reframing is a great way to help young children cope with their anxious thoughts. We can teach kids to "boss back" anxious thoughts by replacing negative thoughts with positive ones. So when their brain signals that something is too hard, they can say, "You don't worry me! I know how to do this!"

5. Teach relaxation strategies. Visualization exercises are great for little kids because they tend to have active imaginations. Practice these when your child is calm. Ask him to close his eyes and identify a place he feels happy, confident, and relaxed. Encourage him to share details about the sights, sounds and scents in his calming place. As he shares, cue him to take deep breaths. Then on test day, remind your child to close his eyes and visualize his calming place when he feels anxious.

6. Bolster confidence. The bottom line is that test anxiety can feel like a confidence killer. Instead of focusing on the actual tests being taken, help your child find their inner strength in other ways. For many children, increasing free play and outdoor play is a confidence booster. In the context of play, kids challenge themselves and work through their fears. This builds confidence that can positively impact your child across all areas of life.

I started my educational journey in 1977; my philosophy of education has not wavered for the past 40 years. I base my decisions on what is best for the students. If that is the mindset of all involved amazing things can happen for our students and the district.

It is imperative that we create a pattern of fiscal stability, accountability and oversite procedures to ensure that we can achieve our mission of preparing motivated, productive lifelong learners. Hook forward to working with all of you the next two years.


